Billabong's Helping Hands

Just in time to celebrate World Nature Conservation Day, nearly 100 community volunteers and students from the Boyup Brook Primary School and St Mary's Primary School planted 800 native seedlings in the Kura Kartaga Langa Reserve. Despite frequent showers and muddy conditions, the tree planting event was a great opportunity to raise awareness for the Boyup Brook Billabong and connect young people back with nature.

On Tuesday, July 26 a group of ten volunteers from Boyup Brook, Collie and Nannup, met at the picnic area and were eager to start planting. Various shrubs and trees, specifically selected for the vegetation system of the reserve, were planted and protected with tree guards.

The day was highlighted by Mrs Francke's class of 15 Kindergarteners from the Boyup Brook Primary School. After a quick visit to the Billabong, the students were motivated to start planting. New seedlings are now establishing around the seating area, near the interpretative sign and along the path leading into the reserve.

On Wednesday, students and staff from St Mary's Primary School continued with planting and staking, supported by two volunteers who agreed to help on the second day and tirelessly folded tree guards. The first group of year 5 and 6 students were paired up with pre-primary students, helping each other with planting tools, staking tree guards and a little bit of exploring the curiosities of the bush.



The second group of students from Years 1 to 4 were eagerly digging, planting and helping to fold tree guards. Overall, another 300 seedlings were added to the tally, totalling up to an unbelievable 800 seedlings planted in just two days.

The tree planting event was part of the rehabilitation of the Boyup Brook Billabong. Numerous plant species, some previously displaced by weeds, inappropriate fire regimes and more frequent flooding events over the past 120 years, have now been re-introduced into the reserve.

Once established, these native plants may provide suitable habitat for the (critically) endangered forest red-tail cockatoo, chuditch, ringtail possum and southern brown bandicoot. The successful establishment of native plants do not only add to the recreational value of the reserve but also provides erosion and flood control.

The native plants selected for the revegetation are mostly deep rooting and act like sponges in the soil, preventing soil erosion and waterlogging. They will minimise the risk of flooding in this area by absorbing excess water and improving drainage.

We Wear Green

St Johns Ambulance Boyup Brook Sub-centre is a volunteer staffed depot. We provide a 24 hour, 365 days a year, emergency and transfer roster. This means that every day there are four highly trained volunteers waiting to come to your aid.

These volunteers give up an evening every month to attend training. This training equips the officers with the skills to provide lifesaving assistance to the community. The emergency crew deal with all sorts of incidents from motor vehicle collisions to sporting injuries. Most of our call outs are non-life threatening and it is very rare that we must deal with the not so pleasant scenes. I personally gain a great deal of satisfaction from being able to help one of our elderly community at two o'clock in the morning just to get back into bed.

The officers providing the transport service, where we transport a patient from our hospital to Bunbury or even Perth on the rare occasion, can be away from their home for five hours or more. These patients may require scans, tests or even operations. Without the volunteer transport service, they could be waiting hours if not days for transport.

If you have any medical issues at any time, please do not hesitate to call 000 and we will be with you as soon as we can. We often hear of people driving themselves or their relatives to hospital. This can place the patient at risk. Call 000 and let us provide you with a safe and professional service.

It takes a lot of work by dedicated people to provide the town with a professional and compassionate service.

However, it's not just ambulance crews that we need volunteers for, we require all sorts of help. Volunteers are needed to wash the ambulances, maintain the gardens and buildings, administration, restocking ambulances, assistance with recruitment and many other activities. If you have some time available and would like to help in any capacity, we would like to hear from you.



Flax Mill Caravan Park - Campervan & Motorhome Club of Australia Ltd

The Shire has entered into a Management Agreement with CMCA (Campervan & Motorhome Club of Australia Ltd) to manage the Boyup Brook Caravan Park.

The CMCA is the largest Recreational Vehicle (RV) club in Australia, with more than 70,000 members. The CMCA currently operate RV "no frills" parks in all Australian states other than WA and promotes these parks through its online website and monthly magazine which is distributed to CMCA members.

The CMCA have their own branding for parks that will be used for their members and the booking site. However, we will continue to use the Boyup Brook Flax Mill Caravan Park name on our own directional signage and marketing materials.

The CMCA will take responsibility for all bookings through an online booking system and have a live in caretaker for the Flax Mill Caravan Park. The Shire will receive 70% of the bookings, with 30% being retained by the CMCA.

Eligibility for Oral COVID-19 Treatments

The Pharmaceutical Benefits Advisory Committee recommended changes to the eligibility criteria of the oral treatments. This will take effect from Monday 11 July 2022. Antiviral treatments taken as capsules or tablets may help stop COVID-19 infection from becoming severe. Courses of these antiviral treatments need to be started as soon as possible after symptoms from COVID-19 begin.

People at higher risk of severe illness are eligible for antiviral treatments.

Senior Australians and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people

If you test positive for COVID-19, you may be eligible for antiviral treatments if you are:

- 70 years and older, regardless of risk factors and with or without symptoms
- 50 years or older with 2 additional risk factors
- Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, 30 years or older and with 2 additional risk factors.

Risk factors for these groups include:

- · living in residential aged care
- living with disability with multiple conditions and/or frailty (but not limited to living in supported accommodation)
- neurological conditions like stroke or dementia and demyelinating conditions e.g. multiple sclerosis,
 Guillain-Barre Syndrome
- chronic respiratory conditions including COPD, moderate or severe asthma
- obesity or diabetes (type I or II requiring medication)
- heart failure, coronary artery disease, cardiomyopathies
- kidney failure or cirrhosis
- living remotely with reduced access to higher level healthcare.

People aged 18 years and older

If you test positive for COVID-19 and are moderately to severely immunocompromised, you may be eligible for antiviral treatments.

Conditions include:

- blood cancer or some red blood cell disorders (thalassemia, sickle cell disease)
- transplant recipient
- primary or acquired (HIV) immunodeficiency
- chemotherapy or whole-body radiotherapy in the last 3 months
- high dose corticosteroids or pulse corticosteroid therapy in the last 3 months
- immunosuppressive treatments in the last 3 months
- rituximab in the last 12 months
- cerebral palsy or Down Syndrome
- · congenital heart disease
- living with disability with multiple conditions and/or frailty.

How to get COVID-19 oral treatments

If you test positive, you should contact your doctor or the hospital for advice about eligibility first.

If your doctor recommends oral antiviral treatments, you will need a prescription.

The medications are available at your local pharmacy or the hospital with a prescription.

Your doctor can send the pharmacist or the hospital your prescription electronically so the medications can be either collected by a friend or family member (you will be in isolation having tested positive) or delivered to your home.

If you have any questions, do not hesitate to call your doctor.



POLICE NEWS BOYUP BROOK POLICE

A little while ago I was cleaning out some drawers in my office when I came across some very old station documents. One in particular was the annual report for Boyup Brook Police District from 1944. Due to some sensitivity in some of the content I couldn't transcribe the entire document, however I am able to provide some insight into what policing the area was like at that time. The below are some selected excerpts from the report, submitted by Henry John Jacobs, Constable 1452, dated 1st July 1944. It's nice to know some things haven't changed.

"I have to report that this sub-district was free from serious crime during the past year. There was one case of 'Unlawful Assault' before the Court, which was withdrawn by the complainant. One case of 'Disorderly Conduct', the offender being fined £2.0.0, and four cases of drunkenness.

The total number of Police Court charges being 7, an increase of 2 of that of the previous year. The fines inflicted £5.10.0 in all. All amounts were paid.

Traffic Prosecutions by Police – NIL. Number of sly grog shanties in district – NIL. Liquor seized under the Illicit Sale of Liquor Act – NIL. Wife and Child Desertions – NIL. The number of Police Patrols for the year were 76 and the total miles travelled 1,711.

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Total charges against street betting – NIL. There are no common betting houses in this sub-district. Street accidents reported during the year – NIL.

There are 115 motor cars, 236 motor wagons and 19 motor cycles in the sub-district, an increase of 63 from the previous year."

Policing in 1944 was not just crime and traffic, with extraneous duties performed by Constable Jacobs including Bailiff, Clerk of Petty Sessions, Postal Vote Officer, Assistant District Registrar, Local Supply Officer and Inspector for the Liquid Fuel Control Board. All of these duties, and some others, were all recorded in the report.

Due to Constable Jacobs' many roles within the community, he also including in the report the current state of local industries; "The principle industries are :- Apple and Pear Orchards, Cattle and Sheep raising, mixed farming and Flax Production.

The past season has had a set-back owing to the lack of rains and both the fruit production and stock raising have not been up to expectations. The following figures show the stock, perishable goods and other commodities railed from Boyup Brook to 30th June 1944.

Perishable Goods: 42,000 cases of Apples, 353 cases of Pears and 7,000 cases of stone fruits. 41,798 gallons of cream was railed to the butter factory at Boyanup.

Stock and Wool: Cattle, Sheep and Wool railed to Perth as follows: Cattle 589, Sheep 34,500, Horses 20, Pigs 335. Wool 7,036 Bales, 1,200 Bags.

Flax Production: Approximately 6,500 acres have been sown and a yield up to 10,000 tons is expected. A large Retting Tank has been erected and is now in operation. There are approximately 180 persons employed at the Flax Mill and in the very near future another 100 persons will be engaged in the industry at Boyup Brook.

Ten new buildings (private homes) are now being built at a cost of approximately £900 each.

Water Supply: The PWD has completed a dam capable of holding 30,000,000 gallons which will supply the Flax Mill and the township."

I hope you enjoyed this piece of nostalgia. There are a number of humorous comparisons we could make between policing Boyup Brook in 1944 and now, however I think I will leave it there.

Welcome to our whole school assembly.

As this most likely will be my last assembly at Boyup Brook DHS I would like to acknowledge a number of people. Firstly I would like to say I have been very fortunate to have had the career that I have had. I have worked with some amazing people that has enabled me to enjoy and feel valued throughout my time with the Department of Education.

There have been, as you have heard, some significant moments that I am very proud of. However it hasn't always been an easy road and many times I have needed to show the core values of our school of *Respect, Resilience and Striving for Success*.

None of what I have achieved would be possible without the support of my wife Jane and my family who have followed me through several locations and made the very best of where we were living. This year's five categories are: Landscapes, Animals, Flora, Portraits and the OPEN category is the Colour Yellow



Garden Club

It was a very cold afternoon on August 9, but a small group visited Helen and Reuven's garden despite frequent showers and a maximum temperature of nine degrees. Most of the time was spent keeping warm by the fire, drinking tea and eating delicious treats. Suddenly the showers abated and we ventured outside for about ten minutes before the rain continued.

The rear garden is terraced with Geraniums, Salvias and Lavender bushes sprinkled with Californian Poppies beginning to pop out their bright yellow flowers. The lower level is predominantly a 'no dig' garden meaning that the plants have been grown in layers of cardboard sheeting, pine bark shavings, soil and compost all without having to dig a hole in the ground.

Small plants are grown and eventually the roots make their way through the layers to establish themselves further down growing into large mature shrubs of Salvia, Rock Rose, Daisies, Proteas, Fountain Grass and True Wormwood. A great way to get rid of weeds!

A generous number of trees in the back garden including Eucalyptus, Grevilleas and some eastern states native trees provide home to a variety of birdlife. An Olivacea Grevillea attracts a great number of bees as do many of the cottage plants such as Daisies, Nasturtiums and Borrage.

Fruit trees are generous in supplying Mulberries, Apricots, Loquats, Almonds and a prolific Autumn Plum tree. Light is captured in parts of the garden by the placement of large mirrors which old dressing tables no longer require. Thanks to all who visited Helen and Reuven's home and garden.

Our next visit on Tuesday, September 13 at 1pm will be a leisurely walk through a bush block in Boyup Brook to view native wildflowers. This bush block is on Cailes Rd. Parking is available on the right hand side of the road just before the sign which reads Bridgetown 28km as you are leaving Boyup Brook. Please bring a chair and your own thermos for a cuppa.

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



Base for Motorbike Tour

Motors are starting to rev in preparation for the fifth instalment of the ADAMA Australia 2-wheel motorbike crop trials tour in WA which will start and end at the Dinninup Showground.

From September 13-15, registered riders are set to enjoy a range of bike trails and some camping fun while gaining an insight into some of the latest crop and pasture research.

This year, the tour heads to some of the most picturesque areas of the State's agricultural region in the South West and stretching over to the Great Southern. Bevan Addison, Market Development Manager with ADAMA Australia in WA, said the first day of the tour would take in a visit to the Rylington Park research farm to view a range of crop and pasture types, as well as herbicide trials. On day two, the tour tracks to Manjimup and Pemberton, looking over unique, high rainfall farming systems, pasture plant breeding and some research into cereal crop diseases. Bevan said on the final day, the group will journey to Kojonup and Muradup to visit growers and some further crop herbicide and disease trials.

The BBDHS Year 9 and 10 classes visited the library to look through the collection to conduct research about Sandakan in preparation for their scholarship presentations.



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Fire Danger Rating System

From September 1, Western Australia will have a new Fire Danger Rating system as part of a national project to ensure Fire Danger Ratings are communicated the same way, no matter where you are in Australia.

Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a bushfire start. They provide important information so you can take action to protect yourself and others from the potentially dangerous impacts of a bushfire. You need to understand the Fire Danger Rating to assess your level of bushfire risk and decide what actions to take.

What to do

- Learn the four levels of Fire Danger Ratings and the actions you should take at each level.
- Check the Fire Danger Rating each day at emergency.wa.gov.au. You should also monitor Emergency WA for bushfire warnings.
- Ensure your bushfire plan is adaptable for the different levels of fire danger. Your plan might include triggers at a High Fire Danger Rating. Even if your property is very well prepared, homes cannot withstand fires in Catastrophic conditions and it is too dangerous to stay. Visit www.mybushfireplan.wa.gov.au

Better Health Boyup

Advance Health Directives

An Advance Health Directive (also known as an AHD) is a legal document used to record your decisions about the future medical treatment you want or do not want to receive if you become very unwell or injured. It can only be made by a person older than 18 years who is able to make and communicate their own decisions.

An Advance Health Directive is only used if you become unable to make or communicate decisions. If this happens, your Advance Health Directive becomes your 'voice'. It can only be used if the information in it is relevant to the treatment or care you need.

The WA Advance Health Directive was updated in the *Guardianship and Administration Act Regulations* on 4 August 2022 and now includes two new sections on values and preferences and medical research decisions. The new Advance Health Directive is easier to complete and understand as it:

- enables you to capture your values and preferences, in addition to treatment decisions
- includes more guidance and examples
- combines tick box and free text questions
- includes consent to medical research.

Advance Health Directives using an old version of the form that were made prior to 4 February 2023 will continue to be valid if the person followed all legal requirements to complete the form.

How do I make an Advance Health Directive?

Start by reading the Advance Health Directive and the Read the Guide to Making an Advance Health Directive in WA.

- Think about what matters to you most about your values, health and health care and what will matter most if you become seriously unwell or injured in future.
- Talk to close family and friends about what is important to you.
- Seek medical and/or legal advice as required.
- Complete the details in your Advance Health Directive by hand or type into the electronic PDF form.
- Sign your Advance Health Directive in the presence of 2 witnesses aged 18 years or older, including one person who is authorised to witness statutory declarations in WA.
- Make certified copies and upload a copy to My Health Record to ensure your Advance Health Directive is available to your treating health professionals if it is needed.
- Keep the original Advance Health Directive in a safe place.
- Give certified copies of your Advance Health Directive to close family and friends and people who are involved in your care.
- Plan a time (in 2 to 5 years) to review your Advance Health Directive or do it immediately if your health circumstances change.

The Lions Club of Boyup Brook are looking for volunteers to help out at the Containers for Change Refund Point at the Waste Transfer Station.




The jobs include counting and carrying cans, glass and plastic bottles to bins. We are willing to donate part of the proceeds to any club, school or sporting club that helps on the day.



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

Broadhurst, these booklets group the flowers in the months they appear and feature photographs taken exclusively within bush blocks that bound the Boyup Brook town site.



We exhorted, and comforted, and charged every one of you, as a father does his own children. - 1 Thess. 2:11

Thanks Dad.

In the US, more long distance calls are made on Mother's Day than any other day. But on Father's Day, the most collect calls are made. It seems that children still depend on their fathers to provide, even when they are far away from home.

Fathers are needed and wanted for much more than financial help. While 1 Thessalonians 2:10-12 is primarily directed toward church leaders, Paul talks about how their role is similar to a father's. He states, "You know how we exhorted, and comforted, and charged every one of you, as a father does his own children."

Exhorted is "to call near." It is easy for fathers to think that all that's required of them is to bring home a paycheque. But children need their close encouragement.

The word *comforted* is "to console." Nothing is more valuable to a child than the time given by a father to listen and talk. Without constant relating, relationships turn cold.

Charged is "to affirm." Fathers challenge their children by affirming the truth of God's Word as they live it out in front of them. And even in failings, they affirm what is right through the asking of forgiveness. How thankful we can be for fathers who help their children "walk worthy of God" (v.12).




