Family Matters at Women's Day

As the annual 'Storm in a Teacup' women's day celebrated its thirteenth year, MC Rhonda Parker braced the audience for the event's entry into the teenage years, however it weathered the storm and is well-grounded to continue its journey towards adulthood.

Over 160 women filled the Rylington Park shearing shed and were captivated by Michelle Moriarty and her story of loss, having been widowed at 42. Michelle is the founder and director of 'Grief Connect', an organisation that provides grief and bereavement support to

people who have experienced a death. Her work in creating a I community that can share experiences earned her the 2023 WA Rural Women's Award. She said, "Grief is a process. Grief hurts. Ask for help, because no-one needs to grieve alone".

Throughout the day, the theme of 'Family Matters' was reflected. Julie Milloy from Carers WA provided information about the support available for those caring for a loved one, friend or neighbour; Julyan Sumner spoke of being a 'Fairbridge kid' having being "exported" as a child with his brother and sister and the adventures he had growing up: 'Think Effective' founder and mental health advocate, Renee Knapp shared insights into how family can take the form of friends, groups and sports and the importance of belonging and connection; and multi-award winning comedian, Luke Bolland, took a light-hearted approach to sharing stories involving his family.

Lunch was served with a glass of Beulah wine under marquees, with entertainment provided by Roque Pony, featuring guest singers Anne Deas and Renee Knapp. Then there was more opportunity to visit the variety of stalls and chat.

Three beautiful artworks were created by Meriol Beatty to auction. with over \$1,300 raised and added to the funds raised throughout the community for Ronald McDonald House Charities WA.

Pine Plantations in Boyup Brook

The State Government campaign to expand State owned pine plantations in Boyup Brook is progressing as the Forest Products Commission purchases more farming properties to convert to pine plantations. There are local and real Social, Economic and Environmental issues associated with this State Government program to spend \$350m changing land tenure. However, in Boyup Brook we can minimise the impact and generate local opportunity at the same time.

Consider "Small Lot Forestry" (say l0ha to 40ha - 1 or multiple sites) on your property where you receive annual income from Carbon Credits - that is real dollars in the bank (typically over the last few years around \$600/ha per year for the first 18 years) then at around plantation age 25 years - 30years you receive income from harvest and sale of pine logs according to your production plan. This timber is Primary Production for taxation purposes with the capacity to generate substantial returns.

Some points to note are:

- The Forest Products Commission has historically offered to provide establishment support (such as free seedlings with conditions)
- The Timber Hub "Decision Tree" is a Federal Government support tool to assist with site selection and budgeting
- Industry has offered to provide Carbon Credit accumulation, market and regulation support with conditions
- Industry can offer options for pine log supply contracts
- · Loss of local families is minimised
- Income is generated locally which supports increased local expenditure
- Biosecurity is improved through better pest and weed management by local landowners
- Water catchments and impact on local water tables is improved
- Fire risks are better managed

The Forest Products Commission (FPC) manages the Farm Forestry Assist Program, a one-off grant for farmers and other landowners to plant pine trees on their land.

Successful applicants located within the State's South West are provided with high-quality radiata pine seedlings from the FPC at no cost to the successful applicant.

Farmers and landowners interested in establishing 20 to 50-hectare pine plantations on their properties are invited to apply.

Rates Information

Pensioner Concession Rebates

To be eligible for the State Government Rebate for the current financial year you must pay your portion of rates and Emergency Services Levy by 30 June 2024. If your payment is not received by 30 June 2024, you will lose your entitlement to claim the State Government Rebate on your Rates and Emergency Services Levy for this year, and these will be automatically deferred. Deferred rates remain a debt against the property until such time as they are paid. Please note that all Waste charges are not deferrable and are required to be paid each year.

Pensioner Concession Rebate - Information

RevenueWA use a verification system which cross matches VEN, property address and Pensioner information. If you are a RURAL Pensioner, please ensure the address on your pensioner card is the same as the property address listed on your rates notice as many rural ratepayers have more than one assessment. Please ensure that the Shire has been provided with the preferred postal address for all correspondence.

Eligibility to Receive a Concession Rebate

To receive a concession, you must own and occupy the property as your principal place of residence on 1 July of the current financial year and hold a valid concession card.

Holders of the Pensioner Concession Card or State Concession Card


- The rebate is up to 50% for rates, limited to a maximum (capped) amount of \$750.
- The option to defer rates may be available if the required criteria is met.
- Receive a rebate on water usage charges, limited to a maximum (capped) amount.

Holders of the WA Seniors Card and the Commonwealth Seniors Health Card

- The rebate is up to 50% for rates, limited to a maximum (capped) amount of \$750.
- The option to defer rates may be available if the required criteria is met.

Holders of the WA Seniors Card only

- The rebate is up to 25% for rates, limited to a maximum (capped) amount of \$100.
- There is no option to defer rates.


<u>Schedule Advertising Coordinator</u>: To reach out to existing and potential advertisers to coordinate advertising spots for the Show Schedule. This role is mostly done early in the year prior to Schedule printing. A \$200 Honorarium is paid for this role at the end of the year.

<u>Events Coordinator</u>: This role entails organising any events not associated with the show. For example campers for the Country Music Festival weekend.

<u>Catering</u>: (This is a great opportunity for a group wanting to fundraise). This role is to coordinate the catering on Show Day, being the morning teas, the President's official lunch and lunch held in the Hall.

We are looking for the following Stewards:

<u>Preserve Steward:</u> This role involves assisting those placing entries on show morning to find where their entries need to go and assisting the judge during judging, e.g. recording winners and putting out prize cards.



<u>Horse Halter and Breeds</u>: This role involves taking entries prior to and on show morning. Assisting the judges, e.g. recording winners and giving out prize money and ribbons.

This Months Tips - Entering Preserves

With lots of produce around, now is the time to do your preserves. Here are some helpful tips from previous judges.

- Always use good quality ingredients, you can taste the difference. E.g. with vinegar, you get what you pay for.
- Bottled preserves, e.g. the liquid in Vacola bottles, should completely cover the contents.
- Bottles and lids must be clean.
- If you are using recycled jars/bottles make sure if they have commercial branding that it is covered for judging, e.g. cover over the name on lids.
- Some jams may get mould on the top, make sure this is removed before entering.
- Marmalade the fruit is to be sliced not minced.
- Sauces are to be presented in bottles, and jams and chutneys in iars.
- All entries are to be only from the season closest to the show, e.g. fruit from this summer, not last year's fruiting.
- All entries will be tasted, so don't put in anything that has been hurnt!
- If unsure of which class to put your entry in, ask the steward for advice.

Judging - Would you like to learn how to judge preserves? We are looking for anyone interested to gain the knowledge from an expert on what to look for when judging. If you would like to assist the judge on show day and learn on the job, please contact Lyn. It is very rewarding to learn all the tips on what makes a preserve a winner.

Working Towards a Community Resilience Network

South West Natural Resource Management (SWNRM) has partnered with Community Resource Centres throughout the South West to deliver six workshops between February and September, to build a Community Resilience Network in preparation for the predicted increase in drought events and the expected associated social impacts.

The aim of the project is to:

- Increase community access to suitable support services, especially early intervention tools that help to build individual and community resilience;
- Share resources and learnings to develop partnerships across the region;
- Develop plans to further build community resilience.

Sustainable Agriculture Manager Peter Clifton said: "The meetings are held online and at CRCs in Boyup Brook, Bridgetown, Donnybrook, Harvey, Brunswick and Manjimup."

The first two workshops have established the needs and gaps in communities and the services that are available in each area to support individuals and families in need.

Workshop 3, will feature Boyup Brook's own Renee Knapp, who will share her own experience of developing a framework for a community-led and collaborative approach to improving mental health outcomes, with a lens to applying a similar method for a community resilience network.

This session will be held on Friday, 3 May at 12pm for one hour, either in person at the CRC, or online via Teams. Participation in previous workshops is not required for joining in workshop 3.

"We'll take the amazing strengths that already exist in all of the sectors and from passionate people across communities and put them together to create localised and sustainable change," Mrs Knapp said.

"When we have a process for people to work together, that's when we can make a difference."

"Common sense solutions can be created that consider local needs and unique challenges when we work collaboratively in an effective manner. If this sounds like something you are interested in learning more about then this workshop is for you."



E-Waste Update

This year, the State Government will introduce a ban on electrical / electronic waste (e-waste) going into landfill.

Some concerns about e-waste at the Waste Transfer Station: washing machines, dryers, dishwashers, and electrical stoves etc., are not scrap metal and do not belong on the scrap metal pile. They are classed as e-waste and should be left at the orange table at the sea container, on the right as you enter the Transfer Station.

Also, small electrical items such as lamps, torches, and Christmas lights are also classed as e-waste and should not be put in the rubbish trailer. You are adding to the possibility of the Shire receiving a fine of up to \$10,000 for the dumping of e-waste items into landfill. Instead they should be left at the Precious Waste sea container. More information can be found on the website www.dwer.wa.gov.au.

The more items that we recycle as a community, the less that goes into landfill, and this will help to extend the life of the landfill site. We don't take fridges, freezers, or air-conditioners.

Please note we have new opening hours: Wednesday and Thursday 9am-12pm, and every second and fourth Sunday of the month from 10am-1:30pm, depending on the weather.

Our meeting is on the first Thursday of the month, at 10am at the Treehouse. Come and talk about all types of recycling. Remember: Waste is only Waste if it is WASTED!

What Goes in Which Bin?

Do you know what goes into which kerbside bin in your town? It depends on which waste and recycling contractors your Local Government uses.

Recently, Bunbury Anglican Boniface Cathedral MU invited me to talk to them about recycling. This presentation included Joanna Walker, Waste Management Officer for the City of Bunbury, as various Local Governments use different recycling contractors with differing guidelines of what is acceptable in the kerbside 'wheelie' bins.

Joanna gave an excellent presentation with an emphasis on using the correct kerbside 'wheelie' bin, and handed out fridge magnets showing what may, or may not be acceptable in each bin.

This is very important regarding the recycling bin, as items not acceptable for recycling are regarded as contamination. If there is too much contamination, the contents will be sent to landfill at a high cost to your Local Government and the contractor; these costs will be passed on to residents.

The WA Government is proposing to introduce a Landfill Levy beyond the Perth metro area. This Levy is \$80 a tonne in addition to local charges.

Some Local Governments such as Bunbury-Harvey Regional Council now have a kerbside FOGO bin (food organics-garden organics). The contents are sent to a facility to create mulch or compost. It is very important to avoid anything which cannot be composted.

Our sheep farmers are very familiar with avoiding contamination; for example, a strand of baling twine would seriously degrade a bale of AAA wool.

An acceptable product cannot be made from contaminated materials.



All around the western rim


Book Review

Natural Gardening In Australia

In this book Jeffrey shares his knowledge for people concerned about the use of chemical poisons and artificial fertilisers in their garden.



Practical and down to 'earth' ways are explained through his broad scientific knowledge base, and 40 years of experience, to help you create a natural garden ecosystem of your own.

Soil fertility and soil life is the key. Recycling of plant and grass nutrients is set out in an eight-step process. A crop rotation chart is provided. Moon planting and the authors experience with this technique. Collecting and developing your own seed bank for future plantings. A nifty way to grow Alfalfa sprouts in a jar with a photographic display, is very creative.

The 50 essential soil elements are discussed and how we can achieve these in a natural way. Allowing the soil to rest 'fallowing' and soil regenerative plants are highlighted to continue the focus on good soil fertility.

Pests, diseases and other problems are addressed with some useful natural recipes like tomato, chamomile and milk spray or onion, garlic and chilli spray. Companion planting can also have amazing results. The biggest test is your commitment!

Using such a reference, and many of the other gardening books available for loan at the library in our Community Resource Centre, can support you greatly in this roll.

Getting to Know George Stanton

with Sharon Lampard



Born and raised in Boyup Brook, George Stanton recently recounted stories spanning his remarkable 97 years, offering insights into the evolution of the town and the adventures that have shaped his life.

George was born on Christmas Day in 1926 at the Upper Blackwood Hospital in

Boyup Brook, one of five children to parents George William and Irene Dorothy.

He was the second oldest child, with three sisters and a brother, and they grew up on the family farm of Spring Bank, approximately three kilometres from town. Spring Bank had been in the Stanton family since approximately 1892, and George remembers it as a central gathering place where they'd often be joined by surrounding farming families.

George's father was one of ten children, with his nine siblings all sisters. George remembers his dad was more a 'hunter and gatherer' type than a farmer, but along with his siblings, he inherited Spring Bank. Buying out his sisters resulted in financial hardship for his family and George recalls, "We never had any money, but we had plenty of food and plenty of love, and that was the main thing."

His mother, fondly known by all as Betty, not only took care of her own children, but would often house George's cousins. He said at times there were up to twelve children at the farm, all cared for by his mother.

Getting a ride to school with an older cousin by horse and scully was an adventure for George and his older sister. When his cousin left school, George was in charge of catching the horse and driving the scully. "I can still remember walking up the gully in the mornings, on a frosty morning, walking in the creek instead of on the grass. And no shoes!"

On the way home after school, they'd race through the Boyup Brook bushland with other children who travelled the same way. Eventually he and his brother Charlie were upgraded to bicycles.


George ended up leaving school at the very early age of 14 years old, and started to work at Spring Bank and surrounding farms, helping with harvest and shearing.

Saving his money, George said he was able to purchase his first pair of shoes at 14, "a pair of sand shoes to go up to Dinninup Show." Prior to this, he didn't seem too bothered being barefoot, but he thought his first pair were "marvelous."


During his first couple of years out of school, he became quite reclusive, sometimes not venturing into town for months at a time. His parents became worried and made the decision to send him to Scotts College in Perth for a year. At the time George wasn't pleased, but he now appreciates that it taught him how to socialise and play football.

Tragically the Stanton family suffered a huge loss when George's brother Charlie passed away from tetanus at only 16 years of age, following a cut on his foot. He died on George's birthday, which was also Christmas Day.

After finishing a year away, with little work around the farm, George did a short stint on a timber mill before a job came up to do a mail run around the area. This included delivering items such as mail and bread locally, and also carting cream from the region to Capel, a tiring run that could take up to twelve hours driving a five-tonne truck.

In 1950, a disastrous fire tore through the region, destroying everything at Spring Bank except for his parents' house. With no money to be made at the farm, George moved to town and continued with a mail run, until he took a job with Jack Doust carting logs. This laborious work kept him busy for the next nine years.

At 25 years old, George said that getting married to Lorraine Hannah in 1951, quieted him down. The couple met at dances held at different halls in Dinninup, Kulikup, and Mayanup. Lorraine was originally from Katanning, but her father moved the family to Boyup Brook when he was carting for the Flax Mill.

Lorraine and George had one daughter, Kaylene, who went on to be a nurse and now lives not too far away in Dumbleyung.

The Stanton's embarked on many adventures together, which included an annual tradition of travelling to Broome, before the winter rain would set in.



They would spend three months in a caravan overlooking the ocean, accompanied by friends they met there, doing the same thing. George cherishes this time in his life, where they made great memories.

After 35 years of heading to Broome, Lorraine requested they take on some new sights. This led them on cruises in Malaysia, Singapore, New Zealand and around Australia. The Stanton's enjoyed 66 years of marriage before Lorraine sadly passed away in 2017 after battling an illness.

George still misses Lorraine, and it wasn't until her illness that he gained a newfound appreciation for the everyday tasks she diligently managed, now having to shoulder all of the household duties by himself.

Over the years, George has been a successful sportsman playing football, golf and then taking up lawn bowls at the age of 33. Remarkably, he not only continues to play bowls 64 years later, but he still excels at it. In recent years, he even won the Pairs Championship with his good friend Robin White - both men in their nineties, proving age truly is just a number!

In addition to his love for bowls, George is also keeping busy as an avid fisherman. He still has his own skipper's ticket and takes his own boat out. On a fishing trip in recent years, he caught the attention of a fisheries officer. With a chuckle, George recounted the officer's disbelief upon seeing his license: "Christ... you must be the oldest bloody fisherman still driving a hoat!"

Just like when he was a boy, George still enjoys being in the bush, and he goes walking particularly when the wildflowers come out. He also still goes away on trips, and treasures the opportunity to holiday with his expanding family, which now also includes two grandchildren and two teenage great grandchildren.

The only thing stopping him from enjoying his active lifestyle at the moment is a hip injury he sustained after a fall whilst holidaying with his grandson. He is currently taking some time to heal at the Citizens Lodge, but is keen to return home soon.

One of the biggest changes George has seen in his 97 years is the expansion of the town site of Boyup Brook, but he says over the last 30 years, technology has brought about the most dramatic changes.

George humbly reflects on his life, describing it as "pretty humdrum." Yet, amidst this simplicity, he is happily surrounded by friendly neighbours and invaluable friendships. He feels a sense of belonging in Boyup and, with a chuckle, acknowledges the familiarity of living in a small town: "Here in Boyup, I know everyone and everyone knows me...even people I don't know, know who I am!"
















Get Your Art Fix In Our Own Backyard

The Blackwood River Arts Trail (BRAT) is running from the March 23 - April 7 and will be a chance to check out beautiful and thought-provoking artworks from local artists.

<u>Pick up a trail guide including a lift-out trail map</u> and make a day trip out of it, visiting and chatting with some incredible artists in Boyup Brook and the wider Blackwood River Region including Nannup, Balingup, Bridgetown.

Boyup Brook has 12 artists showing their work in a variety of locations:

The Little Art Gallery at the Boyup Brook Visitor Centre is showing works by five artists:

- Beverley Prideaux's artistic interests have not strayed far from 'fibre fascination', developed after many years in the wool and mohair industries. Bev's needle-felting and 'painting with wool' has expanded to running needle-felting workshops.
- Neil Nicholson was born in Zimbabwe, moved to Australia in 2005, and lived 15 years in the Pilbara. The rugged beauty of the area was a great inspiration, as is anything rustic, including old barns and rusty vintage cars. Self-taught, acrylic is his main medium, but he also dabbles with watercolour.
- o Gulia Iv began her artistic journey in Kazan, Tatarstan. She fell in love with Western Australia's beauty, moved to Perth in 2009 and currently resides in Boyup Brook. Gulia's art emphasizes movement, light, life, realism, peace, freedom, visual stimulation. She paints in an impressionist style.

- Sandy Chamber's love of the iconic Grasstrees is depicted in his many paintings. Done in watercolours and with fine brush stokes these iconic trees each have their own character.
- Anna Murchison's work is both a dynamic observation of nature and a felt response to the world we inhabit. She prefers to paint on materials otherwise destined for landfill and is moving to the use of eco-friendly mixed media.

Naomi Rice is showing her photography at the **Treehouse** Coffee Lounge.

YARN n CO is displaying works by five artists:

- Tina Matthews spent the last seven years living in the Gascoyne Region on a cattle station, before moving to Boyup Brook. Anything vintage, rusty or floral provides inspiration and she likes experimenting with mixed mediums to create texture in her art.
- Joanna Hales-Pearce fell in love with colour and texture at an early age. Her artworks begin with bold backgrounds, and end with anything from found objects and items from nature to fabrics, or maybe just a touch of sparkle. Reality mixes with imagination to create bright, bold pieces filled with happiness.
- Estelle Rowcliffe, a self-taught artist, watched many zentangle artists, then developed her own style of tangle art.
 Using pencil and ink to create drawings using patterns, she finds this style of art is both relaxing and creative.
- Sarah Brlevich discovered needle-felting at a Heritage Day at the Dinninup Show Grounds, where Bev Prideaux gave her a short lesson. She has since developed her own technique and style, and enjoys being imaginative with her creations.
- Since retiring, Mark Brlevich found the spinning wheel has become his form of relaxing and de-stressing. He will spin anything, including camel fleece, and hopes to spin Highland cattle yarn one day. His yarns have travelled overseas.

Use Bible verses and inspirational sayings to re-focus when your thinking starts to go downhill. By changing your thinking you change your outlook, and by changing your outlook you change your life."

To one person the world looks desolate; to another, the same world looks rich and interesting. What you see depends mainly on what you *look* for. Make up your mind not to complain for a day. Then, challenge yourself not to complain for a week. You will be amazed at how much better you feel.

Change your thoughts and you can change your life. Where your focus goes, energy flows. Focus on bad things, you feel down. Focus on good, you feel good. Every day may not be good, but there is something good in every day. Look for it, it is there, even the little things, a bed to sleep on, a roof over your head.




Our swimmers have been sporting new swimming caps thanks to ongoing sponsorship from Trevor and Kirstie Clark from Hannaford.
