Selfless Contributions Recognised

The Shire of Boyup Brook's community celebrations for Australia Day were attended by a large crowd. After the flag raising ceremony, Shire Councillors and staff served a breakfast feast. After a special audio presentation of a poem, Councillor Darren King announced the recipients of the Shire's annual awards.

The recipient of the Kevin Henderson Memorial Award, which is presented to an individual who has shown outstanding service to the community as a volunteer for a period exceeding five years, was Lee Holland.

Lee's dedication to sport and community includes being the cofounder of the Boyup Brook Working Horse Club and the Best of the West Stockman's challenge event, and she is an active member and current Secretary of the Mayanup Progress Association. Lee was also a key driver behind the 'head-shaving' events in 2022 that led to over \$40,000 being raised for Ronald McDonald House, of which she is very proud, but was also quick to praise the community for its support of the cause.

Friend and partner of the man whom the award was named after, Jo Melville, said of Lee's award, "Kev would be really happy".

Mick Burgess is a respected and active volunteer in the community and for this, was awarded the 2023 Citizen of the Year.

Since moving to the Shire fifteen years ago, Mick has dedicated himself to helping others in our community. As a member and President of the Lions Club, he has an enthusiastic commitment to the Containers for Change program. Along with spending most weekends at the transfer station, setting up Medic Alerts for the elderly, driving the Lions Bus, coordinating the Pumpkin Festival, organising Lions Christmas cakes and helping with maintenance of the Lions Park, he always has a spare moment to lend a hand to others in need, or stop for a friendly chat.

Mick was lost for words on receiving his Award, but did pass on his thanks to all current and past Lions members for their support.

Community-Based Care Plans Progressing

Following on from last month's article, there is momentum building to create a local, community-based care program for Boyup Brook.

This model is working in other small communities around Australia and is achieving tangible outcomes for the ageing, people with disability, or anyone requiring support to carry out their day to day tasks.

An information session for potential support workers was held on January 18 and was very well attended. Participants were enthusiastic about the prospects of providing assistance in the community, and their willingness to get on board was exciting.

The role of an independent support worker is perfect for people who are looking for as few, or as many hours, work per week as they wish, at times that suit their individual availability.

Support may be in the form of gardening, cleaning, transport, shopping, cooking, maintenance duties and social activities, without any formal qualifications. The only requirement is an ABN, a 'Mable' Police Clearance and references. 'Mable', the employment support agency, will guide the worker through the registration process, conducting background, qualification checks etc and will organise insurance on the worker's behalf.

Personal care and nursing support workers are required to have additional qualifications, as well as the items listed above. 'Mable' also offers training opportunities for registered support providers.

For community members who may need some support, this model will enable you to be in control of the decision making about who provides the care.

The basic concept is that community members who have been assessed for, or are on a Home Care Package (HCP) register with an approved home care provider and engage a local, independent support worker who is registered with 'Mable'.

Even if you are not on My Aged Care, or NDIS, this service may also be available for other community members as a private client.

There will be an information session for people who may be interested in accessing these support services in the future, or are currently on a home care package, and their family members, at the Boyup Brook Club Function Room on Wednesday, February 8 from 10:30am-11:30am. Are You Bush Fire Ready?

90% of WA is bushfire prone. Bushfires are dangerous and happen every year. The single biggest killer is indecision. What will you do if there is a bushfire near you? A bushfire plan can help you and your family stay safe and only takes approximately 15 minutes.

Some tips for preparing your property:

- 1. Clean your gutters
- 2. Don't have a wood pile, mulch or flammable items close to your house
- 3. Cut back branches that overhang your house, sheds, or carport. (a 2mtr gap is recommended)
- 4. Remove dead branches, leaf piles and foliage
- 5. Keep grass and lawns to 10cm max height
- 6. Replace woodchips at the base of your home with brick pavers

- 7. Block gaps and holes in roof spaces, under eaves and under timber decking
- 8. Ensure you have a fire evacuation plan, that you have practised it and are prepared to activate it

You can make things easier for yourself in an emergency if you:

- Have well placed vegetation and trees with low flammability which can help reduce radiant heat coming towards buildings and reduce the wind speed. Some native plants may be highly combustible. It is not wise to plant these plants close to buildings.
- If the worst was to happen, is your insurance fire-proof? Ensure that your insured amount still covers the current value of your house and contents. Make sure you are covered for unexpected costs like, demolition, asbestos removal, fencing and smoke damage.

On a "catastrophic or extreme" fire rated day in your area, your bush fire plan should activate quickly and without hesitation.

- Check escape routes and have an alternative for last minute changes, such as road closures, traffic etc. Practice the escape routes and have them timed. Check surroundings on the route for potential hazards and make a note of them. Note alternative destinations and work out where you will go if you are required to evacuate.
- Check your evacuation kit is up to date. Items such as a portable radio and batteries, phone charger, torch, suitable loose fitting cotton clothing, sturdy boots, first aid kit and water should make up the basics of your kit.
- 3. Consider your animals and their welfare in your bushfire plan. Opening gates and letting animals roam free can cause traffic incidents and issues, please refrain from doing this. Ensure you have a plan ready to move large animals and you have allowed for time and possible road closures. Ensure you can fit small animals and carriers in your vehicle along with your other valued items. If you are worried about where you can go with your animals when you leave, contact your Ranger for assistance once you have safely evacuated and arrived at your destination

The Shire

That's Your Shire, Our Shire.

Our Shire is not flush with cash, although our finances are sound and we have minimal debt and some specified purpose reserves.

Our Shire (Our Community) relies very much on Grants from various sources including State and Federal Government Agencies and Lotteries Commission for community projects.

Also, much of our road works are externally funded.

It is not the responsibility of our Shire Grants Officer alone to seek and secure grants (possibly available and often at relatively short notice) for the benefit of our community.

We are all responsible for fund raising including under the CSRFF model whereby Grants contribute 1/3, Our Shire 1/3 and community groups 1/3. Our Shire has limited funds to meet the 1/3 contribution with rates being the primary source of local funds. Rates are used almost entirely on day to day operations.

Fundraising by community groups is a cornerstone of the CSRFF model for grant applications.

A key factor for successful grant applications is Project Planning and this must be prepared and paid for well in advance so projects may be "shovel ready" when grant opportunities become available.

Your, Our Shire Staff and Council work very hard to achieve the very best they can with the available resources for our community.

More than that, we need our whole community working together, looking after the facilities we have and raising funds for new or improved facilities – again Our Shire will need to find matching funds.

Your positive engagement with each other, with Our Shire CEO and with Council, will benefit the whole community.



Little Birds with a Big Appetite

One of our smallest birds, the Striated Pardalote often flies under the radar due to its preference for feeding high up in the tree canopy where it is more often heard than seen.

When you do get the opportunity to watch them in action it's mesmerizing. Darting from leaf to leaf, hanging upside down like little acrobats as they pick lerps and insects from the underside of the Eucalypt leaves.

Wandoo are a favourite habitat tree for these little insectivorous birds thanks to the abundance of small hollows that Wandoo produces, though they will also nest in tunnels dug into the side of sandy banks.

Pardalote are regarded as a good indicator species for healthy bushland in agricultural areas like Boyup Brook. Insectivorous birds are estimated to consume up to 60% of insects in

woodland forests, and in residential areas that translates to some pretty serious pest control for your gardens and crops.

So next time you're out amongst a stand of tall eucalypts, take a moment to stare up into the canopy and see if you can spot one of these beautiful little Pardalotes darting between the leaves.

The Awards were first held in 1986, along with the first ever Boyup Brook Country Music Festival and play a key role in developing and promoting Australian country music.




COMMUNITY CELEBRATIONS



Heat-Related Illness - Signs, Symptoms and Treatment

In very hot weather, you can get burnt from contact with the hot ground in seconds. If someone has collapsed outdoors, try to place something between them and the hot ground (like a towel or blanket) to prevent burns, or if safe to do so - move them into the shade or onto the grass.

Early signs of dehydration and heat-related illness can include sweating heavily, having a raised body temperature, feeling dizzy or faint, feeling tired and lethargic, reduced appetite, feeling thirsty, being irritable or having painful muscle cramps in the arms, legs or abdomen.

If you or someone you know is showing these signs and feeling unwell:

- stop what you are doing, go to a cool, shaded place and lie down
- drink plenty of water or other fluids, avoiding caffeine and alcohol
- try to cool down with a fan or an air-conditioner, a cool damp towel around your neck, cool water sprayed on your skin or by having a cool shower or bath
- use massage to ease any spasms or cramps, then use ice packs under the arms and in the groin area.
- if still unwell after taking these steps call 000.

More serious heat-related illnesses is heatstroke.

Heatstroke is a severe illness where a person's temperature is greater than 40°C, and the person is experiencing delirium (confusion), convulsions, or coma, resulting from exposure to high heat or strenuous physical exercise.

The signs and symptoms of heatstroke include, headache, dizziness, nausea, vomiting and confusion, having flushed, hot and unusually dry skin, being extremely thirsty, having a dry, swollen tongue, having a sudden rise in body temperature to more than 40°C, being disoriented or delirious, slurred speech, being aggressive or behaving strangely, convulsions, seizures, skin may feel deceptively cool or rapid pulse.

Emergency treatment for heatstroke:

If you notice any of the above signs of heatstroke in yourself or others, call 000 immediately for an ambulance.

- if possible, move the person to somewhere cool and keep them still
- loosen their clothes, sprinkle them with cool water, or wrap them in a damp sheet
- place cool, damp cloths in their armpits, on the back of their neck and on their forehead to cool them down as quickly as possible
- use a fan to help cool them down if one is available
- do not give aspirin or paracetamol to a person affected by heat.
- do not cool them to much as this can cause hypothermia.

If the person is conscious:

- try to keep them calm
- give them small sips of water or fruit juice stay with them until the ambulance arrives.

If the person is unconscious:

- check their airway is clear
- monitor their pulse rate
- stay with them until the ambulance arrives

Be Skin Aware This Summer



Cancer Council WA is encouraging adults in the South West region to familiarise themselves with the common symptoms of skin cancer, with the majority (55-70%) of melanoma's detected by themselves or their partners.

South West Regional Education Officer, Julie Rose, said it was important to know your skin and what is normal for you, particularly if you are over 40 year of age.

"Skin cancers (including melanoma) account for the largest number of cancers diagnosed in Australia each year," Ms Rose said. "Our latest data reveals that in 2019, 1587 people in WA were diagnosed with melanoma and sadly 145 people died from it. In the SW region in 2019, 162 people were diagnosed with melanoma, with 14 deaths."

"We know people living in regional Australia have lower rates of five year survival, compared with people living in our larger cities, so we urge anyone in the SW experiencing a skin cancer symptom to visit their doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker."

Common symptoms of skin cancer include:

- A new spot or mole on your skin
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape over a period of weeks to months.


If you notice any of these symptoms or any unusual changes, tell your doctor, clinic nurse of aboriginal health worker.

It doesn't mean you've got skin cancer – often it turns out to be something less serious. But it is important to get checked. Getting our symptoms checked out and treated early means we can get back to the people we love and the things we enjoy doing.

From the Baseline

The Boyup Brook Tennis Club recently lost one of its valued Life Members, Jan Harris, and fellow Life Member, Bill Gordon shared a few memories:

"Jan's great love apart from her family and farm was the Boyup Brook Tennis Club. She loved playing tennis and was a stalwart of the Tennis Club.

She served as Secretary for two years shortly after leaving school, and another four years later on, then Ladies Captain in 1985-86. Jan was the first female President in 1994 and was awarded a Life Membership that same year. She coordinated the popular ladies mid-week pennants for 18 years. There were a host of other things Jan did for the Tennis Club, many unnoticed and unsung.

Jan hated double faults. Jan's serve was remembered last week at tennis. Her style could best be described as "stand and deliver". With her feet firmly planted behind the baseline, the ball was straight up and came down straight at you, flat and firm. And if the first serve did not go in, look out because the second was on its way before the first ball was past you.

Jan was nearly always the first to arrive at tennis and she aimed to have the nets up, ready for play, before everyone else got there. Mike Lloyd was a little tacker when his mother was Captain. He recalled how Jan would load the wheelbarrow with twelve nets and Mike had to keep up with her, struggling to push the overloaded barrow, while Jan set up the nets.

Jan was never one to miss a busy bee, and would often be found on the courts, screwdriver in hand, digging out winter grass and any other weeds invading the playing surface. Marking out the courts at the start of each season, helping or organising in the kitchen, whatever needed doing Jan was always there."

Rest in Peace Jan.

The Tennis Club would like to thank the current and former members who formed the Guard of Honour at Jan's funeral and for all of those who contributed to the catering for the wake.
