



Second for Shearers

After coming third place at the first WA shearing competition for the season in Corrigin, Boyup Brook couple Luke and Jess Harding have gone one better at the 2023 Perth Royal Show.

With a total score of 70.05, Luke came second place in the Show's Open Shearing Championship, and in the Open Wool Handling Championship, Jess also placed second with a total score of 49.85.

Entering competitions like this is a hobby that the Harding's enjoy doing together and as Luke and Jess don't work full-time in the shearing sheds at home, coming second at such a big event is a big deal for them both.

Jess said the shearing circuit is, "a really positive and happy environment to be involved in," and she'd like to acknowledge the novice shearers that are giving it a go.



I would like to extend a warm welcome to Jarrod Hales, who joins our team at Boyup Brook District High School. Jarrod will be covering the Design Technologies and Health classes in the high school.

Even though we are only into our second week of the term we have already begun with an engaging trades workshop for our Year 9 students. There are many more exciting events on our calendar for the term including Athletics Carnival, Year 6 Transitions, Interschool Carnival, Graduations, Award Ceremony, and tonnes of important learning in between!

SALT Workshop

As part of our Careers Program, Boyup Brook District High School hosted a SALT Workshop for Year 9 students from Boyup Brook DHS and Kojonup DHS.

Supporting and Linking Tradeswomen (S.A.L.T.) travel across Australia to provide support and mentoring to tradeswomen, promote women in the trades to the general public and industry, and provide students with basic life skills with tools which are useful in everyday lives. Students were split into groups and given a tradesperson as their mentor.

They commenced with a safety induction and all participants were given personal protective equipment (PPE) and told the importance of following all instructions from their tradie. They created a timber project from measuring up, cutting and assembling.

The tools and skills included: measuring with tapes and set squares; cutting with a variety of saws such as hand saw, drop saw and jigsaw; and assembling with drills, impact drivers, nails, screws, hammers, nail punches and different drill bits. Each tool was explained, and correct use shown and overseen.

This workshop achieved the most in terms of gaining tool skills and engaging students in discussion around making positive career choices, and the many different pathways into which enable them to earn reasonable wages to support themselves and their families.

CELEBRATING COMMUNITY

RED Grants supporting local Warren-Blackwood busineses

I was thrilled five Warren-Blackwood projects shared in almost \$470,000 under the latest Cook Labor Government's Regional Economic Development (RED) Grants program.

South West Hops in Yornup was awarded \$99,392 to increase the growth of hops on their farm through the introduction of a new processing plant. The new infrastructure and equipment, along with its availability to other hops growers, will assist in the expansion of this industry while also increasing the capacity of South West Hops to supply both fresh and pelletised hops to brewers.

A \$64,485 grant to Boyup Brook Hotel will assist with the redevelopment to re-open the kitchen, restaurant, bar and 10 guest accommodation facilities to the public.

The Margaret River Chocolate Company will use their \$85,000 grant to expand the existing facility in Margaret River to double the size and capacity of the manufacturing - from 50 to 100 tonnes per year - area as well as increase the outdoor seating capacity of their restaurant by an additional 80 seats.

A \$150,000 RED Grant was awarded to the development of the Ocean Beach Health Group Allied Health Centre in Denmark, including five room, multi-disciplinary allied health centre to provide a shared care model of healthcare.



A \$70,000 RED Grant has been allocated to the Cannabis Botanical Distillery in Denmark to increase their manufacturing space and capacity of production to boost future exports. Production capacity will expand from 3,500 to 35,000 litres per year.

Congratulations to each of the grant recipients and it was great to help you celebrate recently.

I look forward to seeing these projects get underway, celebrating as they progress and seeing our communities benefit.

Pub Secures Grant Funding

New owner of the Boyup Brook Hotel, John Matthews recently secured grant funding to help continue his upgrades of the hotel, with the accommodation area now on the agenda to get some improvements.

\$64,485 was secured through the State Government's Regional Economic Development (RED) Grants, and it will go towards the hotel's accommodation upgrades.

With the town in need of more short-stay accommodation options, this is a great win for the community as well.

John said the grant funding would help to cover about half of the upgrades planned and he is hoping to kick off the works as soon as possible.

John would like to thank those that helped him during the grant process: Shire of Boyup Brook, Boyup Brook Tourism Association, Jane Kelsbie MLA, Bush Poets and Kirsten Skraha.

Renovations to the local pub have been ongoing since February, and John thinks he is nearing 60% completion. The bottle shop is newly opened and whilst they are still learning, patience is called for as processes might be a little slow to start.

It is hoped that the bar opening will follow in mid-November, but there is a free event coming up that will help get you through the doors sooner.







Parrots Damage Grasstrees

The issue of grasstrees dying after being foraged on heavily by parrots commonly known as 28's (Australian Ringneck or Port Lincoln Ringneck) has again become a concern. This has been a problem for at least 30 years. It's just that it has not been in the news until Carole and Alan Hester wanted something done about the recent death of grasstrees in their remnant bush where they have a magnificent stand of grasstrees.

Julia Cullity is the Community Bushland Coordinator for the Urban Nature Program (Parks and Wildlife Service) and has invited Shapelle McNee to write an article for Bushland News. Shapelle conducted a study, more than 20 years ago, measuring the damage to grasstrees by 28's, and then radio tracking some of them within the Shire of Boyup Brook.

Adrian Price worked with Shapelle from 1998 to 2001 when 28's were being radio tracked. Shapelle has agreed to prepare an article summarising these studies for Bushland News.

We are interested to hear if any recent damage to grasstrees by 28's has been observed, say in the last five to ten years. We know that from 1990 to at least 2009, grasstree damage and grasstree deaths have been observed by local farmers within their remnant vegetation.

During the 1996 to 2001 study, grasstree crown damage and deaths were recorded in the Boyup Brook, Kojonup and West Arthur Shires. Some of the sites were at Dinninup, Six Mile Road and in a reserve at Mayanup. Where else have the 28's spread their wings to devastate communities of grasstrees? Do you have suggestions of how the damage to grasstrees by parrots can be avoided?

Most of the grasstrees that have died were older than the sycamore cut down in England resulting in worldwide publicity, or the poisoned tree in Barcaldine, Queensland where shearers gathered to form the Australian Labor Party in 1891.


Following the successful 'Access All Abilities' event held in 2022, the Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre (CRC) is continuing to advocate to improve inclusion and community participation. Members of the disabled community are invited to share their personal experiences, both positive and negative, of accessibility in Boyup Brook.

There is an opportunity for you to drop in to the CRC on Tuesday, November 14 between 1pm-3pm and Thursday, November 16 between 8:30am-10am to share your experiences, issues, suggested improvements and good news stories.

Your stories will be de-identified, collated and summarised and presented at a follow up forum – 'Community Access for All' - on Monday, December 4 from 5:30pm-7pm.

At this event, members of Local Government, businesses and community groups will be invited to engage with the disability community, with the aim to increase awareness of accessibility and inclusion issues and creating possible solutions to improve the lives of those living with disability in Boyup Brook.





In Touch Farming

Summer Rain; a blessing or a curse? Depends on your mind set. Summer rainfall, although reducing the quality of the summer feed in paddocks, can provide an opportunity to plant summer forage crops like SSS or Millett, to graze stock on highly palatable, high protein and high Metabolised Energy (ME) pastures, thus boosting growth rates and overall health, and also giving the animal a good summer platform and reducing hand feeding.

Mineralisation of N

Mineralisation of N from summer rainfall occurs when there is a rainfall event of 15mm or more in one 24hr period after January 1st. Mineralisation has been minimal in the last few years with very little summer rainfall and in 2023, there was zero summer rainfall.

Mineralisation of N from summer rainfall won't replace the need for nitrogen inputs but goes a long way to assisting crops get up and growing.

If summer rainfall events occur, keep an eye on weeds in your cropping, Hay, and spray topped paddocks and spray before they become a problem.

Don't rely on grazing control as a stand-alone to dispense with summer weeds in these paddocks. Grazing weeds will not reduce their impact on the following crop.

For example, grazing a melon plant from eight-leaf down to two-leaf will only make it harder and less likely to get 100% control with a herbicide when spraying finally occurs, as you end up with a two-leaf plant that has a massive root system that will have explosive growth when it gets wet. Herbicide control first, then graze is the option recommended.

Summer Forage Crops to Consider SSS

- Is a highly palatable forage sorghum at all growth stages, quick regrowth and is suitable for all stock types.
- o Fine stem
- Suitable for hay or silage
- o Prolific tillering
- o Plant at 15C + soil temperature
- o 5kg per ha for this area

Millett

- o Fast growing and highly palatable
- o Salt tolerant
- Suitable for hay or silage
- o Plant at 14C + soil temperature
- o 10-12kg per ha for this area

Preparing an Emergency Kit

Having an emergency kit will help your family prepare for an emergency. An emergency kit provides essential items for your family's short-term survival whether you choose to stay at home or relocate to a safer place before, during or after a natural hazard such as bushfire, cyclone, storm and flood. Store your emergency kit in an easy-to-grab place.

When a bushfire is likely to impact your home, staying to defend it or preparing to shelter in place is extremely dangerous. You must be mentally and physically ready and have an extensive emergency kit plus an independent supply of power and water to increase your chances of survival.

If you don't know that you could handle the life-threatening situation and keep your family safe, then your best option is to evacuate early and have an emergency evacuation kit.

You should prepare your kit before the bushfire season and keep it in an accessible spot that everyone knows about.

Emergency Evacuation Kit

No matter where you are across the state, your emergency kit should include the essential items you need to keep your family comfortable and safe while you evacuate and until it's safe to return.

Emergency evacuation kit list:

- Important/legal documents
- Valuable items (photos, jewelry, medals, etc)
- Clothing for everyone



- First aid kit
- Drinking water and food for the trip
- Personal hygiene items
- Battery operated radio and spare batteries

Items to grab when leaving:

- Wallet/ purse
- Medications/ life support equipment
- · Phone, laptop and chargers
- House and car keys
- Pet supplies (food, bowl, cage, leash, etc)

If you decide to relocate you need to add in:

- Sleeping bags, blankets and towels
- Waterproof ponchos
- · Spare clothing
- Tent or tarpaulin
- Pen and paper
- · Books, playing cards or board games

Check and update the contents of your emergency kit every twelve months. Store your emergency kit where it is easy to access. Make sure all family members know where the emergency kit is stored. Consider special items for infants, the elderly, those sick or injured and people with disability including all their medical needs.

Backyard Buddies - Ants in Plants & Pavers?

Want to know what your problem ants are and how to control them? You've come to the right place.

There are thousands of ant species in Australia, and most are difficult to identify without a microscope and specialist knowledge. There are very effective baits for some species, while others require control using sprays. Other species rarely need any control and can be left alone.

Unless you know the species of ant, control can be guesswork, which can waste your time and money, and involve the unnecessary use of pesticides.

By submitting samples for identification, you can learn about the species of ants at your property and how to control them, plus you'll contribute to ant surveillance in WA.

Detections in recent years of exotic and problematic species such as the African black sugar ant, red imported fire ant and browsing ant, is a testament to the ability of ants to arrive in WA via freight and cargo.

Their rapid detection provides the best chance of eradication and prevents the economic, social and environmental impacts caused by these ants.

For ant identification services, we request that only *dead* specimens are submitted. This will prevent any unintended spread of the ants, whilst keeping the postie happy!

Sampling instructions

- Brush ants into a sealed container, Ziplock bag or collect ants using the sticky side of transparent tape and fix this gently to a piece of paper (see image for example).
- Place sample in the freezer for 1
 2 hours to kill any live ants.
- Label samples with the collection location e.g. backyard, kitchen, bathroom, driveway etc., and include a note with your name, address, contact number and email address.
- Deliver or post to: Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS), Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development, 3 Baron-Hay Court, South Perth WA 6151.
- Any suspected exotic ant species should be reported for biosecurity screening to the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.



Be Still and Know..... God

'The father shall make known Your truth to the children.' Isaiah 38:19 NKJV

A researcher at Johns Hopkins University informed us that children as young as eight months old are capable of hearing and remembering words, good or bad. 'Little ears are listening,' said Dr Peter Juscyzk. Babies in this study, which appeared in the esteemed journal, Science, were exposed to three taped stories for about ten days. Two weeks afterwards, they were tested in a lab and clearly identified the words in the stories while failing to react to words they hadn't heard.

Professor Emerita Robin Chapman, a language specialist at the University of Wisconsin at the time, emphasised the importance of this study. It demonstrates that very young children do pay attention to the sounds of language and are able to select those that are familiar. No, they may not fully understand them, but their brains are wired to record them and replay them later on.

So, taking the time to talk to tiny children not only teaches them language skills but sows seeds of truth that can bloom later in life. Words are formative; they are creative! The first words your child hears will be spoken by you. The first music your child listens to will be chosen by you. Your child is like a precious piece of clay, and you are the potter God has called to mould them. Words have power. As a parent, you help to shape the kind of person your child becomes by the words that you speak to them.

If a child lives with criticism, he learns to condemn. If a child lives with hostility, he learns to fight. If a child lives with ridicule, he learns to be shy. If a child lives with shame, he learns to feel guilty. If a child lives with tolerance, he learns to be patient. If a child lives with encouragement, he learns confidence. If a child lives with praise, he learns to appreciate. If a child lives with approval, he learns to like himself. (Written by Dorothy Law Nolte)


