Stories of Sandakan

Bovup Brook's Sandakan Service on September 13. commemorated the appalling Second World War death marches through North Borneo, through powerful storytelling. With the last of the Sandakan survivors, Billy Young, passing away in May this year, researching and retelling this tragic story has perhaps become even more important.

This annual service, held at the Sandakan Memorial was the first of its kind when it commenced in 1991. Former local and Prisoner of War (POW) Ted McLaughlin was the initiator, as he wished to honour his best mate who was tortured and killed on the deadly marches, along with more than 2000 other British and Australian soldiers.

A respectful crowd gathered, not letting a good drop of rain stop them, with service MC Rhonda Parker's wish for a dry spell during the ceremony partly granted.

Rhonda guided the service which featured prayer, poetry, a presentation from both schools, wreath laying, the Last Post and Rouse and flag raising.

Distinguished guests were welcomed by Shire President Richard Walker, who also took the time to pay respects to the late Ted McLaughlin and the late Fred Doust, who was also a war veteran.

During his opening address, RSLWA State President Duncan Anderson congratulated the collaboration between the Shire, the local RSL Sub-Branch, Boyup Brook District High School and St Mary's Primary School, for their continued hard work to put this service together.

Local RSL Sub-Branch President Colin Hales, spoke of the importance of having the local schools involved in the storytelling of Australia's wartime history. Continued page 3

He asked the students to make this the beginning of their Sandakan learning journeys so these stories continue to be shared.

In her reflection as recipient of the 2021 Sandakan Scholarship, Anne Deas said over both year's of her participation in the program, that it had become more than just a speech to her and she encouraged all to take a moment to feel the spirit of Sandakan whilst at the memorial.

This year's scholarship, a monetary prize generously sponsored by the Lions Club of Boyup Brook, went to Nicole Turner who is pictured below with her 3D model of the camps of Sandakan. Her presentation referenced this piece, that she put together using maps and images found during her research. She hoped the model would show that although the death camps may be long gone, the stories of Sandakan can still be passed on.



Amateur Radio Campers

On the weekend of September 10-11, the Southern Electronics Group hosted a camping event at the Mayanup Sports Ground.

The event is primarily for Radio Amateurs (also known as Hams) to set up their field equipment and operate in a radioquiet environment, away from their usually radio-noisy suburban homes and enjoy the company of like-minded people whom they may have spoken to many times, but never met. 16 campers and seven day visitors enjoyed the sunshine while sharing knowledge of their equipment and expertise.

Ham Radio has been the innovator of privately-owned radio equipment since the 1920's, although most of the equipment on site was purchased in the last two decades. Almost everyone operated using solar power and batteries, with some very innovative antennae set up. Hams visited from Perth, Mandurah, Australind, Katanning, Manjimup and of course, Boyup Brook.

Contacts were made with Casey Station in Antarctica, the Solomon Islands, Japan, USA and numerous stations in Europe and across Australia. Conversation, good food and a few bevvies were shared and much praise was given to such an excellent venue. This was the inaugural event, but the overwhelming opinion is that it should happen again next year.

Gardening Crew

Have been busy planting shrubs at the pool and repairing reticulation in town ready for summer.

Building Crew

Change of Details – Rates

Included with the rates was a Change of Details – Rates form. It would be appreciated if you could complete this form and return to Shire administration.

There is an obligation on property owners to ensure that the Shire has the correct address for service of notices. The Shire accepts no responsibility for mail not received due to an incorrect mailing address or a mail redirection.

By completing the form, it will ensure Shire Rates information is current and may also assist in avoiding debt collection if you have missed paying the rates.

BPAY – Important information

Each assessment has a unique Biller Code, therefore if making payment by BPAY, please ensure a separate BPAY payment is made for each assessment.

If a payment is made for several assessments, it is the ratepayer's responsibility to inform the shire of the individual assessment numbers the payments are to be allocated to. If the shire has not been informed of the allocation, interest will be incurred on those assessments with monies showing as outstanding.

Payment Options

The shire offers instalment plan options when the original rate notice for the year is raised.

Some ratepayers are choosing to set up BPAY through their preferred financial institution to pay an allocated amount each week/fortnight/month, so the credit reduces the amount to be paid when rates are raised.



Hi Boyup Brook,

Here at the police station, one of our numerous complaints or requests for clarification is on the use of 'Drones'. Now the weather is warming up, the queries and concerns tend to build.

Drones have become widely popular and with prices dropping there seems to be an influx of residents using them for recreational purposes. Flying is fun but does come with certain rules to keep everyone safe.

Those of you that know me and my 'great working relationship with technology' (?!!)... may be surprised that I have an interest in this topic. Hopefully I can clear up some of the most common questions we get asked.

Can I fly over the footie oval during a game?

No. You must not fly over or above people or in a populated area. This could involve events such as the Country Music Festival, Rodeo, parks or sports oval where there is a game in progress. Also remember not to fly within 30 metres of another person.

Can I use my device to keep an eye on my drone if I can't see it? No. You must always be able to physically see your drone and not rely on screens or devices to fly.

Can I fly at night time or when it is foggy so I can get a nice 'atmospheric' photo of Boyup Brook?

As nice as it maybe...No. Drones must not be flown at night time or when there is inclement / foggy weather.

My neighbour uses their drone over my house and I think they are taking photos of me. Is this allowed?


No. Respect personal privacy. Don't record or take photographs without people's consent. This may breach other laws which carry large fines and / or jail.

Remember that flying a drone for fun is exactly that. Do not operate your drone in a way that creates a hazard to another aircraft, person or property.

The governing body that enforces drone rules and regulations is the Civil Aviation Safety Authority (CASA) and not the police. Breaching these basic safety rules may result in you receiving an infringement or even receiving a summons to appear in Court.

Week 10 was amazing. The whole week was focused around providing opportunities for all to learn about wellbeing and wellness. We know that we all learn best when we feel safe and connected.







We Wear Green

St Johns Ambulance Boyup Brook Sub-centre has responded to a number of emergency and transfer jobs in the month of August. We have travelled over 2000 kilometres in this time at all hours. It is an honour and a privilege to be able to help our community.

This month I'll explain: What to do once you have called an ambulance.

Once you've dialled 000 and requested an ambulance, you will receive instructions from the ambulance operator on how to care for the patient.

Sometimes they will stay on the line with you. If they don't and the patient's condition deteriorates, call triple 000 again. If there is someone else with you, one of you should do the following while the other stays with the patient.

- Turn on the outside lights.
- Lock up any dogs or other animals.
- Remove any vehicles that are blocking the way such as cars in the driveway and turn on their hazard lights.
- If time and helping hands permit, move furniture and other items from hallways, corridors etc to make extrication of the patient easier, faster and more practical.
- Collect any medications and medical paperwork that the patient has.
- Prepare an overnight bag for the patient.
- Have any benefit cards handy to go with the patient.

- If the patient is unable to speak or is confused, write down their date of birth, medical history including allergies, next of kin including a phone number, when the patient last ate, drank or went to the toilet.
- If manpower and time permits, go to the roadway and wave down the ambulance, then direct the crew to the patient.

When the officers arrive, describe to them exactly what has happened. Be as honest and clear as you can. Also tell them what has been done for the patient since the incident. Stand back and let the officers do their job. If they need any help they will ask for it and give you clear instructions on what to do.

The patient will be transported to the nearest appropriate hospital. Most of the time this will be Boyup Brook Hospital. If the patient is going elsewhere the officers will let you know which hospital. If you would like to travel in the ambulance, ask the officers. They will decide based on the best medical outcome for the patient. If permission is granted, you will be sitting in the front with the driver. It is best sometimes for you to make your own way to the hospital as we cannot bring you back to where we picked you up.



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
Fire Danger Rating System

From September 1, Western Australia will have a new Fire Danger Rating system as part of a national project to ensure Fire Danger Ratings are communicated the same way, no matter where you are in Australia.

Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a bushfire start. They provide important information so you can take action to protect yourself and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of a bushfire. You need to understand the Fire Danger Rating to assess your level of bushfire risk and decide what actions to take.

What to do

- Learn the four levels of Fire Danger Ratings and the actions you should take at each level.
- Check the Fire Danger Rating each day at emergency.wa.gov.au. You should also monitor Emergency WA for bushfire warnings.
- Ensure your bushfire plan is adaptable for the different levels of fire danger. Your plan might include triggers at a High Fire Danger Rating. Even if your property is very well prepared, homes cannot withstand fires in Catastrophic conditions and it is too dangerous to stay. Visit www.mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au

When Bait Advertising Bites

It may be a familiar scenario for some shoppers – you spot an advert for a product at a very attractive sale price and place an order, but it's later cancelled by the retailer claiming the item is 'out-of-stock.'

Consumers may be left wondering whether the business is obliged to honour the discounted price, regardless of whether the item had genuinely sold-out or if a mistake had been made during the advertising process.

The answer depends on a number of factors. Bait advertising – where sale prices and special offers are promoted to attract customers – is a legitimate form of advertising, but only if the trader provides sufficient quantities of the product to meet the anticipated demand. The only exception to this rule is if it's made very clear in the advert that the discounted goods are available for "today only" or "while stocks last" for example.

Let's say a retailer advertises a week-long sale on a product and it would usually expect to sell thirty of those items in a week, but stocks just two items at the advertised price that sellout in one or two days. This is likely to be illegal bait advertising and a breach of Australian Consumer Law (ACL) because the retailer does not have a reasonable supply of the advertised product.

In a situation like this, a consumer may be entitled to receive a remedy, such as a 'rain check' (a coupon guaranteeing an outof-stock sale item may be purchased at a later date at the same reduced price) or an acceptable substitute product at the same discounted price. Alternatively, to avoid breaching the ACL, a retailer can publish a retraction to a similar audience or circulation number as the original advert.

Remember that it makes no difference whether a business intends to mislead customers or not. If the overall impression of any advertisement, promotion, quotation or representation leaves a misleading impression in customers' minds – regarding price, value or quality – then the behaviour is likely to breach the law.


DVD Review

Getting to Know Ralph and Betty Knapp



Betty Knapp, nee Littlefair, was born in Pemberton in January 1941, and grew up on a farm in Eastbrook. Betty describes herself as a dairy farmer's daughter, and as the eldest of her siblings, she was kept very busy helping out.

"Growing up on a dairy farm meant bare feet, keeping the wood box full, bringing the cows home, cleaning out pig sty's, and when my hands were big enough to cut air off the milking cups, it was milking cows," said Betty.

Her father had migrated from England and took over a farm in Karri Country in 1923. With its big trees it was a big change from the moorlands he had known as a child.

Her mother was from a mixed orchard in Donnybrook and looked after her family well in their group settlement home. It had no modern cons such as a fridge or running water, and no electricity until 1964 when Betty was 23.

Betty went to school in Pemberton and she remembers her first school bus was an ex-army truck and to fit more children in, they'd sit them on apple packing cases down the middle.

In her final year of school after her father hurt his back, before and after school Betty had to milk the cows. In the evenings she didn't get to her homework until about 7pm each night. Somehow she still managed to fair well and get her junior certificate.

At 15 years old, after school had finished, she was then able to help on the farm full time. Her outside interests saw her join the Pemberton Junior Farmers (JF) group and through this affiliation, she met a young man from another JF group by the name of Ralph Knapp.

Ralph was born a month after Betty, in February 1941 in Perth. At the time, his family were living on a farm in Armadale, but had previously farmed in Kulja in the Wheatbelt. Unfortunately, before Ralph was born, they had to walk off this property due to drought and depression.

Ralph was the youngest born and came quite sometime after his two older sisters, making him very much the baby of the family. When he was a month old, his father joined the army and was away for the next four years. Upon his return, he set about moving his family down south "where it rains," so Ralph was four when he first moved to Uradale in 1945.

Schooling by correspondence until he was 10, Ralph only did a year at the school in Boyup Brook before he went away to board at Hale in the city.

This was a big change for him and he looked forward to his return back to the farm at age 15. His day to day life would then include a lot of land clearing, as the previous landowners had ring barked many trees prior to their arrival, they also farmed flax, clover and oats.

Ralph joined up with the Dinninup JF, meeting many new people and attending dances amongst other activities. The dance lessons he received at Hale served him well as Betty, remembers he was very good.

When Kellerberrin JF came to Dinninup, they took them over to Pemberton to see some "real trees" and Betty was given the task to show them around. To thank her, Ralph wrote her a letter and on the bottom of it he wrote, "P.S. Would you like to come to a dance in Boyup, 28th May 1966?" Betty obliged!

The two courted for the next year and married in July 1967, managing to dodge all of the bad weather that came either side of their winter wedding day, to enjoy a fine and beautiful day in Pemberton. Betty's father had even let her have the morning off from milking the cows!

After they married, Betty and Ralph moved into a one-bedroom house built for them at Uradale.

Following in his father's footsteps, at age 23, Ralph joined up with the Upper Blackwood Agricultural Show (UBAS) committee. After he married Betty, her reputation had preceded her as there was much excitement about her being an asset to town and what she might bring to the Show.



The community service this couple has done over the years is quite astounding, and there are a few too many community groups, volunteer roles, committee positions and accolades to mention in this article.

However, some of the highlights for Ralph have included his work on the UBAS, serving as president of the South West Group of Affiliated Agricultural Societies for five years where he helped with district displays at the Perth Royal Show, involvement in the Chowerup Repertory and instigator of the local Men's Shed. He's also been a keen sportsman playing tennis and badminton for many years.

Betty has served loyally as a third generation CWA member where she has enjoyed a variety of roles, she has served on various other committees, enjoyed many years with the UBAS and during her JF days she went on an exchange trip to New Zealand, served as vice president and was also state executive.

Betty is certain that they have Junior Farmers to thank for teaching them how to step into different roles within the various committees and clubs they have been a part of.

Together, the Knapp's have enjoyed seeing many different parts of the state, including completing the Canning Stock Route and Gibb River Road. Betty said they feel very privileged to have seen so much and described some parts of the state as a "desert full of life." They have also travelled abroad to places like England, Canada, Alaska, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Kuala Lumpur and Bali.

More recently, the Knapp's visited the former town site of Kulja, where Ralph's family had farmed. What was once a bustling farming town, big enough to host an annual agricultural show, is now very hard to find. In fact, the only hint they were on the main road came from their car's satellite navigation.

Ralph and Betty have a lot in common - they are the same age, born only a month apart; they share the same rare blood type; they had very similar upbringings on family farms; they joined their local Junior Farmers; they both love dancing and they both enjoy being of service to the community earning Life Membership's in some groups.

For their service and commitment to this community, they have both also received Boyup Brook Citizen of the Year. Ralph was awarded in 2017 and Betty not long after in 2020.


Unfortunately, they had to give away dancing due to COVID-19. Their hobbies now include looking for wildflowers and fungi for Betty whilst Ralph loves a good game of Solitaire on the computer after dinner and he also likes to shell his home grown macadamia nuts.

They think their greatest achievement is a happy marriage and raising their two children, Barbara and Courtney. They now have five grandsons as well. They are also proud of the work they put into their Uradale property, "Clearing land, more dams, strengthening tree cover along Scotts Brook, improved sheep / wool and now being able to continue living on the farm while Courtney runs and manages it."

Betty and Ralph are still very active with helping out on the farm today, and they have never thought about living anywhere other than Uradale.








THE LITTLE ART GALLERY

All players contributed on the day, but Matt Michael was clearly adjudged best on




ground for the way he used the ball all day. Liam Park was outstanding down back, but it was a master stroke to put him in the ruck in the last quarter as he gave his mids the ball.


Our thanks to sponsors The Room Hair Co. The event was won by Rhonda Parker with 34 points and Lyn Willett runner up with 33 points.

Another winter season of netball saw many junior and senior Boyup Brook competitors driving over to take part in the Bridgetown Netball Association league.


