Kaya, wandjoo to the April Gazette and the Noongar season of Djeran, which also marks the first month of Autumn.



Rates

Pensioner Concession Rebates

Ratepayer portion of rates, including waste collection must be paid by 30th June each year, if payment is not received then entitlement to the rebate is not valid. The rates then become 'Deferred Rates' and can be paid at the settlement of a property or once the new current year rates (2022/2023 etc) are paid in full, any further money received will be allocated to deferred rates.

If you have any questions relating to this, please email shire@boyupbrook.wa.gov.au Attention: Rates Officer.

Payment Options

The shire offers instalment plan options when original rate notice for the year are raised.

Some ratepayers are choosing to set up BPAY through their preferred financial institution to pay an allocated amount each week/fortnight/month, so the credit reduces the amount to be paid when rates are raised.

If you require further information, please contact shire administration.

Important dates

Fourth and final instalment 14/04/2023

BPAY – Important information

Each assessment has a unique Biller Code, therefore if making payment by BPAY please ensure a separate BPAY payment is made for each assessment.

If a payment is made for several assessments, it is the ratepayer's responsibility to inform the shire the assessments the payment is to be allocated. If the shire has not been informed of the allocation, interest will be incurred on those assessments with monies outstanding.

Difficulty in paying rates?

The shire understands that the last few years have been difficult for many people.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Shire Council Matters are printed as received and no changes are made or edited. Only formatting has occurred to fit the space.

External debt collection agency charge fees which under the Local Government Act 1995 the shire can recoup from the property/ratepayer.

If you are having trouble in paying rates, please contact the shire to discuss Special Payment Arrangement.

Outstanding Rates Debt Collection

All endeavor is made to contact the ratepayer, at the last known address or by email or telephone if listed with the shire, to discuss payment options that maybe available.

If the ratepayer cannot be contacted, the Shire of Boyup Brook outsources debt collection to an independent Debt Collection Agency. The debt collection agency adheres to their debt collection recovery. If the matter is not resolved, the shire, under the Local Government Act 1995 has several options:

Property being rented

Section 6.60. Local government may require lessee to pay rent to the shire. Excerpt only:

"....If payment of a rate or service charge imposed in respect of any land is due and payable, notice may be given to the lessee of the land requiring the lessee to pay to the local government any rent as it falls due in satisfaction of the rate or service charges..."

Rates not paid for 3 or more years (excerpt only)

Section 6.64.(1) If any rates or service charges which are due to a local government in respect of any rateable land have been unpaid for at least 3 years the local government may, in accordance with the appropriate provisions of this Subdivision take possession of the land and hold the land as against a person having an estate or interest in the land.....

Boyup Brook Co-operative Community Fund

In 2020 the Board of the Boyup Brook Co-operative established the Boyup Brook Co-operative Community Fund with the aim of assisting local community and not for profit groups achieve certain goals that they were otherwise unable to do without funding assistance.

Who can apply?

Community Grants are available to not-for-profit groups in Boyup Brook who:

- Primarily serve the residents of Boyup Brook.
- Can demonstrate a high level of community support.
- Can demonstrate financial stability and sound project management. (For requests over \$5,000, a copy of the most recent, audited financial statement or bank statements from the last 12 months must be provided with the application).

Applications are invited from not-for-profit community-managed sporting groups, welfare, education, arts/cultural, youth, seniors, children, and related groups.

What can I apply for?

Community Grants can be used for a range of purposes including:

- Capital works
- Pilot programs
- Activities
- Equipment

The project or activity must:

- Be of benefit to the local community generally.
- Meet an identified need.
- Not require commitment to ongoing funding from the Co-Op.
- Not duplicate an activity already available in the local area.

How are applications approved?

All applications will be tabled and discussed at the board meeting following the close of date for applications. Those that can demonstrate a financial or in-kind contribution will be considered favourably, as will those who source funding from other sources. As the funding pool is limited, applications that demonstrate the best value for money will be prioritised, and priority will also be given to applicants who have not previously been funded.

What we look for?

- How your project relates to your organisation's purpose
- How the idea of the project came about, its community importance and expected benefits
- Strong project research and planning

When can I apply?

Community grant applications will be open from May 1 – May 15 and October 1 – October 15. Applicants will be notified 3 weeks after applications close if their application is successful.

Acquittal Process

Successful recipients are required to submit a completed Acquittal Report within 60 days of project completion (further details can be found in the application form.



Pasture Preparation – Rye Grass

When reseeding a pasture there are many things to consider: 1. What do you want to achieve with the pasture?

Modern rye grasses are made to perform and the more you feed them the more they will produce. By setting up your pasture at seeding with the correct variety for your situation and the correct seeding rate (15-20kg Diploid, 25-30kg Tetraploid), this will give you a usable pasture quicker along with achieving good persistence through greater seed set for future years.

2. Is the pasture a long term or short-term option?

If the pasture is a short-term option (going back to crop) be wary of your spend per ha. Are you considering a perennial or an annual pasture? Annual pastures are the best performers in the Boyup Brook area.

3. Am I set stocking or grazing in a rotation?

If you are set stocking a diploid rye is the better fit, as they are more tolerant to continual and harder grazing ie: sheep. Bear in mind all pasture will perform better and produce higher dry matter per hectare in a rotational system and animals will be healthier and produce more money per hectare.

4. Am I setting the pasture to regenerate after a hay crop?

If you are going down the path of setting up a pasture regeneration after a hay crop the following must be followed: The seeding rate per ha is crucial – Seeding a pasture mix at 10kg will still perform at an ok but subdued level, however the seed set you will achieve will be very low and thus your pasture the following year less than desirable.

Seeding a pasture mix at 20-25kg will produce a higher yielding hay crop as well as a very good seed set which in turn will give you a dense well-established pasture the following year. Make sure your N,P & K levels are adequate.

Once the hay has been cut the paddock needs to be locked up until seed is set, usually after 1st January.

14 Chromosomes per cell; 500,000 seeds per kg; more densely tillered with finer leaves; more tolerant to heavy grazing.





Backyard Buddies - Understanding Aphids

Aphids are small, soft-bodied, sap sucking insects which belong to the order Hemiptera. Let's examine some unique biological features about aphids to better understand why they are so difficult to control.

- Host plant range: Many species of aphids can feed on a wide range of host plants, which makes it difficult to control infestations in mixed plantings. These aphids are referred to as 'polyphagous' and includes the green peach aphid which feeds on a wide range of crops including vegetables, fruit trees, and ornamental plants.
- **Rapid reproduction:** Aphids can reproduce asexually through a process called parthenogenesis, where females give birth to live young without mating with a male. This allows aphid populations to grow rapidly under favourable conditions, and some species produce 20+ generations a season.
- Developmental plasticity & dispersal: Aphids can produce alates (winged aphids) in response to changes in environmental conditions. A drop in food quality, overcrowding or increased predation pressure can alter their development and produce winged individuals to aid in aphid dispersal.
- Ant mutualism: Some species of aphids have a mutualistic relationship with ants, which can protect them from predators and parasitoids. This can make it difficult to control aphid populations without also addressing the ant presence.
- Insecticide resistance: Some aphid populations have developed resistance to commonly used insecticides, which can make control even more challenging.

Understanding these factors can help you develop effective strategies for managing aphids. This may include cultural practices like removing infested plants, biological control methods like introducing natural predators or parasitoids, and careful use of insecticides that are effective against the specific aphid species present.



Avoid Hiring a Shady Tradie

Whether you need a qualified tradesperson to tackle a home project or a handyman for a quick repair, it's important to know the operator you've hired is trustworthy and reliable.

While the majority of tradies do the right thing, we are contacted by disgruntled consumers about the minority that don't.

In the past 12 months, we have received 579 complaints about those working in trades industries, mostly to do with them failing to exercise due care and skill, as well as wrongly accepting payment.

One trader we strongly urge consumers to avoid doing business with is Kyle John Graham Feisst (also known as Chris Johnson or John Miller), an air-conditioning installer and builder of custom vehicle trailers.

Mr Feisst, who advertises under numerous business names on Facebook Marketplace – including Perth Refrigeration & Air Conditioning Repairs; Wat4Now Customs (also spelt Wot4Now Customs); Perth Air Services; and Aim Mechanical – has so far refused to resolve the 42 outstanding complaints we have received from consumers claiming to be owed \$62,000 for incomplete or no work.

Gazette Subscriptions

Do you know someone who would like to receive the Gazette in the post each month, but is not covered by the Boyup Brook postal service? For only \$25, a copy of the Gazette can be posted to an address each month. Contact the CRC on 9765 1169. To avoid being left in the lurch if a tradie fails to deliver or goes broke, we always recommend only paying a minimal deposit of about 10 per cent or, for larger jobs, negotiate progress payments as stages of the work are completed.



Paying by credit card is a good option as it provides the protection of getting a chargeback if the goods or services aren't delivered.


Pricing and overcharging are other common issues reported to us, so always get several quotes to compare prices and avoid any surprises once the job is complete.

Ensure tradies are licensed (if required) or accredited by trusted industry bodies and search online for positive or negative reviews. Verify claims by asking to see previous work and speaking to past clients.

Ask to see a certificate of currency for public liability insurance, which will protect you or third parties against any damage the tradesperson may cause.

LiveLighter Recipe

Hot Cross Buns

Nothing says Easter quite like biting down into a warm and spicy hot cross bun. What's even better? Tucking into a homemade bun still hot from the oven!

While most hot cross bun recipes call for yeast and require a lot of kneading, we've come up with a super simple variation that's easy (and fun!) to make with the kids. They'll take about 20-30 minutes to prepare, but allow extra time if you're working with young children.

Ingredients

- 2 cups self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting
- 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon mixed spice
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 2 small apples, cored, skin on, finely diced
- 1/3 cup sultanas
- 1¹/₂ cups low-fat Greek yoghurt
- 1 egg, beaten
- ¹/₄ cup plain flour (for the crosses)

What to do

1.Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan forced).

2.Line a baking tray with baking paper.

3.Sift self-raising flour and spices into a medium-sized bowl. Add sugar, apples and sultanas and mix.

4. Using a fork, stir through yoghurt until incorporated.

5.Transfer mixture to a lightly floured flat surface; use clean hands to bring together until a sticky dough forms taking care not to over work the mixture. Add a small amount of extra selfraising flour as needed (it will depend on the yoghurt you use). Be careful to not add too much flour, you want the dough to just be workable.

6.Divide into 12 evenly sized dough balls and place on the baking tray.

7.Brush each bun with egg wash.

8. There are a few options for the crosses:

- $_{\rm o}$ $\,$ Keep it simple with cross-less buns $\,$
- Make up a paste of plain flour and water you want it to be about the consistency of thick yoghurt. Put the paste in a zip lock bag, push the paste to the bottom corner, and snip a small corner of the bag off with scissors.
 'Pipe' the paste onto each bun in a cross.
- Make up a paste of plain flour and water you want it to be about the consistency of toothpaste (you should be able to just roll it in your hands). Take a small section of the paste and roll it into a long sausage in your hands. The pieces should be about as thick as a chopstick. Lay the pieces in a cross shape on each bun.
- 9. Bake for 25 minutes or until golden brown.
- 10. Turn onto a wire rack to cool completely, or serve warm.

Missing an ingredient? Try these swaps!


- Egg wash a light brush with cow or soy milk

- Low fat Greek yoghurt vanilla yoghurt, regular-fat plain yoghurt





Celestial Communion

Whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.' 1 Corinthians 11:26

When Apollo 11's Eagle lunar module landed on the moon's Sea of Tranquility on July 20, 1969, the space travellers took time to recover from their flight before stepping onto the moon's surface. Astronaut Buzz Aldrin had received permission to bring bread and wine so he could take Communion. After reading Scripture, he tasted the first foods ever consumed on the moon.

Later, he wrote: "I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine curled slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup." As Aldrin enjoyed this celestial Communion, his actions proclaimed his belief in Christ's sacrifice on the cross and the guarantee of His second coming.

The apostle Paul encourages us to remember how Jesus sat with His disciples "on the night he was betrayed" (1 Corinthians 11:23). Christ compared His soon-to-be sacrificed body to the bread (v. 24). He declared the wine as a symbol of "the new covenant" that secured our forgiveness and salvation through His blood shed on the cross (v. 25). Whenever and wherever we take Communion, we're proclaiming our trust in the reality of Jesus' sacrifice and our hope in His promised second coming (v. 26).

No matter where we are, we can celebrate our faith in the one and only risen and returning Saviour, Jesus Christ, with confidence.


