Former Local Makes King's List

In June, former local Mark Chambers, son of Sandy and Jacqui Chambers, was one of 112 Western Australians recognised in the 2023 King's Birthday Honours List.

Mark received a Medal (OAM) of the Order of Australia in the General Division for service to public administration as a Senior Researcher for the Aboriginal History Unit, at the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC).

Mark commenced his career in 1976 as a primary school teacher in remote communities, such as Warburton in the Ngaanyatjarra Lands of the Great Sandy Desert, before branching into community development and historical and anthropological research.

For the past fourteen years, Mark has worked as a genealogist and archivist supporting Aboriginal people to reconnect with family, culture and community. Many of those he has worked with are members of the Stolen Generation.

Mark's outstanding expertise in Aboriginal History is highly valued by the Aboriginal and Non-Aboriginal community, and his work has been utilised by over 3,000 Family History Applications, as well as a significant number of researchers for Native Title determinations.

In 2015, Mark's research skills were integral in researching and publishing the book, They Served With Honour, and in 2019, No Less Worthy which tells the unknown stories of Aboriginal Western Australians who served in World War I. His research contribution led to doubling the previously known number of Aboriginal Western Australians who volunteered in this war, adding significantly to the national record.

The highly acclaimed map of traditional places in the Perth CBD - Gnarla Boodja Mili Mili (Our Country on Paper); the Moore River Native Settlement Burial Register; and Remembering Mount Margaret Mission publication, which featured long lost children's crayon drawings, in recognition of the establishment of the Mission, were key projects on which Mark was also principal historical researcher.

Director General for DLGSC, Lanie Chopping was especially pleased to congratulate him stating, "Mark's sole motivation is to leave a legacy for Aboriginal Western Australians for generations to come, and he has indeed achieved this. His truth -telling projects add significantly to the State and national record and are helping to shift the narrative to a more reconciled Australia."

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Plastic-Free Incentive

Avoiding single-use plastic whilst grocery shopping can be a hard task, but the Boyup Brook IGA are committed to helping locals reduce it this Plastic Free July (and beyond!).

In line with the State Government's 'Plan for Plastics', local IGA owner Anne Thompson, has already implemented many changes to reduce plastic over the past 12 months. This has included things like providing compostable produce bags, converting to cardboard vegetable trays and phasing out Styrofoam meat trays.

There are also bulk options available for purchase regularly that help reduce the amount of plastic brought into the home. Rice, bread making kits and cooking oil are examples of items available for purchase in bulk, as well as laundry powder and other cleaning products.

The produce aisle is where it can get tricky for the town's small supermarket, as freshness of fruit and vegetables is of the utmost importance. You might see items halved or separated into smaller bunches, wrapped in cling film in the local produce section, but did you know that you can order these items plastic free?

By emailing the Boyup Brook IGA – bbiga@bbiga.com you can place an order to have most fruit or vegetables provided loose and package free. Cut off times for orders will be 6pm Monday, for Tuesday pick up, and 6pm Thursday, for Friday pick up. Whilst this is on offer at all times at the Boyup Brook store, if you do this during the month of July 2023, you will also go into a draw to win a prize.

There has never been a better time to take on the Plastic Free July Challenge and Anne is looking forward to providing "naked" fresh fruit and vegetables to her IGA customers!

Project Update



Drainage and structural renovations are well underway at the Town Hall and looking on track for completion by the end of August. The Lesser Hall flooring is currently in the process of being replaced along with work to the front of the hall. The exterior public toilets have remained open to the public, please ensure you continue to follow all signage when using the carpark or public toilets. No entry is permitted to the construction site.

The Cemetery project has also begun with initial ground stability and geotechnical testing completed. Phase 2 will see the Shire appoint drainage engineers to provide recommendations.

New standards have been introduced nationally by Food Standards Australia New Zealand (FSANZ) to improve food safety and prevent foodborne illness in the community. Food businesses that handle unpackaged, potentially hazardous and ready-to-eat foods will need to comply with the new standard requirements by 8 December 2023. The new requirements will improve food safety through skills, knowledge and supervision. Some food businesses will be required to implement the below food safety management tools. These tools will enable food businesses to manage food safety risks more effectively to help prevent foodborne illnesses and outbreaks, loss of revenue and reputational damage.

1. Food safety supervisors: You will need to appoint a food safety supervisor for your business.

2. Food safety training: Your food handlers will need to show they have had food safety training.

3. Show you are managing key food safety controls: You will need to keep records of important food safety controls or be able to demonstrate safe food handling practices.

The rumours are true, I am leaving Boyup Brook to return to Perth. By the time this edition is circulated I would have started in my new position at Special Crime Squad - Serious Crime and Family Violence.

The question I have been asked more than any during my time in Boyup Brook is why we have to leave.

The WA Police Force have a tenure policy of which the intent is to provide development opportunities for others. As an Officer in Charge (OIC) at any police station, the tenure is for a minimum of two years and a maximum of four. This ensures there is continual movement in these positions to allow others that experience.

The constable positions (Sarah and Drummo) on the other hand do not have a maximum tenure. This is common in regional WA (RWA) with positions that have a constant attrition that already provide regular opportunities.

When we move to another position, it is like every other job in that we would have submitted an application and undergone an interview process. It can be quite involved but having done this every couple of years for the past 24 years, you get used to it.



Knowing the shelf life of the position I'm in encourages me to start thinking of what I want to do next well before the two-year mark. This could mean anything from moving around the state or trying something completely different. This is how I came to being an OIC in RWA.

Timing is everything in this job and with this opportunity presenting, along with family in Perth, the timing to leave is right.

My time in Boyup Brook has been enjoyable. The town is a hidden treasure with enormous potential. Some of you may know my wife, Danni, who has worked at the Boyup Brook Medical Centre and primary school. She has also been very involved as a volunteer ambulance officer with St John Ambulance. We have both found our place in the community to be very friendly and accepting.

It is always hard to leave a place where we have formed friendships however, we have every intention of returning regularly so Danni can continue her SJA involvement, and I can play golf.

On the subject of golf, you may recall in the last edition of the Gazette, Constable 'Drummo' Drummond had a drive-by-dig at my wayward golfing. As crap as I am, the head to head games between Drummo and I are; Sergeant three - Constable zero. That's right, anything he says about my golf, he is worse.

Thank you to everyone for making Danni and I feel welcomed in the community for the past two years and I look forward to returning and catching up with some of you soon, this time in a purely social setting.

For the time being, I'll leave you in the capable hands of Sarah who will be Acting OIC until my replacement commences.



They worked extremely well as a team, provided positive feedback and consistent encouragement to each other and at the end of the day, they assisted the staff to pack up while everyone else went off to play. They represented our school, and displayed our core values – Respect, Resilience and Striving for Success, beautifully.

Teen Mental Health First Aid (TMHFA)

We are conducting TMHFA training with all Year 9 and 10 students, over the last three weeks of term, which gives teenagers the skills they need to recognise and help with mental health problems and crisis in their friends, and to get the help of an adult quickly.

Young people will often turn to each other when stressed or upset, and try to help each other, taking too much on. This course teaches them to try not to take on these problems alone.

These sessions include discussing mental health problems in general, and understanding how common and disabling these are in young people. Students will also learn about professionals who can help; helping a friend who is in crisis, whether because they are suicidal, engaging in non-suicidal self-injury, using alcohol or other drugs, or experiencing bullying or abuse; and how to help if someone seems to be developing a mental health problem. It's great to be able to equip the teenagers in our community with these very important skills.

Quality Teaching Strategy (QTS)

The QTS is the central element of the Department of Education's school improvement architecture. It sits at the heart of our commitment to improving outcomes for students, strengthening the conditions needed for teaching quality, driving data and evidence-based improvements in teaching practice.

At BBDHS, we are implementing the Quality Teaching Strategy by unpacking the Teaching for Impact document as a staff, which outlines what effective teachers believe, what they know, and what they do to have high impact on student outcomes.

Additionally, we have been assessing the culture of our school through the School Culture Survey (completed by parents, staff and leaders). The valuable information collected via these surveys assist us to identify what conditions and aspects of our school's culture are needed for optimal quality teaching and will feed into our next Business Plan (2024-2026). Both of these supports assist us to develop, implement and sustain effective classroom practice, and build a culture of teaching excellence.

I would like to thank all of the parents that took the time to complete the survey and contribute to our school planning. It was great to see so many positive results and comments, as well as constructive feedback for targeted improvement. A huge thank you to Vikki and Nicole and all who helped with promotion, cleaning, set up, food donations on the day, serving and all who participated and came along to make it a success.





From July 1 2023, the State Library is no longer able to support a freight contract for the widescale delivery of inter-library loans across WA.


What does this mean for you?

Is Your Pasture Growing to its Potential?

Lancer (200g/kg Gibberellic Acid)

Gibberellic acid is a naturally occurring plant hormone that is used to lift plant growth during the cooler winter months, when growth slows to what is less than desirable.

By increasing the levels of gibberellins the plant contains, Lancer stimulates growth through the expansion of cells, which in turn increases dry matter yield for up to 3-4 weeks after application, if adequate moisture and nutrition are available. Dry matter increases of between 400-600kg can be achieved.

Advantages of applying Lancer:

- o Reduces supplement feeding
- o Better grazing rotation
- o Increased winter production
- o Compatible with Insecticide
- Compatible with: 24D Amine 625; 24D Ester 680; MCPA/DFF; LI700; Wetter 1000; Flexi N

It works on most pasture, however Lancer works best on rye grass and Phalaris type pastures. Be selective with the pastures you apply Lancer to as you don't want to be promoting undesirable type pastures.

Things to keep in mind when contemplating spraying Lancer:

- $_{\rm o}$ $\,$ Works best when daytime temperatures are below 15°C.
- Lancer needs to be absorbed by leaf, so heavy rain after application is undesirable (allow to dry on leaf).
- Ensure there is adequate leaf area before application.
- DO NOT apply to new pasture (pasture needs to be at least 1 year old).
- o Do not apply to rank overgrown pasture.
- Graze pasture first, apply Lancer, then graze again in 3-4 weeks.
- o A prior nutrition plan essential.

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Prevent a House Fire

West Australians are urged to not leave e-Rideables and other household items containing lithium-ion batteries charging overnight or when they are not at home due to their potential to overheat and cause devastating home fires.

Batteries can overheat when left on charge or when they are faulty. Once the battery explodes, it can end up metres from where it was charging, and a small fire can spread quickly engulfing an entire home in just minutes.

Fire investigators are seeing a rise in the number of fires caused by lithium-ion batteries where the home has either been significantly damaged or completely destroyed.

Here are a few things you can do to protect you and your home from a house fire:

- Check electrical items and cords for signs of wear and tear before using them. Don't use damaged or dented equipment.
- Never leave batteries charging when no one is home, or in unsupervised areas such as garages.
- Make sure when charging batteries they are placed on a hard surface, and are not left charging on bedding, couches, carpets or clothing.
- Don't leave batteries charging once they have reached 100% as they can overheat.

• Take care when purchasing batteries or devices online or second-hand. Replacement batteries and electrical cords should only be purchased from reputable companies.

Batteries are classed as hazardous waste and should never be placed in your kerbside bins. You can find your nearest battery recycling bin by contacting your local government or visiting recycleright.wa.gov.au.



Eulogy: Len Halstrom

Former Boyup Brook school teacher Len Halstrom, passed away in June 2023. The following words were taken from the eulogy written by his son Doug Halstrom and read at his funeral.



Len arrived in Bentley in 1938. His parents, Jack and Maisie, and his sisters Dawn and Maxine were the first to encounter this force of nature. Len got straight to work and made himself useful.

He began exploring Bentley, Cannington and Victoria Park with his friends. His busy life included football, boxing, mandolin lessons, dancing lessons and tram rides into town and back.

Some of these activities were quite short-lived. One day coming home from dancing lessons on the tram, Len thought he would leap gracefully and land at a stylish run, as done by the older boys. Len hit the deck and skidded to a stop on his hands, knees and face. When he got home his father saw the state of him and asserted, "Maisie! No more dancing lessons!"

When Len and his mates were about 13, they approached a horse grazing in a local paddock. Len's mate convinced him to have a ride. Just as Len clambered up, one of his so-called mates slapped the horse on the rump. The response was immediate. Len always maintained he developed a life-long horse allergy from that exposure. Len then ran headlong into something new at Kent Street High School in 1954 – Alice.

Len loved everything about Alice and they made plans. Long story short, they managed to present themselves, newly-wed, smartly dressed and ready to start teaching at Boyup Brook District High School in 1959.

Early hardships included Len transporting a wardrobe he built from the high school across town to their first rented house - on his back. With his head inside the wardrobe he was guided through Boyup's winding streets by Alice's gentle direction. Difficulties such as these were soon forgotten with the arrival, not long after, of a brand-new, bouncing ... second-hand, green FJ ute.

Len loved everything about Boyup. Alice's mother, a Boyup local, said Len was a country boy, born in the city, who couldn't wait to get back to the country. He got to work teaching, gardening, growing sheep, making friends and building their own house to Alice's exacting specifications.

My sister Cathy and I turned up in the early 60s. We got frontrow seats to observe and marvel at Len's ceaseless energy. He always knew what had to be done next before the current task was complete, but he was never too busy to stop and help anyone with anything.

I clearly remember, more than once, waiting in the car while Dad organised help for some stranded motorist – usually around Donnybrook for some unknown reason.

Around 1965, Len was asked by the Education Department to help set up a Manual Arts school in the Northern Territory at Bamyili Community in Central Arnhem Land. Len accepted gladly on the condition that he and Alice could then stay in Boyup permanently. His proposal was accepted. After two years in Bamyili we returned to Boyup to stay.

If you wanted to learn about Len, you only had to watch him work. If you ever had the good fortune to find yourself in his Manual Arts room it became obvious. Len loved teaching. Every last thing in that room was precisely as and where it should have been.

I still think of Len whenever I smell a sharpening stone or linseed and kerosene - the smells of maintenance and careful preparation. Len taught generations of Boyup children. Many, I directly observed, got a distinct spring in their stride as they hurried across the quadrangle to their next class – Double Woodwork, recess to lunch!

Len made life-long friends in Boyup. Until quite recently he could often be seen with one or more good mates going about their business. Alf, Kevin, John, Eric and Tom, Terry, Trevor, Murray, Bob, Bob, Bronc, Mike, Peter and Wayne. They all gave Len what he needed most – connection.



Len's ex-students were also a rich source of community for him. They showed devotion to him that was awe-inspiring. Tim tirelessly and lovingly visited Len during his last years and that will never be forgotten.

Len had a strong sense of community service. He was always available to lend a hand. In summer the ute carried a fire unit ready to go. He highly valued and contributed to the Boyup Volunteer Ambulance Service. Cathy remembers when Len was on-call for ambulance duty he wouldn't leave home and everyone had to stay off the phone. During these confinements, the garden would be mowed, pruned and raked to within an inch of its life.

Around 1990 Len stopped teaching - but he didn't stop. He spent his time energetically tending to the needs of others. He always had something to attend to but was always instantly available to lend a hand even 300 miles from Boyup. I was always secure in the knowledge, even as an adult, that Dad would know how to solve any problem. I never heard even once, any form of complaint or annoyance from Dad about any problem – just the solution.

Len loved his family dearly. Cathy and I always had his total love, support and encouragement in everything we did. He instantly embraced new-comers Ken and Sheryl. Len's grandchildren Sam, Jennifer, Alison, Jack and Ben all got special attention from Granddad. They each carry their own precious memories of Granddad and his farm.

In later years, Len could often be found on a patch of land behind the airstrip on the Mayanup Road poetically referred to as 'The Block'. You would think Len might enjoy the scenery and think about life's mysteries. And, so he did - with the assistance of a post-hole shovel, chainsaw, saw-mill, tractor and timber sheds - often returning home well after dark, covered from head to toe in jarrah dust, bush smoke or both.

Len's favourite bit of the world was Boyup Brook and his favourite bit of Boyup Brook was 'The Block'. Hence the well-worn exchange, "Where's Len? Out 'The Block."

Len began to fade from us three years ago. He died peacefully, surrounded by loved ones.

If you saw Len from a distance you might think he was a little man – but you'd be wrong. He left this world a far richer place.









Rebuilding relationships

Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church.' Ephesians 5:25

Today about 50 per cent of all new marriages end in divorce. Sometimes the reasons are circumstantial, such as a redundancy or a home repossession. Other times it's relational, such as a betrayal of trust or an addiction to drugs and alcohol. If you're committed to rebuilding your marriage, you must learn how to reconnect and work to restore what you once had. To accomplish this, you must both be willing to enter into the process and commit for the long haul.

You must listen to each other. This requires time, patience, and focused attention. Too many couples give each other a monologue without leaving room for genuine dialogue. Couples counselling is effective as it forces both of you to slow down, interpret your spouse's language, understand their feelings, and discover their needs. When a marriage breaks down, couples are often so busy trying to get their own point across and win the fight that they don't listen for solutions and places of negotiation. Divorce would be less common if we would listen with open hearts rather than closed minds. Jesus pointed out that the law of Moses permitted divorce 'because of the hardness of your hearts' (Matthew 19:8 KJV).

This means their hearts would not melt to the level of understanding and place of negotiation for the relationship to work. Some couples find it simpler to write each other letters revealing their feelings as they relearn how to communicate at a deeper level. By putting your feelings down on paper before expressing them, you get to ask yourself, 'Is this how I really feel? Is this how I want to express my feelings? Am I saying too much? Or too little?' Unloading on your mate may be a catharsis for you, but what if it buries them? These are some of the questions you must ask in order to rebuild your marriage. And if you both pray and keep your hearts open, God will help you to do it.

Roos News




