

EVACUATION CENTRE CO-CONTRIBUTION FUNDING APPROVED



In a bid to bolster community safety and emergency preparedness, the old footy club rooms and squash courts are set to undergo a transformative makeover. Thanks to funding from the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) coupled with a significant co-contribution from the Shire, the structure will soon emerge as a vital evacuation centre.

The Shire has appointed H+H Architects to lead the design of the new evacuation centre which marks an important milestone in our commitment to providing a multifunctional hub in the sport and recreational area. By repurposing existing infrastructure, the initiative not only maximizes resources but also enhances the town's resilience in the face of adversity. The revamped evacuation centre will be equipped with essential amenities and resources to support residents during evacuations and emergencies, ensuring their safety and well-being.



CEMETERY UPGRADES

To progress one of Council's priority projects, final plans have been received for a comprehensive upgrade of the cemetery. The proposal includes drainage upgrades, 15 bay car park, new accessible ablution block and road surface improvements. Addressing persistent issues of erosion over the whole site, the upgrade plan prioritises enhancing the cemetery's drainage systems. The Shire aims to ensure the grounds remain accessible and well-maintained year-round, providing a respectful environment for those visiting their loved ones. Work is scheduled to commence in the next six months and will take approximately two years to complete.

Recovery Plan Sub Groups - Expression of Interest

The Shire of Boyup Brook is currently reviewing their Local Emergency Management Arrangements (LEMA) which will include a review of the Recovery Plan. The term LEMA refers to the collection of all emergency management documentation, plans, systems, processes, agreements, and memorandums of understanding which affect the local government district. The LEMA are the overarching document and associated sub-plans which the local government is responsible for developing, maintaining, and testing.



A Recovery Plan helps local government respond effectively if an incident or crisis affects the community. It aims to shorten the recovery time and minimise losses and enable a return to business as usual. To support this process the Local Recovery Coordination Groups may establish sub groups depending on the type of disaster. Members of these sub groups will provide visible and strong leadership, and have a key role in restoring confidence to the community through assessing the consequences of the emergency and coordinating activities to rebuild, restore and rehabilitate the affected community under the key pillars of the Strategic Community Plan - Built Environment, Social & Community, Natural Environment, Economic Development and Governance & Organisation,

The Shire of Boyup Brook is seeking voluntary members with strong community connections and leadership skills who are prepared to step up in the event of a disaster. Interested persons will be selected to represent the diverse situations of the disaster, under the key pillars, which will:

- ensure that the Local Recovery Plan addresses the needs, issues and concerns of the community.
- generate a sense of ownership for the Local Recovery Plan within the community.

Attendance at a half day workshop will provide an opportunity for the emergence of new ideas and improve community confidence in recovery. If this sounds like you register your interest at shire@boyupbrook.wa.gov.au with EOI Recovery Sub Groups in the subject line. Please make sure you nominate which pillar you feel most appropriate to your skills and knowledge in the body of the email and submit by close of business Friday 29th March 2024.

Some roadside litter in our Shire is not deliberate, it has come from trucks, utes, or trailers where the load has not been correctly secured. Removing this litter is usually by Shire staff and comes at a considerable expense to rate payers.

When travelling at allowable road speeds, even very small items falling off an open vehicle can cause hazards to other road users. Litter along roads usually goes to roadside drains, then into local creeks and rivers, finally into the ocean and our beaches. To make your load safe in your ute or trailer and reduce litter resulting from unsecured loads:

- Always secure your load before going on the road.
- Secure garden refuse with a tarpaulin or trailer net.
- Use good quality straps to secure furniture and white goods.
- Use webbing or straps to restrain cardboard boxes.
- Tools should be secured in a toolbox or using rope, straps or trailer net.



What do you mean I'm not in the plan?

When preparing your family and property for natural hazards, you also need to consider your pets and livestock in your household's planning for emergencies.

- Ensure that your pets have a name tag or microchip or that you have a recent photo of them with you, and that stock registers for your livestock are current.
- Ask your local government if there are pet or livestock welfare arrangements in place during an emergency.
- The best way to protect your pet is to move them to a safer area in advance. This may mean taking them to relatives, friends, animal boarding facilities or to a temporary animal shelter or evacuation centre which accepts animals.
- When relocating your pets make sure that you supply sufficient non-perishable pet food for several days and feed/water bowls, a leash and possibly a muzzle or a carry-cage, bag, or box, toilet litter or old newspapers and essential medications, medical history, and yet contact details
- · Allow for the special needs of some animals

The Rural Impressions Art Awards and Exhibition, held as a key fringe event of the Boyup Brook Country Music Festival, displayed a dazzling array of artworks amidst the action of the 2024 Street Markets and Carnival.

They had a very hard time narrowing their choices to award the first, second and third place getters, as well as an Under 18 Award. Due to the high standard of works on offer, they also chose to award Highly Commended certificates to a variety of artworks.

POLICE NEWS



The start of this year has gone by in a flash. If anyone is like me, they have written 2023 on enough documents that it's finally starting to sink in that we are already two months into 2024.

I quickly want to acknowledge Erlanda and Marc Deas as well as the other volunteers on the successful conduct of the Boyup Brook Community Fox Shoot. The event was well organised and safely run with a large amount of people in attendance. A great effort with money being raised for Regional Men's Health and a huge number of feral animals being removed from the local area.

By the time this article is published, the annual Boyup Brook Country Music Festival as well as the Ute and Truck Muster will have already been and gone. The sea of grey nomad's receding into the sunset, the utes fishtailing to the horizon, and Adams' float safety cages placed into storage for next year. Congratulations to the organisers and volunteers, I'm sure that the event was successfully run as usual.

If you are not a firearms licence holder, the next part of the article will probably not interest you and you can skip it. The meat and potatoes of this article is the upcoming *Voluntary Firearm Buyback Scheme* announced by the WA government. The scheme opens 21 February 2024 and closes 31 August 2024.

As per the Police website:

'All WA individual firearm licence holders are eligible to receive compensation for surrendered firearms, regardless of whether legislative changes impact their licence.'

What this means to you, is that if you have a firearm you "no longer want", you can bring it into the police station and the government will pay you for it. Due to a large number of expected firearms, Boyup Brook Police will be doing 'Buy Backs' every Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 9am—12pm.

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Boyup Brook and Surroundings

We will endeavour to make sure we are there at these times, however this is in addition to our regular duties, so there is a chance we may be on an emergency call during these times. Feel free to email us on:

boyup.brook.pol.station@police.wa.gov.au and pre-warn us of your attendance (apologies for the lengthy email address, I didn't come up with it.)

A few points that I would like to ask of those attending the station:

- **1.** Please make sure your **FIREARM IS UNLOADED** before bringing it into the police station.
- 2. The buyback is only for firearms, not ammunition.
- 3. Make sure you have your firearm licence with you.
- **4.** Remove any accessories from the firearm you wish to keep. E.g. scopes, slings etc.
- **5.** Have your completed buyback form ready to go with your correct bank details.
- 6. This buyback is for licensed firearms only. There is an ongoing Amnesty in WA for unlicensed firearms, you will not be prosecuted for handing them in, but you will not be compensated for them.

If you are rude to any staff during the process you will be escorted from the station. Please keep in mind that police are here to enact the state governments policy and are not the decision makers in the upcoming legislation.

Rural Men's Resilience Program





Season Forecast 2024

It's official - it is hot. The Word Meteorological Association (WMO) has announced that 2023 was the warmest year on record. The WMO estimated globally that temperatures were 1.45C above the 1850 - 1900 average.

Significantly, the global sea surface temperatures recorded the highest numbers on record for every month from April 2023 and January 2024. Does this impact our seasonal forecast?

Currently we are in an El Nino, which is forecast to decline in May. Normally there is a 50:50 chance after a El Nino event to slide into either a neutral state or a La Nina state. The warming oceans however reduce the confidence with which we can look at historical trends as an indicator of future season forecasts.

The models are currently showing that the sea surface temperatures in the central Pacific are expected to decline, shifting our current El Nino to a neutral pattern. This will take effect in Autumn of 2024.

Whilst the El Nino - Southern Oscillation Index (ENSO) is important in Australia, it is not the biggest driver in the South West land division. In conjunction with the ENSO index we look at other drivers:

The Southern Oscillation Index (SOI) is close to neutral, which is good. The SOI is a measure of the relative pressure difference between Tahiti and Darwin. A positive SOI indicates La Nina, negative indicates El Nino.

SOI moving to neutral is good. The ENSO does not have a direct, strong influence on the SW land division, however in a strongly negative SOI situation we trend toward El Nino, which has the flow on effect of weakening the Leeuwin Current. (Conversely La Nina strengthens the Leeuwin Current). The Leeuwin Current is strongest in winter, bringing warm waters to our south west shores, providing warm moist air that helps winter rainfall.

The **Indian Ocean Dipole** (IOD) is neutral, which is good.

The IOD is the pressure differential in the Indian Ocean, specifically between two points - one in the Arabian sea, the other in the sea south of Indonesia. A positive IOD gives a decile 3-4 rainfall for the SW land division, whilst a negative IOD increases rainfall due to more cloud bands, this effect extends into the Wheatbelt. Most models show the IOD neutral until

The **Southern Annular Mode** (SAM) is currently positive which is ok for now, this doesn't affect us in summer. The SAM refers to how far north the westerlies winds occur in the middle latitudes of the southern hemisphere. Positive SAM means the Westerlies contract toward the South Pole, meaning cold fronts slip past the SW land division.

A Negative SAM means more northward contraction for westerlies, so more storms and low pressure systems across the SW. The SAM is expected to return to neutral in the near future. We want a Negative SAM in Winter, to increase rain event frequency.

All things considered, at the moment there are no clear signals that we are in for either a wet or a dry season; however, the signs we have are generally positive for an average season. The record Sea Surface Temperatures has the effect of reducing confidence in our ENSO forecast.

The global temperature lift has lead to a trend toward higher intensity, shorter duration rainfall events. This has implications for residue management, erosion control, managing infiltration, avoiding furrow fill and managing run-off.

Cancer Cancer

Are you up to date with your bowel cancer screening?

Cancer Council WA is calling for more West Australians to complete the free lifesaving bowel cancer screening test, with figures showing only four in 10 eligible Australians are participating in Australia's National Bowel Cancer Screening Program.

Bowel cancer is Australia's second biggest cancer killer. Many people don't realise it kills more Australians each year than breast, prostate, or skin cancer.

When you receive the Home Test Kit, don't put it in the cupboard and forget about it - delaying can so easily become ignoring, forgetting, and ultimately not doing the test.

The test is quick, simple and can be completed in the comfort of your own home. Over 90 per cent of bowel cancer cases can be successfully treated if caught in the early stages.

Backyard Buddies

Plant Abnormalities

Plant abnormalities have intrigued gardeners and botanists alike for many years. These abnormalities sometime result in strange growths or odd variations. Causes include environmental or genetic factors, pests, and disease. Below are some common examples.

Witches' broom

Witches' broom is a symptom of stress in woody plants resulting in a deformed mass of twigs and branches, which looks broomlike in appearance. Causes include insect pests, viruses, fungi, environmental factors and genetic mutations.

Fasciation

Fasciation appears as abnormal flattened, ribbon-like, crested or elaborately contorted stems or leaves. Causes include hormonal, genetic, bacterial, fungal, viral and environmental.

Chimera

Chimera is the result of a genetic mutation. The overall appearance of fruit can be changed and sections of the rind or skin can appear striped and/or green. This is often reported in citrus where the rind colour is perfectly split between yellow and orange. Chimera leaf mutations produce variegated, misshapen, or completely white leaves.

Phyllody

Phyllody is the abnormal development of the leaf tissue caused by viral infections or environmental factors resulting in an imbalance of the plant hormones. It makes leaves grow in strange places.

Is control or reporting necessary?

Not much can be done to prevent these oddities. Keep plants as healthy as possible to allow them to fight off pests and diseases as best they can. If you don't want them on your plants, consider removing the affected parts. Remember to disinfect gardening equipment before and after, to avoid spreading pests and diseases. We would love to see photos of any weird or wonderful plant growths or variations. Take photos, tell us what you've found and on what plant. 






Book Review

Platypus

By Sue Whiting and Mark Jackson First published in 2015

This enchanting children's book is a story to be enjoyed with beautiful illustrations, however, it is also factual. Did you know British scientists first studied the Platypus in 1799!



Platypus do not walk well on land, they are better adapted to digging and swimming. The book teaches children about these amazing mammals - how they swim, find food, how they store their food and where they can eat their catch.

The illustrations are drawn in such a natural way, they draw you into the book enabling your child to identify other animals also living around the still pools in the creek. Predators and defense mechanisms are addressed as well how the female platypus ensures her babies are protected. Environmental concerns about their habitat are also discussed.

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

Discover the Arts in the Heart of the South West -

The Blackwood River Arts Trail (BRAT) is the must-see arts event in the South West of Western Australia held each year in the Blackwood River region that includes Nannup, Bridgetown-Greenbushes, Donnybrook-Balingup and Boyup Brook.

Now in its fourth year, BRAT presents 67 artists opening their home studios for an intriguing glimpse into their processes and creative environments; as well as exhibitions held in more than 35 venues. A range of art forms can be found along the trail including sculpture, painting, ceramics, textile and wearable art, mosaics, weaving, felting, illustration and photography. There is also the opportunity to participate in a variety of creative workshops offered by artists along the trail.

Artwork on display around Boyup Brook will include that of award-winning painters Neil Nicholson, and Lori Pensini. Neil (a volunteer at the Visitor Centre) began painting in 2012, after finding inspiration in the rugged landscapes of the Pilbara region and has since won several awards. He is self-taught, working mostly with acrylics.

Boyup Brook will have 12 artists showing their work in a variety of locations: The Little Art Gallery at the Boyup Brook Visitor Centre will be showing works by Beverley Prideaux, Neil Nicholson, Gulia Iv, Sandy Chambers and Anna Murchison.



Naomi Rice will be showing her photography at the **Treehouse** Coffee Lounge, and YARN n CO will display works by Tina Matthews, Joanna Hales-Pearce, Estelle Rowcliffe Carlson, Sarah Brlevich and Mark Brlevich. Out of town Lori Pensini will open her Farm Studio on McLarty Rd.

Be Still and Know..... God

Joy Comes in the Morning

'Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for He who promised is faithful.' Hebrews 10:23 NKJV

You will notice that during the creation process, God counts days based on the previous nights. The Bible doesn't say, 'The morning and evening were the first day.' No, it says, 'God called "the evening and the morning" the first day' (Genesis 1:5 KJV). That means God specialises in bringing light out of darkness – you just have to get through one to get to the other!

God told Moses that the angel of death would come at night, and wherever he saw the blood of the lamb on the doorposts, the inhabitants of that house would be saved (see Exodus 12:12-13). Exodus states that God 'sent a *wind that blew all night until there was dry land* and the Israelites walked through' (Exodus 14:21-22 CEV). The psalmist wrote, 'Weeping may endure for a night, but joy comes in the morning' (Psalm 30:5 NKJV).

On Easter Friday Jesus, who had walked this earth for 33 years doing good and helping others, was condemned to death when false witnesses lied about Him in a mockery of a trial. He was tortured for hours, whipped and beaten, and then nailed to a cross where He died in agony. And He endured it all for you and for me. But, 3 days later He rose up victorious from the grave and is alive forevermore, making a way for us to have new life with Him.

The dawn is all the more brilliant because of the darkness that preceded it, just as your progress is all the more rewarding when set against a backdrop of pain, gain, and breakthrough. Great mornings come by getting through rough nights. When you see somebody who is having a great day, chances are you're looking at somebody who has been through a long night. When you hear them shouting the victory, it may be because they have spent the night praying and weeping before God. The Bible says, 'Let us hold tightly without wavering to the hope we affirm, for God can be trusted to keep his promise' (Hebrews 10:23 NLT). Trusting God is more than just wishful thinking. It's knowing that if He said it, He will do it. It's realising He doesn't just control creation, He controls your circumstances, when you turn to Him. So, 'hold fast'.

I asked Jesus, "How much do You love me?" "This much," He answered. Then He stretched out His arms on the cross and died.


