Big Launch for Better Beginnings

There was great excitement as 27 children and their caregivers attended the launch of the early literacy program, Better Beginnings, at the Boyup Brook Public Library on Thursday, July 28 2022.

The Better Beginnings family literacy program is run through the State Library of Western Australia and connects families with books through free reading packs. The goal of the program is to inspire a love of literacy and learning for children across the state by encouraging families to read, talk, sing, write and play with their child every day. The key aim of Better Beginnings is to support the development of literacy in children from birth; providing them with greater potential to grow, learn and develop, perform well at school and succeed in later life.

Attendees at the launch were treated to a story, rhymes and then colouring activities, before taking the opportunity to explore the library and the many books and DVDs available. As morning tea was served, families mingled creating fantastic social connections for both adults and children.

"Better Beginnings is a well regarded program throughout the State and it is so exciting that we are able to provide it to the Boyup Brook community through our library. We are so fortunate to have secured the grant funding to kick-start the sessions and we can't wait to see where it takes us", commented CRC Centre Manager, Jodi Nield.

However if families can't make it into the CRC, the sessions will be streamed live via Zoom, so they can join in from home, just as one participant did to attend the launch event!

There are also plans to make regular visits to Playgroup and Daycare, as well as take the resources to community events such as the Dinninup Show, Wellness Festival and community Christmas celebrations.





Payment Options

The shire offers instalment plan option when original rate notice for the year is raised.

Some ratepayers are choosing to set up BPAY through their preferred financial institution to pay an allocated amount each week/fortnight/month, so the credit reduces the amount to be paid when rates are raised.

BPAY – Important information

Each assessment has a unique Biller Code, therefore if making payment by BPAY please ensure a separate BPAY payment is made for each assessment.

If a payment is made for several assessments, it is the ratepayer's responsibility to inform the shire the assessments the payments is to be allocated. If the shire has not been informed of the allocation, interest will be incurred on those assessments with monies outstanding.

RevenueWA have introduced more stringent cross checking on Pensioner Concession Rebate claims.

Rejections can include:

- · Claim address does not match
- · Cannot confirm owners occupy land

To address the above, the Pensioner Ratepayer will be requested to supply proof of occupancy, to the shire, with one of the following:

- Utility bill with the Pensioner Ratepayer name and clearly displays property address
- Insurance bill with the Pensioner Ratepayer name and clearly displays property address
- Name and address on Pensioner Concession Card Rural numbering has been an issue with the claims. If your card is showing a rural number, please photocopy or come into Administration for the card can be updated on the Pensioner system.

Copy will be scanned and kept on Shire system only and noted on the Pensioner Concession Rebate Claim that proof has been sighted.

Eligibility for the concession

To receive a concession on local government rates an applicant must, on 1 July of the current financial year, own and occupy the property as their ordinary place of residence.

To receive a concession on water service charges an applicant must:

 as at the date of application, own and occupy the property as their ordinary place of residence and

- be the holder of a valid:
 - ⇒ Pensioner Concession Card; or
 - ⇒ State Concession Card; or
 - ⇒ Commonwealth Seniors Health Card together with a WA Seniors Card: or
 - ⇒ WA Seniors Card.

To own means an applicant must:

- be the registered owner or co-owner of the property on the Certificate of Title (Note: where the property is co-owned a partial concession may apply); or
- have a right to reside or life tenancy at the property under the terms of a Will (probated) and are responsible for the payment of the rates and charges raised against the property; or
- hold a long-term lease (greater than 5 years) in a retirement village, park home, lifestyle village or caravan park.

Ratepayer portion of rates, including waste collection must be paid by 30th June each year, if payment is not received then entitlement to the rebate is not valid. The rates then become 'Deferred Rates' and can be paid at the settlement of a property or once the new current year rates (2022/2023 etc) are paid can be paid.

During 2022/2023 it is anticipated a review of all Pensioner Concession Rebates is to be undertaken to ensure information is current on the shire system.

Rates outstanding - Debt Collection

Debt Collection costs to the Shire are recoverable under Local Government Act 1995 as per excerpt below from the Local Government Act (1995):

Rates or service charges recoverable in court

6.54. (1) If a rate of service charge remains unpaid after it becomes due and payable, the local government may recover it, as well as the costs of proceedings, if any, for that recovery, in a court of competent jurisdiction.

Debt collection costs can be more than \$1,000 so please, to avoid these costs, contact Rates Department to discuss options that may be available to you.

Difficulty in paying rates?

The shire understands that the last few years have been difficult for many people. If you are having difficulty in paying rates, please contact the shire to discuss Special Payment Arrangement.

Hello Boyup Brook

We are well and truly getting into the wet weather season and with the rain, early morning fog and smoke around at the moment there poses more risk on the roads. Whatever the posted speed is, please be careful and drive to the conditions presented. You do not have to travel at the speed limit if the weather diminishes visibility.

Please check that all your vehicle lights are in working order and use them to let other people know you are there. Similarly, check your tyre tread and make sure it's compliant.

When there are roadworks taking place within our shire, please be aware and abide by the change of speed zones.

During the Boyup Brook-Bridgetown Road upgrades. Police received many complaints of people not abiding by the posted speed limits. I know it's frustrating to drive at 60kms/hour, especially when you can't see any road workers around, but posted speeds are there for a reason.

Speeding infringements hurt the back pocket, and if you rack up too many demerits, you may lose your licence. To detail this:

\$100 fine 0-9 kms over =

10-19 kms over = \$200 fine and 2 demerit points

20-29 kms over = \$400 fine and 3 demerit points \$800 fine and 6 demerit points 30-40 kms over = 41-45 kms over = \$1200 fine and 7 demerit points

45 kms over = Reckless Driving - your vehicle will be

seized for 28 days and you will have to go to court.

To put this in to perspective, when road works have lowered the speed to 60kms, and you travel through at 100kms, you will be out \$800 or \$1200. If you have a lead foot normally and consistently drive over 100kms along this road, it is highly likely you will have your vehicle seized.

As always, stay safe and look out for each other.

Billabong Needs Our Help

Conserving a Place of special Memories

Nestled behind the old Railway Complex, a narrow gravel track leads down to one of Boyup Brooks hidden gems – the Kura Kartaga Langa Reserve. The seasonal wetland is not only an important feature of our town's history and culture but also home to many native mammals and birds, some of which rely on the isolation of our Shire's remnant bushland for survival.

Standing under the canopy of century old Rivergums and Wandoos you get the sense that this place holds a lot of special memories. The Kaniyang peoples of the Noongar Nation lived on these lands long before the arrival of the first settlers.

The reserve is the cradle of Boyup Brook's post-colonisations origin since first settlers arrived in the area in the very early 1900s and built huts on the banks of the Boyup Brook. The early settlement was so successful, its population even established a market garden to subsidise their diet of kangaroo with some familiar fresh European produce.

Once the Railway arrived in Boyup Brook in 1909 the Reserve was soon bustling with life; kids playing race cars in the bush and working men spending their well-deserved lunch break underneath the shady Swamp Paperbarks on the banks of the Brook.

The Kura Kartaga Langa Reserve is part of the world-renowned biodiversity hot spot: the South West. It is known for its plant diversity and large number of endemic plant species and communities and combined with it being the wettest area of the state, has resulted in an immense variety of wetlands.

Available with a wide range of enkinstreeservices.com But, being in the most populated area of the state, these wetlands have suffered the greatest impacts from clearing, agriculture and urban uses, leading to loss, fragmentation and degradation of previously pristine bush- and wetlands.

Considering the cultural and ecological importance of the reserve for our town and region the Blackwood Basin Group (BBG) has recognised that the Boyup Brook Billabong and Kura Kartaga Langa Reserve are in dire need of rehabilitation.

Thanks to grants from the State NRM and Highways and Byways, the BBG is able to provide knowledge, materials and equipment for the rehabilitation of the reserve. We would like to encourage the local community to come down and get involved, with the opportunity to learn about ecologically sensitive land management practices such as monitoring fauna, identifying and controlling weeds, plant and nurse native seedlings and preserving a piece of local heritage!

The management of the reserve and the Billabong will focus on the long-term restoration by controlling weeds, monitoring of flora and fauna, necessary in-fill planting, nesting box installations, effective fire management and building a relationship with the traditional owners to ensure the long-term health of the culturally significant site.


For a small fee of \$3, the images will be printed on 200GSM, gloss coated card using a laser printer in a maximum of 8x10 inches.

DFES - Storm Season Preparation

Time to clean your gutters and trim your trees – storms are on their way. Every year, storms, including rain, tornadoes, lightning, hail, flash flooding and gale force winds, cause major destruction across Western Australia. By preparing your property ahead of time, you can reduce the risk of damage.

Here are a few things you can do to prepare your home and families for storms:

- Trim branches around your home to prevent them falling on your roof or car.
- Clear gutters and downpipes so they do not overflow after heavy rain.
- Store or weigh down loose objects around your home or work, such as outdoor furniture and trampolines, that could be picked up and thrown by strong winds, causing damage or injury.

Prepare an emergency kit with a battery operated radio, torch, spare batteries and first aid kit.

Remember, if a storm has badly damaged your home and you can't safely fix it yourself, SES volunteers are there to help. If you need assistance call 132 500.

Recycle Your Beauty Product Packaging

The Boyup Brook CRC Recycling Hub is still being well utilised by many community members each week, but there are a few programs that are lesser known and receiving fewer items than others.

Two of these programs are provided by recycling giant Terracycle Australia and they are the Garnier Green Beauty Skincare packaging and the Schwarzkopf Cares Hair Care and Colour packaging streams.

Although provided by beauty manufacturer Garnier, the Skincare Packaging recycling stream accepts all brands of skincare products, see image below. The items included in this stream are all skincare plastic and glass packaging that includes flexible plastic (for example the packaging that face masks are packed in), bottle lids, pumps, tubes, caps and droppers.

Most of these items are not accepted into Boyup Brook's kerbside recycling program, but they do not need to go into waste either. Simply empty all of the contents left in your items, leave them to dry and then drop them into the CRC.



Just like with the skincare program, although the Hair Care and Colour packaging program is provided by Schwarzkopf, they accept all brands of this type of packaging.

The items you can recycle include hair care jars, lids, bottles, tubes, caps, pumps and stirrers; Latex, HDPE, Nitrile and PE gloves; hair colour (or dye) soft plastic pouches, bottles, tubes and caps, see image below.

For this stream, hair care products need to be completely dry and empty before dropping them into the CRC. For hair colour products, no dye can be left behind so they need to be emptied, triple rinsed and dry before drop off.

The Boyup Brook CRC is a collection point for Terracycle, and currently collect these two items and Writing Implements on behalf of the community for free. The Recycling Hub collects twelve items in total.

Live Lighter Winter Recipe

Healthy Sweet Potato Cheese Muffins

Ingredients

- olive or canola oil spray
- 1 1/2 cups self-raising flour
- 1/2 cup wholemeal self-raising flour
- 1/2 cup sweet potato, peeled and grated
- 2 tbs Parmesan cheese, grated
- 1/2 red capsicum, finely chopped
- 3 spring onions (including green tops), ends trimmed, chopped
- pepper, to taste
- 1 cup reduced-fat milk
- 2 eggs

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 200°C (180°C fan forced).
- 2. Lightly spray muffin tins with oil or line with paper cases.
- 3. Sift flours into a medium sized bowl, returning husk remaining in the sieve to the bowl.
- 4. Mix in sweet potato, cheese, capsicum, spring onion and pepper.
- 5. In a bowl, whisk milk and eggs together.
- 6. Add to dry ingredients and mix through until just combined.
- 7. Spoon into prepared muffin pan.
- 8. Bake for 25 minutes until muffins are firm and a knife inserted into the centre comes out clean.
- 9. Allow to cool in the tin for a few minutes then turn onto a wire rack

Hint: Muffins freeze well in snap-lock bags, but are best eaten on the day they are made.

Watch Out for Rogue Removalists

Moving house is widely considered to be one of life's most stressful events, so we always urge consumers to choose their removalist carefully to avoid any extra drama on the day.

Consumer Protection has recently received a growing number of complaints about the conduct of removalists advertising on social media. Initially the trader quotes an hourly rate and requests a small deposit, however upon arrival they demand a large lump sum be paid up front with a promise to return any unused money once the job is complete.

In some cases, the traders have refused to return or deliver the furniture until the higher fees have been paid. Neither are the promised refunds forthcoming and belongings are often damaged during the move for which a remedy is never provided.

Damage to property accounted for just over half of the 262 complaints we received about removalists in the past 18 months. Disagreements over costs was another top issue, along with removal trucks turning up late.

Consumers are urged to be wary when sourcing removalists on social media, as they may be using someone else's ABN to appear legitimate. It can also be tricky to identify the individual behind a business that is only advertised on social media, meaning consumers may struggle to enforce their rights should they wish to pursue legal action.

When sourcing a removalist, we recommend giving preference to removalists that are members of the *Australian Furniture Removals Association* or get recommendations from family and friends.

It is best to make sure all the details are worked out and agreed to before the move. Consumers should get a proposal on company letterhead that contains a copy of the terms and conditions and clearly sets out an hourly rate or a fixed price for the job.

Like other traders, removalists must exercise due care and skill by doing all they can to prevent damage or loss, and the consumer has the right to claim compensation if they fail to do this

'Dying to Live'


This DVD is in our collection at the library which continues to grow rapidly, with more shelving and publications of fiction and non-fiction for all ages.

Reducing the Risk of COVID Infection

COVID-19 cases are increasing in the Western Australian community, and new variants are leading to more reinfections for people who have already had COVID-19.

Since the Omicron variant reached WA months ago, the dominant subvariant was BA.2. However, most new cases in the Western Australian community today are being recognised as either Omicron BA.4 or BA.5. The BA.4 and BA.5 subvariants are considered more contagious than earlier variants due to their increased ability to infect people who have been infected previously.

With cold and flu also circulating in the community, it's important to protect yourself and your family from serious illness.

Here are four easy steps you can take to reduce your risk of getting COVID-19:

- 1) Wearing a mask indoors is strongly encouraged, particularly in crowded places where it's harder to physically distance.
- 2) Stay up to date with both the flu and COVID-19 vaccines. A fourth dose of the COVID-19 vaccine is encouraged for everyone aged 30 years and over. If you've already had COVID -19, it's recommended you wait 3 months post-infection before getting your next dose.
- Get tested if you feel unwell. Remember if you've already had COVID-19, you still need to test again if you have symptoms once it's been more than 28 days since you recovered.
- 4) Keep up good hygiene habits such as washing and sanitising your hands regularly.



Be Still and Know..... God

An Apology That Works

If you have sinned, you should tell each other what you have done. Then you can pray for one another and be healed.' James 5:16

A genuine apology can help heal and restore a strained or broken relationship. But as Dr Gary Chapman tells us, it doesn't end there. Observe these:

- (1) Saying 'I'm sorry' isn't enough! It's a good and necessary start, but it's not a good finish. For example, 'I'm sorry you took it that way' isn't an apology; it's a covert attack! You need to specifically confess what you're remorseful about. 'I'm so sorry that what I said insulted you' acknowledges what you did and affirms the wounded person.
- (2) Take full responsibility for your behaviour. Without that, there is no healing or reconciliation. 'I was wrong to speak to you like that' is honest, humble, concrete, and responsible. It helps the injured party see your apology as genuine. Genuineness diminishes anger and encourages others to trust and accept your words.
- (3) Offer to make amends where possible. Ask, 'Is there anything I can do to make things better?' Putting yourself on the line to do everything you can do makes your apology heartfelt and sincere. James puts it like this: 'Tell each other what you have done. Then you can pray for one another and be healed.'
- (4) Ask for forgiveness—don't take it for granted. 'Will you please forgive me for what I did?' You need to say it and the other person needs to hear it before healing and restoration can start. When you ask for forgiveness and it's been granted, you have 'signed on the dotted line' together. You're recording your mutual commitment to move beyond the hurt and work towards a healthier relationship.




