
My Inbox....

Sandakan Park

The Shire is investigating the potential development of Sandakan Park, with 'Request for Quotation' currently open to interested consultants to provide a preliminary design and layout. This should see the the entire park renovated into a green community space which will incorporate the Sandakan Park Playground.



Sandakan Playground

Following a call to the community a working group has been formed to guide the development of the Sandakan Park Playground. The first meeting of the working group was held on 15 November 2023 to discuss the preliminary designs received by Council. The Shire is anticipating that phase 1 of the playground will commence in 2024.



Independent Living Units

In 2022 the Shire acquired some land on Bridge Street near the hospital with the intention of developing the land with Independent Living Units. A 'Request for Quotation' is currently open for the preparation of preliminary feasibility and design drawings. The preliminary designs will potentially be presented to the community in early 2024.

Evacuation Centre

The Shire was successful in obtaining an \$800,000 grant which will be matched by the Shire to renovate the current club rooms to enable it to be used as an evacuation centre. A 'Request for Quotation' is currently open for the design phase of the building. It is anticipated that a consultant will be appointed by the end of the year.



Boyup Brook Oval Reticulation Upgrade

The reticulation upgrade on the oval has been completed with only some minor matters that are being rectified. There will be additional reticulation works to the Hockey field.



Recreation Precinct Master Plan

With the renovation of the club building resulting in the building being the focal point, the Shire has engaged a consultant to look at amending the existing master plan. The new master plan will take into consideration the need for all clubs to have access to the club building and will also be planning for new indoor multi-use courts.

BUSHFIRE READY?

Firebreaks must be installed by 30 November and kept as bare earth, 3m wide and clear 4m above the ground. Firebreaks serve three main purposes:

- · Stop low intensity fires from spreading.
- · Allow entry for firefighting vehicles.
- · Provides for back burning to take place to control a fire.

It is essential that firebreaks are maintained to the specified requirements throughout the bush fire season for your safety and the safety of Volunteer Fire Fighters protecting our community. For a full copy of the Firebreak Notice visit the Shire's website www.boyupbrook.wa.gov.au



Mobile fire units are now required for all slashing and harvesting up until 15 April 2024 (dates subject to change depending on weather conditions).

This includes slashing of high grass in residential areas but does not include maintaining/mowing green reticulated residential lawns that have a running water source that can reach the area. It is the responsibility of the landholder to supply the unit.

Rylington Park Institute for Agricultural Training and Research (Rylington Park) is located in Mayanup, 27km from Boyup Brook town site on the Boyup Brook – Cranbrook Road. The 650-hectare property was gifted to the Shire of Boyup Brook in 1985 by the late Mr Eric Farleigh for Research and Training in Agriculture and the betterment of Boyup Brook.

The property is managed by the Shire of Boyup who employ staff to operate the farm, hosts shearing schools, workshops and coordinate fertiliser and seed trials on the property. The Australian Wool Innovation (AWI) provide financial support for Rylington Park to hosts shearing and wool classing schools annually. These training schools attract youth interested in shearing or sheep handling professions, which is important for the sustainability of the Sheep industry.

It also hosts field days each year, which include 'Storm in a Teacup' Women's Day in March and Annual Field Day in September.

Rylington Park provides financial support to youth in Boyup Brook who are considering a future in agriculture, by granting scholarships to students attending Agriculture Schools in Year 11 and 12.

With interchangeable fittings allowing for all vehicle types, the two 50,000 litre water tanks have the ability to fill six vehicles at the same time, with a recent exercise filling a 2000 litre fire truck in just 90 seconds. The secret to the success of the project is the overall design. The site of the tanks is sloped to ensure clear vision, easy access for all vehicle types and has a dam dedicated to filling the tanks, ensuring they stay filled and ready to use.

The tanks, located in Dinninup, have the capacity to be templated for future use not only in Boyup Brook but also in surrounding communities and Australia wide.





Whether you like it or not, as a woman, your body will go through age-related changes as a result of declining hormone levels; first perimenopause, then the menopause – no exceptions!


A few unicorns go through this period of their life with ease, for others it's nightmarish, and most of us fall somewhere in between.





In Touch Farming

What rate of fertiliser should I apply per DSE (Dry Stock Equivalent)?

With the current state of the cattle and sheep markets being, the first reaction is to cut back on pasture fertiliser inputs to save money. Is this the right course of action or will this be detrimental to productivity in 2024/2025 when prices lift?

Every indication is that the downturn of the cattle and sheep prices we are seeing now, will turn around in the next 12-18 months and come back up to a more profitable level.

If we concentrate on Super Phosphate for this exercise you need to apply one unit of P per DSE run. For example, if you are running 12 DSE which is around the norm for most farmers in the district then you will require the following:

Super Phos - 12 DSE = 135kg per ha Super Potash 5:1 - 12 DSE = 160kg per ha Super Potash 4:1 – 12 DSE = 165kg per ha Super Potash 3:1 – 12 DSE = 180kg per ha

Your choice will be dependent on the potash levels after soil testing.

Also bear in mind that Muriate of Potash has been extremely expensive in the last three years and has been left out of a lot of pasture fertiliser applications, so this may be the year to bring it back in, as the price is around half of what it was 12-18 month ago. I have been seeing potash levels decline in the last two years in a lot of pasture soil tests.

The other thing to consider when making your fertiliser choices for the 2024 season is the availability of the applied fertiliser in that season. The fertiliser that you apply for that year is only 50% available with 25% available the following year then 10% the year after and so on.

For example, if the P levels in your soil are low and you forgo fertiliser in 2024, then you apply 100kg of Super Phos in 2025 (Super Phos is 9.1 units of P per 100kg applied). That will give you an available 4.55 units of P in that season which will run 4.55 DSE, if you are running 12 DSE that is a shortfall of 7.45 units of P.

Selenium. Don't forget to add it to your pasture fertiliser. Selenium deficiency could be costing you as much as 10-20% in production.

There has been a lot of talk about clients not joining their maiden ewes and running them dry for the 2024 season due to not being able to move cull stock on and the lower prices for sale stock. One thing to consider would be to go through all mobs of breeders, be they cattle or sheep, and cull all underperforming animals and run them dry if they can't be moved on. This will then give you a higher performing flock/herd going into 2025.

Always remember that your maiden ewes or your heifers are where your newest and most improved genetics are, and this is where your flock/herd improvement will come from.

Building Community Resilience

South West NRM is launching a new project designed to connect communities ahead of a predicted increase in drought events.

Amidst growing awareness of the heavy socio-economic impact of drought on entire communities, a Community Resilience Network will improve capability and collaboration between organisations and groups to reduce harm.

To build the network community leaders and volunteers are being sought in six South West shires to participate in local working groups that will champion resilience building and support services.

South West NRM Manager Sustainable Agriculture Peter Clifton said the aim of the groups will be to:



Christmas - Food for Thought

For many of us, Christmas is a time to celebrate the birth of Christ. It is also a time for feasting and parties, often related to over-consumption or over-catering of food.

More than any other time of the year, Christmas is the time of the greatest food waste. It is estimated that the average household wastes food amounting to \$2,000 annually. Prior to Christmas, there is a tendency to stock up the pantry and refrigerator, only to find that after Christmas, some of the food left is beyond a safe 'use by' date.

Rebecca Gilling CEO of Planet Ark says: "Up to half of what the average household sends to landfill is made up of food organics, this has a negative impact not only on the hip pocket but also on our greenhouse gas emissions".

The WA Government is encouraging Local Governments to provide their communities with a FO-GO (food organics-garden organics) kerbside service. Residents may also create their own composting scheme with food and garden wastes appropriately being converted to compost as a soil structure improver.

For many years, the WA Government has imposed a 'landfill levy' on wastes going to Perth metro landfills; this is currently \$80 a tonne above any local landfill charges. The Government is considering extending the 'landfill levy' to rural communities. This is another good reason to minimise wastes and maximise recycling, including composting.

This man is active still



How the Police Came to Be in Boyup Brook

The following notes were extracted from 'Early Boyup Brook Police History, Upper Blackwood' by Don Wiggerman and 'History of the Upper Blackwood' by A. Schorer.

Prior to 1911, Boyup Brook was patrolled by Police from Bunbury and Bridgetown. In 1911 Constable Charles Joseph Hince Brown was stationed at Boyup Brook. On 20th March, Const. Brown was accompanied by Inspector Mitchell and together they selected a site for the Station,13 Bridge Street (about where the IGA now stands). Const. Buckley was sent from Bridgetown to assist. All materials had to be carried from the Railway Station by hand to the site.

Iron trunks containing all the official property were sent by train but when the time came to install them in the office tent it was discovered that the keys had not been included so a telegram had to be sent for them. Prior to the erection of the lock-ups, prisoners were chained to trees. (DW)

On the 27th September 1911, the Upper Blackwood Progress Association wrote to the Commissioner of Police which in part read: "Sir, I am directed by a special meeting of the above Association on the 23rd September inst. to advise that Sub Inspector Mitchellintimated that the present Police camp was quite suitable and quite as good as some other places and also suggested the probable removal of Police all together from Boyup Brook.

"Now Sir, I would respectfully point out the present camp is quite objectionable from several points of view: Unsanitary and indecent; Depreciates property in the immediate vicinity; That the idea of removing the Police from Boyup Brook would make the town intolerable to live in now that there is a hotel; That the fact that other camps have similar conditions is no recommendation.

That we should suffer in a like manner is certainly no credit to the general management. Finally my Association respectfully asks that the Police be permanently established in Boyup, and also that suitable and substantial buildings be erected for office, prisoners and horse with proper sanitary arrangements."

Two years later (1913) Const. Brown gave up his tent home and office and moved into the new building. He married local Marie Kaufman and his descendants still live in Boyup Brook. (AS)

A new Police Station and Court House was built next door in 1955 and the brick building was opened in 1964 as the Court House. Later, when Court cases in Boyup ceased, the brick building became the Police Station. Local identity, Bill Hack tells the story that 'I spent one night in a cell there.' "I was starting work the next day at the Abattoirs, the year was about 1972-3, Miss Fuller (Boyup Brook Guest House manager) said, 'No beds available 'till tomorrow' and someone suggested the I try the lock-up. The Police were happy to oblige."

The combined churches Carols Service will be held at St Saviours on Saturday, December 17 at 6.00pm. Always a beautiful service with all the churches participating - readings and lots of singing! A great time to socialise with supper afterwards.

Then there will be a Christmas Service on Christmas Eve at 6pm. Yes! Supper will be available but probably only tea/coffee and cake- got to save some space for Christmas Dinner! Please note - there will not be a service at St Saviours on December 31st.

With the changing church seasons, the Prayer Tree will be decked with Advent/Christmas messages. It is certainly a time to wish everyone well and celebrate the birth of Jesus but for those people who struggle financially, suffer ill-health and the loss of loved ones, your prayers are extra special.

Please remember to keep those living (barely) under war conditions in Gaza in your prayers – such a tragic position to be in during the time of the greatest celebration of our Christian churches. May goodwill prevail and hostilities cease.

Dear Jesus.

So long ago your humble birth brought peace and love to all. For ever after, we lift our voices and declare your goodness. We praise you and dance in your glory.

May it always be so. Amen

What is Christmas all about?

'Nothing in all creation can separate us from God's love.' Romans 8:39 CEV

That first Christmas, God did something extraordinary. Max Lucado puts it this way: 'Stepping from the throne, He removed His robe of light and wrapped Himself in human skin. He whom angels worshipped was birthed into the cold night, and then slept on cow's hay. Mary didn't know whether to give Him milk or give Him praise, so she gave Him both - since He was hungry and holy. Joseph didn't know whether to call Him junior or father. But in the end, he called Him Jesus, since that's what the angel said, and since he didn't have the faintest idea what to name a God he could cradle in his arms.'

Lucado continues: 'Don't you think their heads tilted and their minds wondered, "What in the world are You doing, God?" Or better phrased, "God, what are You doing in the world?" "Can anything make Me stop loving you?" God asks. "You wonder how long My love will last? Find your answer on a splintered cross, on a craggy hill. That's Me you see up there, your Maker, your God... That's how much I love you."

Paul asks, 'Can anything separate us from the love of Christ?' (Romans 8:35 CEV) Then he answers his own question: 'Nothing can separate us from God's love - not life or death, not angels or spirits, not the present or the future, and not powers above or powers below. Nothing in all creation can separate us from God's love.' (Romans 8:38–39 CEV) And that's what Christmas is all about.
