It was a wholesome, vibrant, and fun festival, with so much to enjoy. Highlights included industry workshops, which gave aspiring musicians the chance to learn from some of the best in the business, including multi-Golden Guitar winner Roger Corbett from The Bushwackers.

There were the three Randy Poets and many bush poets who showcased in hilarious style, and a multitude of artists staged in a variety of locations. The Street Carnival provided fantastic entertainment from highland dancers, bootscooters, belly dancers, visual art stalls, climbing wall, face painting, Old Macdonald's Travelling Farm, sand art, Jamie the Clown and of course, the many buskers for adults and children alike.

Many of the benefits of the festival overflow to the local community and further afield, including funds raised through camping, food and fuel, markets, transport, businesses, and artists. Over the years, the Country Music Club of Boyup Brook, through the annual festival, has supported several very worthwhile charities, community groups and organisations. So, each year you attend the festival, not only do you get to enjoy a fantastic event, but you are also contributing to local community groups and local businesses.

The Ute and Truck Muster and Parade was outstanding. There were many bright and colourful trucks and utes, air horns, big diameter exhaust pipes, flags flying and shiny and not so shiny vehicles.



Art Show on Focus

After two years of not having the Art Awards, this year, the Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre set about creating a new art exhibition to showcase Western Australian artists during the Country Music Festival Weekend.

'Focus on Flora', was a slightly condensed version of the regular Art Awards, held over four days from February 16-19.

Rather than the Town Hall, which was (at the time of planning) likely to be undergoing maintenance and renovation works, it was the Boyup Brook CRC that was converted into a gallery. Almost every wall in the building was dressed with stunning artworks entered by 30 artists from 23 different locations.

The 69 pieces entered were a mix of mediums and styles that included watercolour, acrylic, ink, oil and more, and they all focused in on one theme – flora.

At the event Opening and Awards Presentation on Thursday, February 16, judge and revered local artist Lori Pensini, had the difficult task of selecting the top three pieces. She also delivered two artists a highly commended award.

First place went to Bridgetown artist, Jean Barrett for her piece *Moody Blue*. Lori's comments were, "Beautiful execution of subtle colour to create a gentle, moody piece. Well composed – full, but not cluttered."

There was also a Packer's Prize and the People's Choice voted on, with the full list of winners detailed below. More than 520 visitors attended the exhibition over the three days, with more viewing it on the Saturday than recorded in previous years at the usual Art Awards.



During the exhibition, 20% of the artworks were sold, making eleven different artists extremely happy for the opportunity to place their art in the spotlight at this event.

The Boyup Brook CRC send a heartfelt thanks to the event sponsors and artists, and to the volunteers who were instrumental in ensuring the success of the exhibition by helping in all areas of its production.



Update from the Manager of Works and Services Cemeterv

At the June 2022 Special Council Meeting, it was resolved that Cemetery Upgrades be nominated as a project for potential funding opportunities available from July 2023. This project strongly aligns with Shire commitments to the community, outlined in the Strategic Community Plan 2021-2031. Community consultation will take place to develop a detailed plan for these upgrades.

Focus areas plan to include upgrades to vehicle access within cemetery including general road maintenance, construction of a new road, reconstruction, sealing and resealing, stabilisation of cemetery grounds through drainage works, landscaping, improved accessibility of community facilities and areas, construction of off-road car park and toilet facilities.

To commence upgrades, a contractor was engaged last year to install kerbing to deflect water away from the grave sites and to better define the roadway. The contractor has unfortunately been delayed, however, it is planned that the kerbing will be installed within the next few months.

Employment Opportunities Assets and Technical Officer

The Assets and Technical Officer will provide support to the Manager Works and Services in asset management, traffic management, bridge inspections and associated operations needs and objectives in regards to delivery of grant funded and strategic capital works projects and works programme.

The Shire of Boyup Brook have a large number of strategic Capital Works Projects scheduled for the next two years and require casual General Hands (including Plant Operators) to assist during the busy periods. What happens when your property is sold?

Conveyancing agent/s or solicitor makes application to Landgate for this information. The shire receives an 'Enquiry and Advice of Sale' (EAS) from Landgate.

Shire collects the ESL fee on behalf of DFES and receives a minimal administration fee per annum. On settlement of property, Agent/Solicitor advise Landgate to have Certificate of Title updated.


Conveyancing agents/Solicitor are requested to advise the shire, unfortunately this is not always provided especially in circumstances where no EAS has been requested such as in the case of 'Family Succession' e.g. property is changing ownership within the family.

Community Notice – Emergency Bridge Works

A temporary load limit restriction of 2 tonnes has had to be placed on Javes Bridge, Jayes Road for emergency bridge works.

Boyup Brook Police have a new permanent officer in Constable Danny Drummond who has replaced Senior Constable Tara Spencer. Danny has come from Bunbury Police Station and brings with him some great contemporary knowledge, from working in a large police station and busy city. If you see him around please make him feel welcomed to the community and if he looks lost, point him in the direction of the police station.

Boyup Brook Police are not the only ones who have been on a recruiting drive. The WA Police Force are currently recruiting new officers. If you, or someone you know are interested in learning about what it takes to become a Police Officer, visit the WA Police Force Let's Join Forces website or come in and see us.

Between the three officers at Boyup Brook we have close to 50 years of combined service in areas including mounted, detectives, metropolitan general duties and country policing including the Kimberley region. Danny graduated from the Joondalup Police Academy in 2020 so has some insight as to what the recruitment and academy demands are.

The job is not for everyone, however if you have the desire and think you have what it takes it can be a highly rewarding career.



It was great to see the Boyup Brook Country Music Festival and Ute and Truck Muster return for this year. A lot of planning goes into an event like this, which this year included police resources from Bridgetown, Donnybrook, Nannup, Manjimup, South West Liquor Enforcement Unit and South West Traffic helping out at various stages.

The patrons who attend the event are historically well behaved. This year was no different, helped by the highly visible police attendance. Over the weekend the police operation stopped over 200 vehicles for random breath tests with one person being charged with a drink driving offence.

The 50-year-old Bunbury man will be appearing in the Manjimup Magistrates Court on March 16. Boyup Brook Police also charged a 27-year-old Port Kennedy man for alcohol related public order offences. He also has a date with the Manjimup Magistrate on March 16.

Finally, a reminder that we need the communities help in identifying and investigating crime. This includes the reporting of suspicious persons and/or vehicles and any information in relation to the distribution of illicit drugs. It does not matter how insignificant or useful you think the information may be, we rely on intelligence. Call us directly, or if you wish to remain anonymous, call Crimestoppers.

I have said this in the past, the battle against illegal drugs in our community is all of our responsibility. Please help us make Boyup Brook a safe place for our families to live.


Boyup Brook District High School

What a busy start to 2023 we have had here at Boyup Brook District High School! We have welcomed numerous new staff members to our fantastic team as well as many new families to our wonderful school.

It was great to see staff, parents, students and community members at our welcome back barbeque. I'm not sure whether it was excitement that school was back or the free ice-cream from Tony's ice-cream van, but the excitement and smiles on the students' faces was a priceless sight and was very missed over the school break.

Staff began the year with two School Development Days which included review of the Department of Education strategic plans and policies; an overview of the year ahead which is the final year of the current Business Plan; an introduction to the newly released Quality Teaching Strategy by the Department of Education; and a review of the Positive Behaviour Strategy at Boyup Brook DHS.

The primary school staff have completed PLD training and have begun implementing the new whole-school literacy program from Kindergarten to Year 6. We will be holding a parent information session on PLD in the near future so that our parents can see what the program is all about and ways in which they can use it at home. Boyup Brook DHS are also proud to be hosting a Talk for Writing workshop this week where we have provided a sought after opportunity for numerous schools in our network to attend.



All primary school teachers will be participating in this course and will begin implementing the program over the course of the year.

Boyup Brook DHS has been fortunate in receiving funding from the Department of Education to provide depth and breadth of curriculum for high school students in district high schools. For 2023, this funding has been directed toward providing straight year level classes for all MESH subjects (Maths, English, Science and HaSS).

This year we have also partnered with SIDE RTO to provide our Year 9 students with a Cert I qualification in Skills for Vocational Pathways, and our Year 10's with a Cert II qualification in Skills for Vocational Pathways. Year 9 and 10 students will also be provided with many career taster experiences including travelling to Perth in May to attend a Careers camp (Career Expo, Construction Futures Centre, UWA visit and more), funded by a Career Taster Program grant.

It's been lovely to welcome Mrs Kate Beatty back to the team as our Kindergarten teacher. Kate has been privileged with welcoming our Kindergarten students to their first year of schooling, and for some of their families, their first year at Boyup Brook DHS. To those new families, we welcome you and are honoured to be partnering with you in your child's education.



Landscape Rehydration Workshops

Mulloon Institute worked with several landholders in Western Australia throughout 2022 to deliver the Landscape Rehydration Trial and Demonstration in the Wheatbelt of WA. This project includes the assessment and design of Landscape Rehydration works across seven local properties including Warren and Lori Pensini's 664-hectare property 'Paraway', just outside of Boyup Brook.

'Landscape Rehydration' was coined by Mulloon Institute to describe the process of returning the small water cycle from a compromised to natural state. Landscape Rehydration involves physical works (infrastructure) designed to restore the natural flow of water through the landscape via the implementation of in -stream structures, hillslope earthworks such as contours and revegetation. Landscape Rehydration results in various benefits including increased soil hydration, stability and health, water holding capacity, vegetation, drought resilience, flood control, salinity management and agricultural productivity.

On March 21-23, Mulloon Institute is facilitating a Landscape Rehydration 1-Day Introductory Workshop and 2-Day Bootcamp in Boyup Brook. The workshop and bootcamp will showcase completed Landscape Rehydration works at Warren and Lori Pensini's property which include three kilometres of contour banks, revegetation, and targeted interventions to treat erosion, salinity and waterlogging.

Both events are heavily subsidised thanks to funding from the Western Australian Government's Natural Resource Management program, making this an opportune moment to book in. Ticketing information for either event can be found on the events page at www.themullooninstitute.org



We Wear Green

Well once again it has been a busy month. It was fantastic to see the town come alive with the Country Music Festival and my congratulations to the organisers. We often do not realise the amount of work that goes into organising these types of events. It was wonderful to see so many people volunteering their time and expertise to this event. If not for the volunteers many country towns would not have the lifestyle they do.

St John Boyup Brook provided not only first aid services to the festival but maintained emergency and transfer crews over the weekend. We had several officers from other towns join us to help do this. Volunteering at other sub centres is something that a number of officers do throughout Western Australia. In fact, we even have a thing called 'voluntourism'.

This allows officers to travel to sub centres that require assistance covering shifts or just need to rest their own officers. These officers are reimbursed their travel expenses and provided with accommodation. I personally have been to several different sub centres and each time I bring back new knowledge and skills. While at these other sub centres you get time off to play tourist. There are many benefits to being a volunteer ambulance officer besides working alongside likeminded people and helping others.

Over the last few months there has been a number of incidences were people have made their own way to hospital rather than call an ambulance. People have been involved in motor vehicle accidents, falls and even chest pains and have not called an ambulance. It can be extremely dangerous to move someone after any of these events. We are trained to move people so as not to worsen any injury.

Quite often, with adrenalin pumping through their system, patients can feel no pain or very little pain. They may however have injured their spine or hips without realising it. If moved incorrectly this could lead to life threatening or changing injuries. We have had many instances over the years where because we have used the correct techniques, patients have been able to walk out of hospital.

With chest pains you do not want the person's condition worsening while you or they are driving. It is very hard to do CPR in a vehicle or on the side of the road. Phone 000 and they will give you instructions on what to do while awaiting the ambulance. We would rather be called out and find it was something minor than not being called and have it end up being life threatening.



EULOGY: Neil Guazzelli

Boyup Brook resident Neil Guazzelli passed away on November 29, 2022. The following eulogy is taken from words read by his son Peter at his funeral service. To follow are some of the stories his daughter Alana shared on the day.



Dad was born in Donnybrook on June 12, 1935. He was the son of a Tuscan migrant and a first generation Aussie from Waterloo near Bunbury. He began school at Argyle, then Donnybrook before finishing school in Mt Barker at 14.

He first worked in the orchards with his father, and with the late Mr Eric Krachaer, his friend and mentor, and his rucking opponent on the football field.

Following this, he went halves in a house in Carlisle with his Dad, and the family, including three younger siblings, moved in. It was while the family lived there that his parents divorced in 1954.

The same year he went into National Service. He worked in Bindoon then returned to the South West where he lived and worked in Roelands and Worsley.

After breaking his ankle when the rear tyre on his Norton blew out, he had to cut short his 'Nashos' training and he ended up in Dinninup, shooting rabbits until he could go back to work as an orchardist.

He did stints at the Boyup Brook cool store where Mick Atherton taught him to make packing boxes and also worked for George Dickson in his orchards and packing shed. I think this is where the spark was lit for his lifelong friendship with Harvey. He also worked in the store in Dinninup. During the early Dinninup days, he met Mum. Mum remembers the first time she saw him, at 13. He walked in from the dark shadows that surrounded a bonfire her parents were having in their little bit of orchard, behind where Bill's old sheds are now. She remembers a tall, wild looking man in moleskin stovepipe pants. She slunk back behind her mother in fear. He started dating Mum a few years later, and they would go to the pictures with a chaperone.


He bought the house at the top of Gregory Street in Dinninup, and they married in the summer of 1963. My sister was born later that year and the family had started. By 1968, there was us three kids and Dad's father Fillipo, living in our old family home.

Sometime between Alana's birth and mine, Dad started fencing. Dad was never around much when we were little, he worked hard, and played harder. But he did find time to go to night classes in Boyup Brook where under Mr Len Halstrom, he became a reasonably skilled cabinet maker.

At one time he employed and managed two fencing teams. He bought the red MF, brand new, in 1968 and it remained his only ever new vehicle/machine purchase. Darren still owns that tractor today.

Life at Dinninup for Dad was usually all work, but he did join the local repertory club, played cricket, went on duck shoots and we spent many hours at the Dickson's.

It was here both my parents became founding members of the Boyup Brook Country Music Club.

Along with Harvey, whose brainchild it was, and a handful of others, they got the club off the ground.

Around about this time, I started playing Nippers footy and Dad gave up working Saturdays to attend all our games. He immediately took on the role of goal umpire, rarely missing a game.

In 1984, after we had all left home, Mum and Dad left Dinninup with grateful assistance from the late John Bessell. They left good friends and neighbours, the likes of the Thompsons and the Whites and they bought 30 acres at Winnejup, where Dad set out building a new home from the trees he removed from cleaning up the old boundary fence line.

They remained on that property until Dad thought it was time to downsize, and they moved closer to Bridgetown to a 5-acre property with a house. He then went into semi-retirement, where he repainted his tractor, then eventually retiring completely.

35 years a contractor, scores of employees and an estimated 5,000 miles of fencing erected. That's about the same distance the Indian Pacific travels when it crosses the country and back again. Given the number of times you walk up and down a fence line, he may have walked the equivalent of crossing Australia more than ten times.

Following a nasty bushfire, Mum and Dad sold up at Bridgetown, again leaving behind good neighbours like the Barnetts and Pettersons, and he returned to Mt Barker with Mum. He kept himself busy tinkering in the shed and doing repairs, pruning and yard improvements for many of the neighbours and friends.



He reunited with his old school chum Gerard Wright and he became a founding member of the Mt Barker Men's Shed. With the onset of dementia, he handed in his driver's licence, packed the tools away and gave up all his hobbies and handiwork. Alana and I took him on a three week trip to Italy. Though he struggled to remember most of it, he loved it and thanked me, for it was something he said he would never had done.

With his declining health, Mum made the decision to bring him home to Boyup Brook where he could end his days closer to many of his old friends and community. He managed to enjoy a few short years at home with Mum, before a stroke took away his mobility. This set them living apart for the first time in over 58 yrs. This coming January would have seen them reach their 60th wedding anniversary.

He passed peacefully on Tuesday, November 29 with Mum and Alana at his side.

Stories from Alana

Dad was once known as the Dinninup kisser. Blooms travelling boxing tent was at the Dinninup Show. Picture a lady wrestler in a bikini, he wrestled her to the ground and claimed a free kiss. In the process, Dad took her bikini top off as well. What a player.

Another story from Mum. One morning Dad was cooking his eggs and bacon, and said to Mum, "the eggs must be off, they taste funny." Mum enquired what had he sprayed pan with, only for Dad to point out the Black and Gold can of fly spray, obviously a similar looking can to the cooking spray. Mum says he suffered all day.

We shared a few loves. Dad played and sung many tunes on the guitar and I loved to listen. Both my brothers now play acoustic guitar. We shared the love of all animals, especially horses. Out riding one day, Dad's horse Flame reared up and went straight back onto his back, with Dad in the saddle. Luckily the bulk of Dad's body was in the ditch and he wasn't even hurt. He got back on and rode home.

Dad and his good mate Harvey were often cracking stockwhips. One day some hair was required to make the whip "crack" better. No horse hair was handy, and the next best thing was my long hair! I didn't mind, but Mum wasn't happy. Not sure if the whip cracked any better or not.

My Dad was always helping others out, just ask and he was willing to lend a hand. He was a larrikin and often in the bad books with mum, but he was my hero. My life has been enriched by his love and influence. I will treasure our last hug a week before you left us. You put your arm out and invited me in, both of us with tears flowing.





Be Still and Know..... God

Make your words count

'The words of a man's mouth are deep waters; the wellspring of wisdom is a flowing brook.' Proverbs 18:4

When Solomon speaks of 'deep waters', he's referring to the water at the bottom of the well that's the cleanest and coolest. If you want to know what kind of water a well has, go down to the bottom. And if you want to know what's in a person's heart, listen to his or her words.

An old country farmer put it this way: 'What's down in the well always comes up in the bucket!' One of the surest signs of wisdom and maturity is the ability to say the right thing, in the right way, at the right time, to the right person—or to say nothing at all. Indeed, as you become wiser, you'll talk less and say more. In Australia, when someone is arrested, the police are required to read an official caution before questioning them, informing them of their right to remain silent: 'You do not have to say anything... Anything you do say may be given in evidence.' So unless your words are intended to build someone up rather than tear them down, silence is a 'right' you should exercise every day. Sometimes the wisest option is not to give voice to your thoughts.

It's said, 'A wise man is someone who thinks twice before saying nothing.' Again, Solomon weighs in: 'The one who has knowledge uses words with restraint, and whoever has understanding is even-tempered. Even fools are thought wise if they keep silent.' (Proverbs 17:27–28 NIV)

So, it's better to keep your mouth shut when the Holy Spirit prompts you to do so. Silence can be misunderstood but it can never be misquoted.
