Local Women Take Out Awards

Renee Knapp attended the Community Achievement Awards for Regional WA in Perth on Friday, October 21 and was awarded the Stumpy's Roadhouse Local Legend Award.

These awards aim to encourage and celebrate valuable contributions made by individuals, communities and businesses in regional and rural Western Australia. The Local Legend Award acknowledges those individuals making a significant contribution at a local level.

Renee was recognised for her hard work in improving mental health outcomes for youth and the community through the Boyup Brook Community Mental Health Action (CoMHAT).

Renee said she was completely flawed by the announcement, "It was an exciting evening spent with incredible individuals doing amazing things across our WA communities."

She now hopes to take the framework she has developed to help other communities implement their own mental health strategies to suit their unique circumstances. Local artist Lori Pensini has been awarded one of WA's most prestigious arts prizes, the 2022 Perth Royal Art Prize for landscape.

Lori is pictured below with her piece, 'Ascension - wattle spirit landscape'. It was created using oil paint and burnt red gum wood on linen. Lori said the pieces of burnt wood were collected from the Bridgetown bushfire, after the close call over the summer.

She was humbly overwhelmed by the win, as she said the competition was very steep.

In the catalogue, the judges comments read, "a unanimous decision to award the main prize to this exceptional contemporary, and timely, environmental comment about our landscape. There is a strong command of the medium and subject matter. Pensini's skilful execution of opaque and transparent qualities culminates in an intense and glowing painting. Bristling with energy the hovering wattle contrasts to the barren, stagnant landscape below."

Change of Details - Rates

Thank you to ratepayers who have completed and returned the Change of Details form.

To those that have not returned the form, it would be appreciated if you could complete this form and return to the Shire administration, even if all the information is correct.

There is an obligation on property owners to ensure that the Shire has the correct address for service of notices. The Shire accepts no responsibility for mail not received due to an incorrect mailing address or a mail redirection.

By completing the form, it will ensure Shire Rates information is current and may also assist in avoiding debt collection if you have missed paying the rates.

BPAY – Important information

Each assessment has a unique Biller Code, therefore if making payment by BPAY please ensure a separate BPAY payment is made for each assessment.

If a payment is made for several assessments, it is the ratepayer's responsibility to inform the shire of the individual assessment numbers the payments are to be allocated to. If the shire has not been informed of the allocation, interest will be incurred on those assessments with monies showing as outstanding.

Payment Options

The shire offers instalment plan options when the original rate notice for the year is raised.

Some ratepayers are choosing to set up BPAY through their preferred financial institution to pay an allocated amount each week/fortnight/month, so the credit reduces the amount to be paid when rates are raised.

Year 10 Mystery Tour

On Tuesday, October 18 Mrs Reimers and Mrs Morgan accompanied the Year 10 students to participate in a series of presentations by the emergency services, regarding road safety and safe driver behaviour, as an awareness session before these students start to learn to drive on public roads.

The event began with watching videos and having discussions with local police officers about the impact of making poor decisions when getting behind the wheel of a vehicle (drinking before driving, not wearing a seat belt, looking at or using mobile phones).

We were taken to an accident scene where emergency department staff demonstrated emergency procedures and stabilisation of a casualty. We followed this casualty to a hospital scene, where doctors and nurses worked on the casualty, then to the morgue beneath the hospital where police reported on what occurs and how they inform the families of deceased persons. Following this, funeral directors explained the process of organising a funeral as students viewed a coffin in a hearse.

As you can imagine, the students and staff found this tour very confronting. However, what was most confronting was hearing about the impact of vehicle accidents on families and loved ones. We heard the stories from two courageous speakers. One who spoke of the long road to recovery following a vehicle accident, and the other of the long-term heartache of losing a child in a vehicle accident.

Upon our return to school, we sat down together to debrief about the experience. Some thought it was a little too confronting, some understood that it is reality and therefore warranted, most had despair for the many emergency service people that attend these scenes all too often, and all agreed upon the importance of being responsible when getting behind the wheel of a vehicle or being a passenger in a vehicle.

This excursion was a very worthwhile event for students to participate in, as it allowed them to experience real life situations whereby emergency services are used and demonstrated how their actions on our roads can lead to life changing events.



We Wear Green

Snake season generally hits between September and April as they start to venture out looking for food or a mate. Australia is home to the world's most venomous snakes, with approximately 3,000 snake bites occurring each year. Snakes don't go out of their way to harm humans and most bites occur when people are trying to catch or kill a snake. If you come across a snake, do not approach it or try and catch it – call your local snake catcher.

If you are bitten by a snake, stay calm. While that's easier said than done, staying calm and still after a snake bite can help slow down the spread of venom in your body. If you've been bitten by a poisonous snake, not moving might save your life.

Snake venom moves through your lymphatic system. Lymph is a fluid in your body that contains white blood cells. Unlike blood, which is pumped around your body continuously, your lymph moves when you move your limbs. If you can stay still and calm, you can prevent the venom in your lymph traveling further into your body.

If you're sure the snake has moved away after biting you and you're not in danger of being bitten again, call 000 or send someone to do this. Remain where you are, rather than walking to get help if you can. If you're with other people, they shouldn't move you at all, but start administering first aid where you are.

Take long, deep breaths to help calm yourself down. Remember that the odds are in your favour: it's rare for people to die after being bitten by a snake, especially if they follow first aid steps.



St John Ambulance recommends the following in the event of a snake bite:

- 1. DRSABCD (Danger, Response, Send for help, Airway, Breathing, CPR, Defibrillation)
- 2. Seek urgent medical aid. Call **Triple Zero (000)** for an ambulance.
- 3. Ensure the casualty does not move.
- 4. Lay the casualty down, rest and reassure.
- 5. If the bite is on a limb, apply a broad pressure bandage over the bite site as soon as possible.
- 6. Then apply a further elasticised or firm bandage start at fingers or toes and move up the limb as far as can be reached. Apply tightly but without stopping blood flow.
- 7. Splint the limb including the joints on either side of the bite.
- 8. Write down the time that the casualty was bitten and when the bandage was applied.
- 9. If the casualty becomes unconscious and not breathing normally, commence CPR and defibrillation if available.


Do Not - Wash the venom off the skin, cut the bitten area or try to suck the venom out of the wound, use a tourniquet or try and catch the snake.

Signs and symptoms

- Visible in an hour or more after bite, sooner in children
- Fang marks or scratch at bite site
- Nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea.
- Headache, drowsiness, giddiness or faintness.
- Double or blurred vision, drooping eyelids.
- Voice changes, trouble speaking or swallowing. Pain or tightness in the throat, chest or abdomen.
- Breathing difficulties, respiratory weakness or arrest.

The best thing you can do to protect yourself and others is to complete a first aid course. You can do this by booking online at www.stjohnwa.com.au or by contacting the Boyup Brook subcentre on 9765 2155.

Unfortunately the Recycling Hub is longer be accepting Redcycle Soft Plastics. We regularly received too much of this item, making it unsustainable to provide the service. We still encourage you to recycle your soft plastics, by carting them to a Coles or Woolworths store.

Renters Experiencing Financial Difficulty

As living costs rise, many tenants may find themselves in a difficult financial position and struggle to pay rent.

We urge tenants who miss (or expect to miss) a rental payment to explain their situation to their landlord or real estate agent as soon as possible to hopefully avoid stressful breach notices, potential court action and even eviction.

A landlord might agree to a rent reduction for a period of time, waive a payment or agree to defer payment over a longer timeframe while you get back on your feet.

Your landlord's willingness to help may depend on their own financial position and whether you've been a responsible tenant, however it could be in their interest to negotiate a solution.

In shared tenancies, the landlord might let you assign the agreement to a replacement co-tenant, or allow you to sub-let the property to another tenant to help share the cost.

It is wise to avoid pay-day loans or buy now pay later schemes to pay your rent. They might look like an easy way out, but can make a difficult financial situation worse.

If you have a periodic tenancy, you can provide 21 days' written notice to terminate the agreement. Remember that it is usually easier to move from one rental into another, rather than try to find a new tenancy once court action or an eviction process has commenced.

Should you fail to pay rent, a landlord can either issue a breach notice requiring you to pay the outstanding amount in 14 days, or a termination notice giving you seven days to vacate. A landlord cannot force you out of a property by changing the locks or tampering with the water and power supply.

If you don't pay all rent owing by the due date and don't move out, the landlord must apply to the Magistrates Court for an order to vacate. A tenant can ask the magistrate to delay the termination for 30 days if they're likely to suffer hardship (such as being unable to find other accommodation).

HOW TO CREATE A MYGOV ACCOUNT - Follow these steps:

- 1 Go to my.gov.au and select Create account.
- 2 Select Continue with myGov details and agree to the terms of use.
- **3** Enter an email address. The same email can't be used for two myGov accounts. If you share an email address with someone, only one of you can use it to create a myGov account.
- 4 Enter the code we sent to your email.
- **5** Enter your mobile number and enter the code we send you. If you don't have a mobile device or mobile reception, skip this step.
- **6** Enter and re-enter a password. It must have at least 7 characters and include at least 1 letter and 1 number. Passwords are case sensitive and can include any of the following special characters: !, @, #, \$, %, ^, &, *
- **7** Choose 3 secret questions or answers or write your own. Answers aren't case sensitive.
- 8 You've created a myGov account!

For your security, remember to sign out of your linked services and myGov account, and close your browser when you've finished.

If you prefer, you can create a myGov account with a Digital Identity. Select Continue with Digital Identity at Step 2 and follow the prompts.

Services Australia and My Aged Care

If you need some help to find out what services are available to you as you are getting older, there are a number of ways to access support from Services Australia.

The My Aged Care website (www.myagedcare.gov.au) provides useful information about what services are available and how to start the process.

If you would prefer face to face support, staff in all Services Australia service centres (the closest is Bunbury) can provide free, general information.

In addition, services centres in Busselton, Fremantle, Mandurah and Warwick Grove have Aged Care Specialist Officers (ACSO) who can:

- provide in-depth information on the different types of aged care services
- check if you're eligible for government-funded services and making a referral for an aged care assessment
- help you appoint a representative for My Aged Care
- provide financial information about aged care services
- connect you to local support services

To book an appointment with one of these specialists, you need to phone the Services Australia Aged Care Line - 1800 227 475. It is useful to prepare a list of questions before this discussion takes place.

This helpline can also be used to talk about aged care services, home care packages or aged care home costs.

The Financial Information Service (FIS) is also recommended by contacting 132 300.

Keeping Up with the Cost of Living

Times are tough for many Western Australians right now, so lots of households will be looking at ways to manage their rising living costs and keep on top of bills.

To help consumers manage their living expenses, the Australian Securities and Investment Commission's (ASIC) Moneysmart service has developed a cost of living 'hub' on its website.

The hub contains information to help consumers make a plan, including how to prepare a budget to track where money is spent, prioritise what matters most and identify any expenses that can be reduced.

With interest rates on the rise, some consumers may be concerned about meeting their mortgage repayments. Taking action straight away can stop a small problem from becoming a big one, so these consumers are urged to talk to their lender as soon as possible. The hub talks through the steps to apply for a financial hardship variation, which may involve changing the loan's terms, or temporarily pausing or reducing repayments.

Financial hardship assistance may also be available for those struggling to pay their rent, utility bills, credit cards, loans and insurance premiums, so these consumers are also advised to contact their providers sooner rather than later to discuss possible options.

Further advice is provided on how consumers can save for an emergency fund to cover urgent or unexpected costs for things like car repairs, unexpected travel or an urgent medical bill.

For those living on a low income, the hub provides guidance on what financial support is available, as well as exploring practical ways to manage costs, such as automating regular bill payments and paying large bills in smaller instalments.

Consumers needing help to get debt under control and their finances back on track can talk to a financial counsellor, who can help prioritise bills and repayments. The National Debt Helpline provides a free, confidential financial counselling service on 1800 007 007.

There is also advice on where to turn in a crisis for help with food, housing, bills and emergency support, plus a reminder that help is available via Beyond Blue on 1300 22 46 36 if financial stress is impacting on mental health.

National Recycling Week is taking place from November 7-13 and this year, organisers Planet Ark are exploring the idea that *Waste isn't Waste until it's Wasted*.






Puzzles

For example, if the number in the square box was 10 you could try 6 and 4, but the numbers must also add up on the other edges, making this more difficult than it first appears.









Problem solving

When we are knocked down, we get up again.' 2 Corinthians 4:9 CEV

Every problem you face in life introduces you to yourself. It shows you how you think and what you're made of. People basically respond to problems in three ways:

- 1. they refuse to accept them
- 2. they accept them and then endure them, or
- 3. they accept them and try to improve things.

Which of the three people are you?

Paul was a problem solver. He knew that with God on his side, he would prevail. 'We are like clay jars in which this treasure is stored. The real power comes from God and not from us. We often suffer, but we are never crushed. Even when we don't know what to do, we never give up. In times of trouble, God is with us, and when we are knocked down, we get up again.'(2 Corinthians 4:7–9 CEV)

So when it comes to having problems, what should you do?

- Anticipate them. Since problems are unavoidable, prepare for them spiritually, mentally, and emotionally. If you pray for God's best and anticipate Satan's worst, you will find yourself in a good position to solve the problems that come your way.
- See the big picture. You can't afford to be overcome by emotion or get bogged down and lose sight of what's important.
