Road Safety For Kids

During National Road Safety Week (NRSW) May 14-21, the Shire of Boyup Brook collaborated with the Boyup Brook District High School to organise the event 'Young People Staying Safe on their Wheels'.

Grant funding provided by the Road Safety Commission and RAC, provided the opportunity to host this session, one of 22 initiatives around the State. Boyup Brook's event entailed a lot of community involvement, road safety activities and great prizes up for grabs for the children.

To commence the day, classroom groups rotated through talks and demonstrations provided by local emergency service providers Boyup Brook St Johns Ambulance Sub-Centre, Police and Volunteer Fire and Rescue.

This included learning about injury management, knowing what to do to at various road signs, slowing down for emergency vehicles and being vigilant when riding a bike or scooter, to help keep everyone safe.

Representatives from Old Dog Dirt and Diesel were also in attendance, taking students through techniques to keep their bikes mechanically safe, and Boyup Brook Community Mental Health Action Team demonstrated how to fit a helmet correctly.

Teachers and volunteers kept busy by creating fun obstacle courses for the students who rode through them on their own bikes and scooters. There was plenty of instruction to help them practice slowing down and stopping in a timely and safe fashion.

The event concluded with a sausage sizzle lunch and ice cream, and a presentation of the day's prize-winners. The kids were also treated to a goodie bag.

The Shire was extremely pleased with how the day unfolded and BBDHS Principal Melissa Reimers said the day was "a wonderful example of the school and community working together for the benefit of our children."

Although Boyup Brook's event focused on keeping young people safe on the roads, NRSW is not just for children, all types of road users were targeted through different campaign themes such as taking care on regional roads and thinking about how safe your mode of transport is.

The week is also about remembering the 1200 lives that are lost on Australian roads and highways each year; a tragic and staggering amount, with a further 44,000 people seriously injured.

Can We Help the Homeless?

In Western Australia, about 20,000 persons have no certainty of where they will sleep tonight, or any night. This increases medical pressure, violence and lack of security. Can rural shires such as Boyup Brook relax emergency accommodation to enable persons to stay in a caravan or other small type of housing without time constrictions, until they can afford a more conventional home?

The Regional Australian Institute predicts 1 in 5 Australians are considering moving from Australian cities to regional and rural communities. Another prediction is that 25,000 residents annually, will move from NSW, VIC and SA to QLD and WA. This will further add to our housing stress.

There is a shortage of accommodation in many rural towns, making it difficult to house permanent, casual or part-time workers. If they are pensioners, they may not be looking for work but will be likely to boost local businesses when they shop. The 'tiny house movement' is just commencing in WA but land needs to be allocated for this purpose.

In Nannup there are a number of multiple occupancy properties where several homes are located on one rural property. These were all owner built, established in the 1970's and some of the original residents are now key persons within the Shire, some having become Shire Councillors. Until this happened, there were not enough children to support a school bus run for the more established farmers.

Welcome to the latest Council news items and information on 'what's going on at your shire'!

Welcome Onboard Leonard Long

Leonard will be joining the Shire of Boyup Brook as Chief Executive Officer commencing 19 June 2023. Leonard comes to Boyup Brook from the Shire of Nungarin where he held the position as Chief Executive Officer.

Outcome of Ward and Representation Review

Following the Ward and Representation Review, as was required by a directive from the Minister for Local Government in respect to abolishing the Ward System and reducing Elected Member numbers for the Shire of Boyup Brook, the Minister and the Local Government Advisory Board have now approved the following recommendations of the Shire of Boyup Brook in relation to this matter:-

- 1. The Ward System for the Shire of Boyup Brook be abolished
- Elected Member numbers will reduce from 9 to 7. This reduction will be undertaken in a staged process over two election cycles. At the 2023 Elections the numbers will reduce by 1 member followed by a further reduction of 1 member at the 2025 Elections.

2023 Council Elections – Postal Vote

Council, at its April 2023 Ordinary Meeting, resolved to appoint the Western Australian Electoral Commission (WAEC) to undertake a Postal Voting Election on behalf of the Shire of Boyup Brook.

The main reason for this decision is that the Postal Voting System, as evidenced by the majority of Local Governments in Western Australia who engage WAEC, is that voter participation increases significantly as opposed to n-Person Elections.

Further, the State Government will be introducing the Optional Preferential Voting System for the 2023 Elections, a complicated preferential system that requires specific software for the conduct of the count and it was considered that WAEC's expertise in this process, especially for the 2023 Elections would be advantageous.

The appointment of WAEC to undertake the election process on behalf of Council, and particularly a Postal Voting Election, is one that is undertaken prior to each Election. Therefore, Council will assess the process for the 2023 Elections before deciding to again appoint WAEC in 2025. Should Council not appoint WAEC in 2025, the Shire will revert back to in-person voting. The 2023 Elections will be conducted on Saturday, 21 October. Prior to this date, all Residents/Ratepayers on the Electoral Roll will be forwarded Election Packs with all Candidate Information and Ballot Papers for forwarding back to WAEC to undertake the count on Election Night.

Reporting Street Lighting Malfunctions

Bikes, firearms, golf, agricultural machinery and dash cams... What do these things have in common you ask? Well safety of course! This month's Gazette article is all about safety so please take the time to read it.

If the kids haven't told you how fun it was on May 18, Police were involved in a Bike Road Safety day at the Boyup Brook District High School. Police and firefighters worked together at a stand to educate on the importance of bike road safety. The generosity and support provided by the Boyup Brook community was fantastic with some great prizes awarded to students.

Police understand that seeding is a very busy time for farmers. We also know how much farmers love listening to non-farmers advice. However, we would like to remind you that it is important to comply with the requirements for safely moving agricultural machinery around the town and surrounds.

Big machines can be intimidating to us non-farmers so please do us all the favour of marking your vehicle appropriately and abiding by the laws.



At some point in the near future, firearm owners should be expecting a letter from the Boyup Brook Police advising them of our intention to conduct random firearms checks on a lucky few storage locations.

It is important that you update your storage location and tidy up your firearms safe. Remember you should only have the ammunition for your licensed firearms and ammunition must be stored securely and separate to the firearm.

Constable Drummond is currently going through the joy of a firearm application so any questions can be sent his way.

We have all seen people driving on the road and thought to ourselves, "how did they get their licence?" Well for police to be able to 'educate' (see point 1 below), those dastardly rascals we need some sort of evidence. This is where dash cams come in handy.

Got footage of someone doing something irresponsible or dangerous? Send it to us and we can determine an appropriate course of action on how to deal with the incident. They can also be a massive help with insurance claims and protecting you from fabricated accusations.

If you're wondering why golf is on the list, well if you ever find yourself in the general vicinity of Sgt Huggins swinging a golf club, the safety advice is to leave the area immediately, as you are in imminent risk of a stray golf ball hitting you or a loved one. (see point 2)

As always we are usually hanging around the coffee shop or takeaway if you have any questions about anything we have written about today. If you don't see me around, assume that the golf joke didn't go down well.





Boyup Brook District High School

Another busy month has passed by at Boyup Brook District High School where many fantastic events, experiences and learning opportunities have taken place for our students, staff and school community.

Professional Development of Staff

The teaching staff and leadership team attended Manjimup Senior High School for School Development Day at the beginning of the term with numerous other schools in the Warren Blackwood network. Regional Director, Sue Cuneo, addressed the network outlining priorities of the region including Cultural Responsiveness. Attendance and the Quality Teaching Strategy. Staff attended concurrent workshops of their choice, which provided professional learning in areas such as Science of Reading, Science of Behaviour, ADHD, Anxiety, Trauma, PBS Awareness, and Vaping.

Meanwhile, all of the Education Assistants (EAs) attended Classroom Management Strategies (CMS) training in Bunbury. CMS development provides our EAs the understanding and skills to assist with the management of classrooms, which improves the engagement, learning and well-being of all students. A majority of the teaching and non-teaching staff at Boyup Brook District High School are now trained and implementing CMS within classrooms. By using evidence based interactive instructional strategies, we are increasing our students' active participation and classroom engagement, leading to better outcomes for students and the school.

Other areas of professional learning that staff have undertaken during this time include:

- o Two teachers attended Science of Reading professional learning through the Peel Language Development Centre
- Both school officers attended SIS (school software system) training
- o Four staff members received their Mental Health First Aid certificates.

PLD parent workshop

It was fantastic to see the many parents that attended the PLD workshop that was held to communicate the 'why' behind the implementation of the PLD Literacy program and Heggerty program at BBDHS. This workshop outlined the evidence-based theory for teaching children how to read, otherwise known as the Science of Reading.



This included developing understanding Scarborough's Reading Rope, where the premise is



that strong reading comprehension results only when both word recognition (decoding) and language comprehension are strong; the Big 6 of reading - Oral Language, Phonemic Awareness, Phonics, Vocabulary, Fluency and Comprehension; and overviews of both the PLD Literacy and Heggerty programs.

The implementation of PLD Literacy and Heggerty are the first steps at BBDHS in providing an evidence-based literacy approach that includes planned and structured teaching of phonics with assessment tools to monitor, assess and support early intervention.

Mother's Day Breakfast

The weather turned on a beautiful morning for our Mother's Day breakfast on Thursday, May 11. Staff enjoyed cooking bacon and egg muffins for the amazing mothers and mother figures in our school community and their children. Mums enjoyed eating breakfast with their children in the amphitheatre, attending the photo booths together, and joining students and staff for a massive group Hokey Pokey! Pictured below. There were many smiles and laughs which made for a wonderful morning. Thank you to IGA Bridgetown, Coles Manjimup and the Harries family for the donation of food items for this event.

Year 9/10 Careers Camp

The Year 9 and 10 students attended a four-day Careers Camp in Perth where they attended numerous career orientated activities to stimulate interest in industries and career paths not seen in Boyup Brook, and to motivate them to pursue fulfilling careers in a range of areas. Activities included attending the Construction Futures Centre to explore the construction industry, hearing from a Marine Biologist at AQWA, touring Edith Cowan University, speaking with many, many industries at the 2023 Careers Expo, and visiting Austal Ships. Tonebridge Country Club

Carrying on from last month's Plaque Tour, we will relate the information not as we visited sites, but in order of settlement and when school sites were occupied.

We have 'Pretty Gully' family farm in memory of the Newton – Connor family. James and Anna Newton moved into Chowerup district in the 1920's. John and Amy Connor bought land from his father-in-law, James Newton, in 1922. They had nine children who are all recorded on the Pretty Gully plaque – Frank, Mary, Henry, John, Bill, Wallace, Ellen, Margaret and Jean.

They moved from their Wickepin farm in two groups. The younger children under the care of Mary (at 16 years old) came by train to Kulikup and were met by Uncle Ted Newton, then looked after by James and Anna Newton.

John and Amy Connor (Granny Connor as Kevin Connor affectionately called her) and her eldest son Frank came by horse drawn wagon and sulky, driving ten head of cattle a distance of 220kms. It took them nine days. All their grandchildren erected the plaque in 1980.

Next, we have Caroline, a sister of Amy Connor who became Mrs John Jennings and their son George Jennings and wife Bonnie who lived at 'Chowerup Creek'. They were instigators of the first assisted school at their home for Connor, Newton and Torr children. Bonnie was their teacher and the school opened in 1923. This plaque is east of Chowerup Mill on Scotts Brook (Mullidup) Road, erected by the Tonebridge Progress Association in 2021. Chowerup Hall was built by the local community during 1924, and Chowerup Creek school opened in the hall in 1925 and operated on and off, depending on number of children, to 1950 when the new school opened. This plaque is inside the hall on the chimney erected by the local Country Women's Association schools project and the Boyup Brook Shire.


A third and much bigger two-classroom school further south, catering for Tonebridge students, opened in 1950 with 28 students. In the late 1970s, student numbers peaked at 50 and continued until 1997 when there were just 15 students and they were bussed to Boyup Brook and Manjimup. The local parents and citizen's erected the plaque at the closure of the school in 1997.

An interesting note is that there has been up to three generations of some families attending one or two of these schools. There is one more plaque to go for the next issue.

In the meantime, both the Boy's and Girl's Nights have come and gone, and also the summer windup lunch at Quinninup Tavern and our first casserole tea evening, which is always held on the second Saturday of the month.



In Touch Farming

Challenges ahead with dryer than average winter rainfall predicted.

Seeding

If you are seeding now, you will know how dry things have become over the last week with moisture disappearing from the soil profile. With lower-than-average rainfall predicted for the winter months ahead, giving your seeded crops/pastures every possible advantage, this season will be the difference between being successful and less successful.

Pre-Seeding

Double knock is still the way to go:

Glyphosate as the first knock with the required insecticides, spikes and adjuvants in the mix. Second knock of Paraguat or Spray Seed with pre-emergent.

Four Days between first and second knock will produce the best kill as close to 100% as can be achieved. This will give crops a weed free start. More economical to control weeds pre-seeding than post.

At Seeding

SE-14 down the tube around 2.5-3L of product with a minimum of 50L of water per ha. The addition of SE-14 will dramatically improve early seed emergence and vigor especially in nonwetting soils and dry seeding conditions. If you do not have a liquid system on your seeder, I urge you to enquire for the 2024 season. Enquire in store for fitting options if required.

Timina

This season will be critical for the timing of fertiliser and spraving applications. With rainfall events possibly being smaller and less frequent making the application of fertiliser coincide with rainfall will be highly yield responsive more so than in a normal rainfall season. Keeping crops weed free will maximise water efficiency, as the weeds will not be competing with the crop for moisture.

Always remember that a challenge gives us an opportunity to shine.



Backyard Buddies: Splitting the Difference

Larvae in firewood

During the winter period where firewood is often collected and split, our service receives a common enquiry: "*I've chopped* some wood and found these grubs! Are these borers? Is this the European house borer? Is my house at risk???

The first question we ask to split European house borer (EHB) from many other wood borers is: *"What wood are you cutting? Is it pine?"* If the answer is no, it's not going to be EHB. EHB larvae will only reproduce in seasoned (dry) coniferous timber and wood, including pine, fir and spruce. Of these, pine trees (*Pinus* species) and pine timbers are abundant in WA.

What if the answer was yes? - If you notice larvae or borer emergence holes in dead pine branches, logs, or untreated pine pallets or timbers, please report this. EHB has the potential to cause major structural damage to buildings constructed with untreated pine timber. Infested wood stored in or around the home is worth investigating.

Who's on the chopping block?

Most firewood burnt in WA is from native hardwood species and pictured in this article are the larvae of native longicorn beetles (*Phoracantha* species) in jarrah. These beetles attack live or recently dead/felled Eucalypt trees and do not pose a risk to the timbers in your home. If you have been chopping firewood for years but are only starting to see these borers, it's likely the trees the firewood has come from, were stressed or recently felled. Trees stressed by drought or disease are particularly susceptible to borer attack.

Reporting


We can't all be insect identification specialists, but that doesn't matter. If something isn't familiar to you, it's best to report it rather than ignore it. When reporting, please include as much information as possible about what's occurring. Collect and hold onto any insect samples, and if taking photos, include things like a ruler or a pen so the dimensions of insects, holes or other symptoms can be gauged.

If borers are coming out of furniture, timber, or wooden products like bowls, chopping boards or ornaments – report it as soon as possible and we will provide guidance from there. Be Bowel Cancer Aware!

Consumer Protection Columns

Avoid Being Billed for Paper Bills

Next time you spot a bill in the letterbox, it could be worth looking into whether you're being charged extra to receive this correspondence in the mail and how you might avoid paying the fee if so.

A growing number of service providers now charge a fee to cover the costs of printing and posting your bill. That list recently expanded to include Telstra, which reportedly cited 'environmental reasons' as the reason many of its customers would need to pay \$2.20 each time they received a bill in the mail after 20 May 2023.

Not all of Telstra's customers will need to pay the paper billing fee – those who have a valid health care, pension concession or Department of Veteran's Affairs card are exempt. The charge will also not apply to customers who don't have an email address or access to an active internet service, as well as those who require special bill formats, such as braille or large print.

There are numerous reasons why other companies may elect to not charge fees, such as those customers who receive income support or are on a hardship program. The best way to find out if you are eligible for an exemption is to contact each of your providers to ask if you qualify for an exemption from paper bill fees, and how to apply.

If you're not eligible, then the easiest way to avoid paying a paper billing fee is to switch to online billing and receive your bills by email or via the company's app or website. Over the course of a year, these charges for paper billing all add up, especially for people on a low income. By opting out of paper billing or claiming the fee exemption, you could save a considerable amount each year.

Also remember to be wary about fake billing scams via phone calls or emails. Scammers sometimes try to trick consumers by sending emails that look like they are from a legitimate company. The email may ask you to send money for an overdue account.

Consumers who are eligible for an exemption but are having trouble getting their exemption request processed should contact Consumer Protection for help by emailing consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au or by calling 1300 30 40 54. Beware of New Bank Scams

Scammers have been pretending to call or text from financial institutions for years, but it's the latest twist on these banking impersonation scams that should have all consumers on alert.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) raised the alarm after reports to Scamwatch indicated new technology was being used to make scam calls look like they were coming from the bank's legitimate phone number and to allow scam texts to appear in the same conversation thread as genuine bank messages.

These tricks mean it may not be possible for consumers to distinguish a real message or call from those that aren't based on a phone number or message thread alone, and sadly many are falling victim. Since January 2022, our WA ScamNet team has heard from 20 victims who reportedly lost \$1.9 million to bank impersonation scams. When you consider that's an average loss of almost \$96,000 per person, it's clear just how financially and emotionally devastating these scams can be.

One WA victim's bank account was drained of almost \$41,000, after she answered a call from the same number as one listed on the back of her credit card. Posing as a bank employee, the scammer claimed her accounts had been hacked as a ruse to gain control of her finances. A big red-flag is communications that come with a sense of urgency, such as claims of fraudulent activity or a frozen account. No matter how legitimate the call or message seems, a bank will never ask you to urgently transfer funds.

We urge all WA consumers to 'practice the pause' to stop scammers in their tracks. If you receive an SMS with a phone number to call, do not use it. Instead, call your bank direct on a number you have sourced yourself. Likewise, hang up if you receive a call from someone claiming to be from your bank requesting you to transfer money to 'keep it safe'. Ask for a reference number and call your bank back using contact details you have found independently.

Never provide online banking passwords, one-time security codes, pins or tokens to anyone over the phone. Contact your bank or financial institution immediately if you think you have been scammed, and report scam activity to WA ScamNet at www.scamnet.wa.gov.au

Eulogy: Ainslie (Lee) Duke

Former Boyup Brook shopkeeper Ainslie (Lee) Duke, passed away in February 2023. The following words were taken from the eulogy written by one of his children for his funeral.



Ainslie Allen Duke was born on November 17, 1938 in Kalgoorlie, the third and youngest boy to Albert and Ivy. Tragically, Alwyn the eldest passed away before Dad's birth, leaving Adrian to look after his young brother.

The family moved to an orchard in Stoneville, to be closer to Albert who for several years, had been admitted to Wooroloo Sanatorium suffering from tuberculosis.

Both boys briefly spent time in the Parkerville Children's Home as lvy and Albert tried to manage the orchard, however after only three or four months it became clear Albert could not manage, returning to the sanatorium and eventually passing away in 1945.

Ivy then sold the orchard and moved to Rivervale where Dad attended Carlisle Primary School. Ivy owned and operated several boarding houses and properties including one in the leafy streets of Subiaco and a house in Nedlands opposite Steve's Tavern. At the age of 12-13, Dad worked Saturday's delivering bread around Nedlands and Dalkeith.

The family then moved to Bunbury, living in Victoria Street not far from the old Egg Board building and one Bunbury property is still in use today as a boarding house and backpackers, and it is from here that I will pick up the story.



So begins Dad's Odyssey. An odyssey is any long, complicated journey, often a quest for a goal, an actual voyage or spiritual journey and may involve many changes of fortune, adventures or experiences.

While not on the scale of the Ancient Greeks, Columbus or Cook, Dad's journey was none the less, as he sought to gain experience and knowledge to improve his lot in life, and that of his family.

Dad attended Bunbury High School and found work with several local merchants and storekeepers.

In 1955, at nearly seventeen, Dad thought he would stretch his wings and took up a position as an assistant at the Dinninup Store working for C.E. Smith, delivering fuel, mail and general deliveries to the surrounding area including Boyup Brook, which would feature again many years later.

Dad got his driver's license in Boyup Brook by driving from the police station past the post office and back to the station, a round trip of about 600m. He enjoyed his two years in Dinninup, and two stories stand out to me among others.

In 1955, a phone call was taken at the Dinninup store from the Kulikup general store to hold the train at the siding. As Dad put it, the train guard had nicked across to the Kulikup shop to get something and the train left him behind. The train was stopped and the guard was brought down to take up his position on the train and not a word was said, as railway procedure had not been carried out – plus the guard would have been late home for tea!

Dad was also in Dinninup when it snowed! Dad was awakened to Mrs Smith calling out, "Earl! Earl! It's snowing, come and have a look. Come on Ainslie get out of bed and see the snow!" Both Earl and Dad got out of bed, and it was snowing and the snow stayed on the ground and bushes until the middle of the day.

In 1957, he returned to Bunbury and eventually commenced work during Christmas 1958 for C.E. Jones at a store in Harvey. In June 1959, Dad's journey continued as he left Harvey and followed his passion for shopkeeping at Wongan Hills.

It was while living in Wongan Hills that the local shop assistant was introduced to his future wife Marie the new nursing sister when she commenced her nursing post at the Hospital in 1963.

Dad and Mum married in the St Barnabas Anglican Church in Kalamunda and briefly return to Wongan Hills before moving to Ongerup in 1967, where Ainslie managed the town Co-op.

Peter was born in July 1967 and a third boy was added to the family with the arrival of Timothy in 1969. Ainslie was then offered a position to run a store for Wesfarmers and so the family moved to Three Springs arriving in 1971. It was here that the fourth and final son, lan was born.

Dad's move from local co-ops to the corporate world of Wesfarmers exposed him to a whole new world of wheeling and dealing with company support behind it. In this role, Dad was able to introduce some of his ideas and develop a successful management system for country stores.

On the back of this success, he was offered a position to oversee the construction and manage the latest Farmers Store when Wesfarmers bought out Charlie Carters in Tom Price.

So the journey continued and the family arrived in 1976. Not only was the support and backing from Wesfarmers a positive thing for the town but the strength of mining was booming and being a company town, Hamersley Iron looked after its residents and workers and the new store catered well for the large incomes.

With high schooling a priority for the boys, Dad took a new position in Perth based at Francis Street in Northbridge and at the end of 1978 Marie, Ainslie and the boys moved from Tom Price to the metro area, briefly renting a house in the Swan Valley vineyards while having their first house built in Swan View.

With the boys now attending high school and primary school and a 19% mortgage rate, Dad and Mum found the going tough. Mum returned to nursing and Dad was on the road five days a week managing the southern stores, returning when he could, rather than stay overnight in the town so he could keep the money allocated for accommodation.

By 1985 with only lan still at high school, Dad took an opportunity to move onto his own business, purchasing a store in Mount Lawley and moving the family to Mahogany Creek. For the next 12 years, Dad and the boys along with Mum at various stages, endured the drive to and from home to work seven days a week.

Working for himself in business was the catalyst to seek a greater challenge and when the Boyup Brook supermarket came on the market, Dad and Mum made the decision in 1997 to head south again. This meant only five and a half days and the shop was close to home.



Peter, Tracy, Connor and Jaelithe along with Tim also went to Boyup to work alongside Dad in this venture.

A bigger and better business also meant bigger challenges and Dad relished in the pursuit of a good deal whether it be on pallets of toilet roll or water or refrigeration or shelving. All with the aim to improve the service to the community so they would want for nothing in their own town.

The shop was able to support so many community projects and fundraisers and when approached, Dad would always try to find some way to offer as much as he could and for the business to also benefit. The Country Music Festival and the Harvey Dickson Rodeo were good examples of the massive efforts the shop would go to, ordering in hundreds of hamburger buns and meat patties, delivering these to site along with pallets of water and frozen chips.

On those weekends, we would have queues of 60 to 70 people in the shop to buy the essentials along with smokes and lotto and it used to make Dad proud to see and speak to many of the visitors who were amazed a small town had such a well provisioned shop.

Another challenge overcome was by sharing the purchase and running costs of a truck and trailer with Peter Rogers from Kojonup, reducing the cost of freight and delivering fresh produce more frequently and of a higher quality to the store.

The shop also afforded Mum and Dad the opportunity to travel as part of organised incentive tours and together they saw the sights of Hong Kong, Singapore, Christmas Island, Norfolk Island and parts of the UK and Europe. Dad was never happier than when he returned home and went back into work. Even a trip to Perth and back still had him checking the freezers before he left and again when he got back. As Mum's health declined and her needs increased, Dad made the difficult decision for one final move to Bunbury where her care and wellbeing could be maintained, and he could receive the level of support he needed.

Dad was devastated when Mum passed away in August last year, and although he made an effort in recent months to get on with life alone, he never had his whole heart in it and he left us on Saturday, February 11 on his final journey to be together with Mum.

LiveLighter Recipe: Green Pea Soup

Ingredients

- spray olive or canola oil spray
- 3 onions, roughly chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, chopped
- 3 cups salt-reduced chicken stock
- 1 cup water
- 500 g frozen peas
- 1/2 cup mint leaves
- to taste pepper, to serve
- 4 tbs low-fat natural or Greek yoghurt, to serve
- 4 slices grainy bread or roll, to serve



Method

- Heat a large pot and spray with oil. Add onion and cook for 5 minutes over medium-high heat, stirring often until softened but not browned.
- 2. Stir in garlic, cook for 1 minute then add stock and water and bring to the boil. Simmer for 2 minutes then add peas and mint.
- 3. Bring back to the boil and simmer, covered, for a further 2 minutes, ensuring peas remain bright green.
- 4. Remove from heat and puree with a stick mixer or in batches in a food processor or blender until smooth.
- 5. Ladle soup into bowls, season with pepper and serve immediately with a swirl of yoghurt, mint leaf garnish and bread.

Variation: Substitute a sliced leek for onions.

Serving Suggestion:

- $_{\rm o}$ This recipe requires a food processor, stick mixer or blender to get a nice smooth texture.
- As an appetiser, canapé or palate cleanser, serve soup chilled in shot glasses with a small dollop of yoghurt and mint leaf garnish.




New Administrator



Be Still and Know..... God

Beware of self pity

'No one should seek their own good, but the good of others.' 1 Corinthians 10:24

Self-pity can be deadly. It tells the wife and mother who works hard, 'You're not appreciated.' It says to the office worker, 'Look how valuable you are, yet you're never recognised or rewarded.' It says to the unemployed, 'No chance!' To the divorced, 'No place!' To the bereaved, 'No hope!' And to the struggling, 'No way!'

Look at the prophet Elijah. Twenty-four hours after his greatest victory, he is deeply depressed and wallowing in self-pity. "I have had enough, Lord," he said. "Take my life ... I have zealously served ... But the people of Israel have broken their covenant with you, torn down your altars, and killed every one of your prophets. I am the only one left, and now they are trying to kill me, too.' (1 Kings 19:4, 10 NLT). There it is – self-pity in the raw!

Generally speaking, there are two reasons behind self-pity. The first is emotional manipulation. We use self-pity as a weapon to guilttrip others and get our own way. That's immaturity and you have to deal with it, whether it's in yourself or somebody else. On the other hand, self-pity can also stem from sheer exhaustion. Recorded in the Old Testament, God showed Elijah four things that were necessary to get himself back on track:

1) He needed more rest.

2) He hadn't been eating properly.

3) He had taken his eyes off God and was trying to do everything in his own strength.

4) He was isolated and needed a friend. So, God gave him Elisha. That did the job, and the next time we see Elijah, he is back on top. Take a moment today and think about how these four truths apply to your life.




