### **Country Music Awards Streamed Live**

On Saturday, June 11 at 7pm this year's West Australian Country Music Awards night was streamed live from the Boyup Brook Town Hall.

Organised by the Country Music Club and presented by LiveLighter, the virtual awards offered a chance to celebrate excellence amongst the states country music artists.

The Awards have been traditionally incorporated into the Boyup Brook Country Music Festival, but as it was cancelled again in 2022, the Club worked hard to plan the awards night under a different process.

President Daly Winter said, "We would like to recognise and honour the extraordinary achievements of our West Australian country music artists, who in these especially difficult and trying times have shown incredible spirit, dedication and commitment to the country music industry here in WA."

Finalists and winners of 10 categories were recognised for their outstanding achievements with the presentation of the new Golden Guitar Belt Buckle award certificates handed out to the winners on the night.

Music Director Donna Forsyth, who was also the night's emcee said, "I am so proud to be a part of this event. The calibre of talent from Western Australia is outstanding. Over the years I have seen many people take the leap with their music to a new professional level and gain the recognition they deserve."



### One artist in particular stood out on the night, taking away four awards, Eaton's Codee-Lee, pictured bottom left, received Single of the Year, EP of the Year, Songwriter of the Year and the prestigious People's Choice Award.

Kate Hindle from Collie, pictured bottom right, went home with two awards: Emerging Artist of the Year and Female Artist of the Year and Charlee Jones from Bunbury won the Junior Vocalist of the Year.

Mike Goodwin from Margaret River was joined by his wife Angela to receive the Video Clip of the Year Award with the animated video clip called 'Sugarcane' live streamed after the award was accepted.

Male Artist of the Year was won by the troubadour himself, Chris Matthews who spends most of his time performing around the Kimberley's. The Album of the Year and Best Group of the Year was awarded to The Little Lord Street Band from Eden Hill.

The night included performances by Ray Jones who was also a nominee for Album of the Year, Codee-Lee sang her award winning song 'Who I am' and Kate Hindle and Chris Matthews also performed acoustic songs for the event.

After the livestream concluded, the night finished on a fantastic note for those who attended the awards ceremony at the town hall, with a big jam session incorporating some finalists and winners.

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### **DFES - Home Fire Safety**

A fire in your home can be devastating, even fatal. It can take just seconds for a fire to take hold and can engulf a whole house within five minutes. Common causes of home fires include: Unattended cooking, unattended candles and oil burners, electrical faults, overloaded and faulty power boards, chimney flues that haven't been cleaned, curious children using lighters and matches.

West Australians are urged to not leave e-Rideables (scooters, bikes) and other household items containing lithium-ion batteries charging overnight or when they are not at home due to their potential to overheat and cause devastating home fires. A growing cause of home fires are devices left to charge on beds, couches and other fabrics.

Batteries can overheat when left on charge or when they are faulty. Once the battery explodes, it can end up metres from where it was charging and a small fire can spread quickly engulfing an entire home in just minutes.

Fire investigators are seeing a rise in the number of fires caused by lithium-ion batteries where the home has either been significantly damaged or completely destroyed.

Here are a few things you can do to protect you and your home from a house fire:

- Check electrical items and cords for signs of wear and tear before using them. Don't use damaged or dented equipment.
- Never leave batteries charging when no one is home, or in unsupervised areas such as garages.


- Make sure when charging batteries they are placed on a hard surface, and are not left charging on bedding, couches, carpets or clothing.
- Don't leave batteries charging once they have reached 100% as they can overheat.
- Take care when purchasing batteries or devices online or second-hand. Replacement batteries and electrical cords should only be purchased from reputable companies.
- Batteries are classed as hazardous waste and should never be placed in your kerbside bins. You can find your nearest battery recycling bin by contacting your local government or visiting recycleright.wa.gov.au.

If a fire does start in your home and you can't put it out safely:

- o Evacuate immediately
- o Crawl low under smoke
- o Put your escape plan into action
- o Go to your identified safe meeting place
- o Phone 000 (triple zero)
- Do not enter a burning house for any reason and wait for firefighers to arrive

So, don't leave batteries charging when you're not home and create and practise your home fire escape plan this winter. Plenty of information about the above points is available on the DFES website, including what to think about when creating your home fire escape plan.

### Launch of Rylington Park partnership with ECU: Boyup Brook to play key role in solving real-world agricultural problems through innovative research

On Wednesday 1st June a new partnership was launched at Rylington Park between the Shire of Boyup Brook and Edith Cowan University (ECU) following the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between the Shire and ECU last October.

More than 75 people attended the launch, including David and Brian Farleigh, grandsons of the late Eric Farleigh who's vision for Rylington Park to play an important and long lasting role in agricultural training and research saw him donate the family's Rylington Park farm to the Boyup Brook Shire in 1985.

Also gathered were key State and Federal Government representatives Jane Kelsbie MLA, Member for Warren Blackwood, Dr Steve Thomas MLC, Member for South West Region, Hon Nola Marino MP, Member for Forrest.

Boyup Brook local Rhonda Parker MC'd the launch, and an acknowledgement of Country delivered by former Boyup Brook resident Noel Smith.

Jane Kelsbie MLA, spoke on behalf of WA Agriculture Minister Alannah MacTiernan who was unable to attend, and highlighted the future benefits this partnership could yield for the wider agricultural community, particularly in relation to research into sustainable agricultural practices

Shire of Boyup Brook Shire President Richard Walker spoke about the many opportunities the partnership presents for the agricultural sector, and also the benefits that will flow on to the wider Boyup Brook Community.

Shire of Boyup Brook CEO Dr Dale Putland highlighted how the 20-year agreement between ECU and the Shire creates a historic partnership that fulfils the vison by Eric Farleigh for Rylington Park.

ECU Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Regional Futures) Professor Cobie Rudd explained to the crowd how the partnership will hopefully deliver research and trials into the use of smart farm technology and further advancements in farm automation. Professor Rudd also spoke about the potential for the partnership to facilitate career opportunities through nonuniversity study pathways for secondary school students.

Attendees admired a display of local produce including wine from Beulah Wines, gourmet food products from Dinninup Grove and Grindon Graziers, and Ginan Kavalam Estate Turmeric Powder.

Hello Boyup Brook residents,

With the school holidays upon us, if you're planning a trip, it's a timely reminder to make sure you secure your vehicles and property before you leave. Ask your friendly neighbours to keep an eye out for you and to report any suspicious behaviour. You might also want to look into some basic CCTV for peace of mind, it might be cheaper than you think!

There have been ongoing issues recently regarding the Emergency Access track between Kaufmann Close and Banks Road. This track is shire land and designated by the Planning Commission as emergency access only.

It is not classified as a road. It is secured by double farm gates at each end and as the name suggests, is only accessible in emergency situations.

- Use of this track outside of these parameters constitutes a Trespass offence.
- Cutting the locks or wire keeping the gates shut constitutes a Criminal Damage offence.
- Taking the locks, chains or gates themselves constitutes a Stealing offence.

All of these offences will be investigated by police and they are arrestable! You may receive a fine of \$500 or a court notice to see the local Magistrate and a criminal record.

As always, stay alert and safe on the roads and pay special attention during this holiday period.





Starting off in the school holidays, local artist Ally Kerr will be back at the CRC hosting a craft activity that will transform discarded plastic rubbish and other items into incredible art.

Children of all ages are invited to attend the session taking place on Thursday, July 7 from 10am-12pm. The cost is \$5 per child or \$3 for CRC Members (Family category). For children under the age of five, it is requested a parent/guardian comes along.

The next stop, will be a Plastic Free Morning Tea that will take place on Wednesday, July 13 from 10:30-11:30am with interested guests also invited to stay behind to watch an episode of the War on Waste afterwards.

This event will differ from last years Plastic Free Morning Tea, where PFJ founder Rebecca Prince-Ruiz treated more than 50 locals to a presentation about the issues we are facing due to single-use plastic pollution and a morning tea catered by the resource centre.

Instead, this year attendees are invited to whip up a favourite morning tea recipe of their own to share, created and brought to the CRC without the use of any single-use plastics. During the morning tea there will be discussions about the plastic problem and solutions people have found to avoid it. 



### **Golden Feather Hunt**

As a part of the 2022 Scribblers Festival, the Boyup Brook Library is participating in the Golden Feather Hunt for the very first time.

Commencing at the start of the school holidays and running until September 16, feather shaped bookmarks will be scattered through the Children's, Junior Fiction and Young Adult sections of the library with the opportunity to win a variety of prizes.



### Getting to Know Gordon Doust

with Sharon Lampard



Gordon Doust was born in June, 1957 to parents Ron and Daphne Doust. He grew up on the family farm in Winnejup which was then known as Spring Hill, with his two younger sisters.

As with many farms of the time, it was multi-faceted, running sheep, orchards and dairy cows that they later switched to beef cattle when the Bridgetown butter factory closed down.

His father Ron was also a shearer and this kept him very busy, often spending long periods away from his family. Mother Daphne was a seasonal worker packing fruit and they always had work to do on their own farm. Gordon spent a lot of his childhood helping by chopping firewood, feeding the livestock and they also had ponies to look after.

Until Gordon was about 12, he also helped in the orchard by picking apples. He isn't sure if it was a chemical spray, or hay fever that caused him to start wheezing, but this meant he couldn't stay long picking the many varieties of apples they grew such as Yates, Jonathans, Granny Smiths, Red Delicious and Cleos.

Sometimes, when his parents were both working, Gordon remembers staying with his grandparents at their home 'May Cottage' in Bridgetown, which is now a heritage listed building.

His grandmother's family owned the property for many years and it also where his mother was born.

All of his schooling took place in Bridgetown where his favourite subject was outdoor education. In this class he learnt about building, enamelling, various other handyman tasks and welding in which he really excelled and was able to help teach his friends.

He left school with an achievement certificate and went straight into an apprenticeship at a mechanic workshop in Bridgetown. At 21 years old in 1978, upon completing his apprenticeship, Gordon found work at a Ford Dealership as a mechanic in Katanning. After twelve months there, he spent a period of time taking a series of short term contracts for mechanics that were short staffed. This work took him all over the state and as far as Karratha.

After a few jobs in between this, he received an offer to lease a service station workshop in Katanning. He took the work but in 1983, he was forced into a hard decision, "Every time I started to look like making money, they put the rent up or the lease went up. So I pulled the pin and came back to Bridgetown."

The move back saw him become heavily involved in the local sporting community. In 1983, he played in the Bridgetown Bulldogs football reserves side that took out the premiership. The following year he also got involved as a coach for the Under 19s side and it was also the year the league team won a premiership.

In October 1984, Gordon went to live out on a station in Fitzroy Crossing as the mechanic and in 1986 he also became the windmill mechanical bore man and helped train others.

Although he was still in the state of Western Australia, Gordon marvelled that he was further away from his home than some of the men he worked with, who had travelled interstate from Queensland.

Of Fitzroy Crossing he said it was a completely different lifestyle than down south, he said "It was toughen up, or get out."

He moved back to Bridgetown once again in 1987, and first worked at Yornup Mill until another mechanic job came up in Bridgetown. He then moved on to working at Whittaker's Timber Milling Company in Greenbushes.

He married his first wife in 1990 and they started a family, welcoming daughter Vanessa that same year and Alicia in 1992. In between their daughters, they very sadly lost a son at birth who they named Patrick James.

He said when his marriage 'disintegrated', he moved with full custody of his daughters to Boyup Brook in 1992, when the girls were only two years and five months old.

He was no stranger to the town, having played sport in Boyup Brook over the years, but he was astounded at the warm welcome he received so swiftly.

Within a week he had received a knock at his door as someone had heard that he was a decent dart player and one more week after that, he was a member of the local bowling club.

At home, he needed a lot of help to look after his young girls and he soon met a lady called Irene, who became his babysitter and it didn't take Gordon long to realise he needed to marry this woman.

However, what did take a long time was their engagement, which lasted over the next decade and beyond. It was so long that in 2007, he proposed a second time and a year later on his 51st birthday, they finally married at the Club in Boyup Brook.

Choosing this date was a master stroke for Irene, who would remind Gordon, "You won't forget it will you? You remember your birthday; you remember your anniversary!"

His sporting endeavours, which over the years also included playing and coaching basketball and football, playing darts and bowls (of which he had many achievements!), came to a halt when he had to have shoulder surgery in 2010. But Gordon is still a big lover of sport and is now an avid spectator instead.

In 2015, he and Irene were in a very serious car accident, but it was in 2017 that they faced their most gruelling battle when Irene was diagnosed with colon cancer. After initially being told it would be six months of chemotherapy, this doubled to a full year, with Gordon caring for his wife throughout.

Of this time, he said, "It's probably the hardest 12 months I've ever done in my life." Thankfully, the cancer has stayed away since.

Gordon now has his own health to keep in check after he was diagnosed with emphysema in 2019. This has meant ordinary manual jobs that used to take him an hour, can now take up to three as he gets short of breath and needs frequent breaks.

To help his health, Gordon his made some huge life changes, he stopped smoking after the 2015 car accident when his doctor told him it was hindering the healing of a broken bone, and a few years later he also stopped drinking alcohol to help keep his weight down.

In recent years, he has taken a keen interest in the local museum and he helps out with tasks where he can. He thinks it is so important that the history of the area be shared and encourages everyone to get down to take a look at the museum which houses many items of the past.

He is most grateful to have some amazing sporting memories to look back on, and also for the safe births of his two daughters who have now gone on to have children of their own.

Between he and Irene they have six grandchildren and he treasures being able to connect with them on FaceTime, thanks to the new iPhone he bought his wife.

Gordon said he was taught by his parents to do his best and to never give up. This is true to the way Gordon has lived throughout his life, as he said he sometimes got himself into trouble, but he always tried to learn from his mistakes and keep moving forward.

### Damper in Bush Coals Recipe

### Ingredients

- 3 cups plain flour 3 cups wholemeal plain flour
- 1 tbs baking powder
- 1/2 cup reduced-fat milk
- 1 cup water

### Method

- Mix all dry ingredients together, and then add water.
   Knead and then shape dough to about 1 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inches thick.
- Options for cooking:



- To cook over an open fire: scrape off half of the coals and sand on the fire. Put a thick layer of plain flour on the hot sand, place damper on the flour and then put another thick layer of plain flour on the damper. Cover carefully with hot sand and coals. Leave for about 30 minutes, then remove from fire and brush off.
- To cook on a stove: sprinkle flour in a frypan and heat over moderate heat. Place mixture in the pan and shake occasionally to prevent sticking. When mixture slides easily in pan turn over. Knock the top of the damper; it will make a dull sound when it is cooked.
- To cook in the oven: sprinkle flour on an oven tray and heat in 180°C oven. Flatten the dough to an oval or round shape and place on the oven tray. Bake in oven for  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour. Then turn and bake on the other side for another  $\frac{1}{2}$  an hour.




