Sandakan Story Not to be Forgotten

The Sandakan story is one of our greatest wartime tragedies, but it is also one of the most unknown.

Boyup Brook has a very close local connection to the Sandakan story through Ted McLaughlin.

In 1942, Ted was captured as a Prisoner of War (POW) in Singapore. From Singapore, some of McLaughlin's mates, including Gunner Albert Cleary, were sent to Sandakan to build an airstrip for the Japanese, whilst Ted was to remain in Singapore. Upon his arrival back home after the war, McLaughlin was in the dark about what had happened to his mates in Sandakan.

His legacy, through the Boyup Brook Sandakan Memorial and Scholarship, continues to tell the story of his mates.

In 2019, I was fortunate to be the recipient of the Ted McLaughlin Memorial Scholarship at Boyup Brook District High School, but was unable to travel to Sandakan in 2020 due to COVID-19. I attended Penrhos College for Year 11 and 12 and was surprised to learn that the events at Sandakan during World War II, were not taught at any other schools.

In 2022, I was the recipient of the Meg Melville Alumni Endeavour Award at Penrhos College. This scholarship requires the recipient to create a project that gives back to their community. This scholarship enabled me to travel to Singapore and Borneo in April 2023 to learn more about Sandakan and experience our wartime history.

It was incredible to be able to explore the places of significance firsthand and hear from people who had lost relatives at the Sandakan camp, or on the Death Marches.

This trip inspired me to continue to tell the Sandakan story. My project, as part of the Penrhos scholarship, is to create educational resources that students and the wider community can use to learn about this crucial part of our history. My main aim for the project is to help educate the current and future generations of Australians about our greatest tragedy of WWII.

I have created a short brochure detailing the events at Sandakan during WWII that will be available to the Boyup Brook community very soon, with the hope that one day it can be distributed to communities throughout the country.

This part of our wartime history was hidden from society for a long time after the war, so being able to share it now is a great privilege and I am very grateful that this scholarship is allowing me to give back, not only locally, but to the wider community.

The annual Boyup Brook Sandakan service will be held on Tuesday, September 12 2023 at 11am. It is an important

opportunity to be able to remember the 2,500 POWs who sacrificed their lives at Sandakan, on the Death Marches and at Ranau.

September Spring Clean

September is the month you should start planning your bushfire risk management plan and tidy your yard. Why so soon? September allows you time to schedule, order supplies and plan so that the work is completed in time for the hotter months.

- Contact your fire-break contractor and schedule your appointment before they run out of time to complete yours.
- Plan a weekend or two where you remove dead trees, rubbish and old wood piles and get them to the tip.
- Get in the shed and make sure you have chemicals itemised and stored properly for the hotter months to come.
- Prune trees that overhang rooftops and gutters.
- Check your reticulation and/or fire fighting equipment is working adequately.
- Complete a Bushfire Plan! Ranger Donna and Ranger Roz will be more than happy to assist you with this.



Boyup Brook's Community Care - Support for you to remain at home

The Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre (BBCRC), in conjunction with InCasa Country and Mable, are now offering a wide variety of home care support and services so older people can continue to enjoy living at home.

Whatever your needs, we will work with you to put a plan into action so that you can live your best life at home in your own community, and employ local people at the same time!

If you are over 65, or an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander over 50, you could be eligible for a Home Care Package funded by the Australian Government, available in four levels, based on your needs. Below are some examples of the services that may be available, depending on your budget:

Level 1: *\$10,271 a year for basic needs like: essential cleaning, pet care, social outings

Level 2: *\$18,064 a year for services like: meal preparation, cleaning, gardening and home maintenance

Level 3: *\$39,311 a year for higher care and support needs such as: meal preparation, domestic assistance, personal care, gardening and home maintenance, social support, allied health services

Level 4: *\$59,594 a year for high level care and support such as: meal preparation, nursing care and allied health services, personal care, domestic assistance, medication support, social support, gardening and home maintenance

*Home Care Package amounts as at July 2023

Your Home Care Package can be tailored to your needs to support you to continue living at home and will provide you with choice, control and flexibility in the way your care is delivered. It can help around your home with tasks that are becoming difficult, help you get ready for your day or support you to get back to doing the things you love or need to do.

How much will a Home Care Package cost?


Being eligible for an Australian Government Subsidised Home Care Package means that the government will subsidise the cost of care. If you are on a full pension, you will not be asked to make any personal contribulon for home support services.

- Basic Daily Fee: BBCRC/InCasa Country do not charge a basic daily fee. The basic daily fee is an amount that organisalon may choose to ask clients to pay.
- o Income Tested Fee (ITF): The income tested fee is a contribution that some people pay, as determined through an income assessment. This fee is based on individual income, including a part-pension. However, full pensioners and people with an income up to \$28,100.80 do not pay an income tested fee.
- Care Management Fee: This fee helps cover necessities including a dedicated clinical nurse, general manager, ongoing assessment and care planning, management of incidents, scheduling of services, financial oversight and funding, sourcing and ordering equipment and products, clinical governance and additional visits and correspondence as required.
- Package Management Fee: Helps cover necessities such as preparing monthly statements, managing your package funds, compliance and quality assurance activities, and the administration of your package.

The BBCRC can help you to apply for an Australian Government subsidised home care package. We can coordinate the supply of services you need once you have a home care package subsidised by the Australian Government. We can coordinate the supply of services you need if you are a private client and need support at home.





WA Telestroke Expansion

WA Telestroke is expanding its hours to become a 24-hour, seven day a week service for clinicians caring for patients with acute stroke symptoms.

Western Australian stroke specialists are now available as the first point of contact to assist emergency clinicians in the diagnosis, assessment and disposition of acute stroke and Transient Ischaemic Attack (TIA) patients across the State.


Given the significant mortality and morbidity associated with stroke and TIA, timely diagnosis and treatment is crucial for treatment teams and good patient outcomes.

Critical new treatments for acute ischaemic stroke, including mechanical thrombectomy and thrombolysis, are likely to be further enabled by Telestroke.

The extended service – effective as of 31 July – is part of phase two of the \$9.7 million program. Telestroke has diagnosed and treated more than 600 stroke patients since it began in late 2021.

The expansion of the Telestroke service aligns with recommendations made in the Sustainable Health Review, which aims to create a more sustainable, equitable and efficient health system.

Having worked as a regional Telehealth manager, Member for Warren-Blackwood, Jane Kelsbie MLA knows the importance a fast response can make to a stroke patient. She said, 'Telestroke isn't just a game-changer, it's a life saver."

Pasture Manipulation - STOP

When you see the everlastings in pasture, clover is 14 days from flowering (general rule of thumb). Everlastings have been in pasture for two weeks. You will reduce clover seed set dramatically the closer to clover flowering you manipulate.

Early Manipulation Pros

- ⇒ Lower chemical rates
- ⇒ Allows desired species to grow and establish before they want to go reproductive
- ⇒ Make use of capeweed early
- ⇒ Less shelter for RLEM

Late Manipulation Cons

- ⇒ Higher rates of chemical needed
- ⇒ Less likely to control as target species becomes more advanced
- ⇒ More shelter for RLEM
- ⇒ More competition for rye grass and clover
- ⇒ Fertilizing being used to grow rubbish grasses and broadleaf species

Burn SMART – Planned Burning

If you own or manage land in Western Australia it is your responsibility to reduce the risk of bushfire impacting it. This applies to all landholders and land occupiers, including private homes, businesses and government.

One of the most effective ways you can reduce fuel loads and the risk of bushfire is planned burning. Planned burning describes deliberately burning a predetermined area under appropriate environmental conditions to reduce fuel loads (the vegetation and dead plant material that can burn in a fire). Planned burns are undertaken under mild and stable weather conditions so that the fire burns slowly and is controllable with low flame heights.

It is important to note however that you are responsible for any fire you light and, if it escapes, you may be liable for the damage it causes.

Reducing fuel increases the chances of your property surviving a bushfire. The more fuel available to a bushfire, the hotter the fire can burn and the harder it is to control. Flammable material such as leaf litter, fallen branches, dead grasses and shrubs provide fuel for fire, allowing it to grow more quickly and burn at higher temperatures. This increases the likelihood of damage to your property, neighbouring properties and the environment. In comparison, reduced fuel levels assist not only in reducing how quickly a fire can spread, but it also reduces its spotting distance (how far the fire can jump).

Planned burning is a particularly efficient way to remove fuel over larger areas. When used appropriately, it generally results in less environmental disturbance than other methods. Many native plants and animals can also benefit from periodic fire.

The following information is designed to help you Burn SMART:

- Plan smart. Burn SMART.
- Planned burning can reduce the amount of flammable material on your property, potentially reducing the impact and spread of bushfire.
- In the wrong conditions, a planned burn can escape and become an uncontrollable fire. If you plan to burn, plan to Burn SMART.
- YOU are responsible for any burns on your property and must take care to recognise and manage risks.
- Create a burn plan using the Burn SMART Guide and Burn SMART Checklist.
- Watch the Burn SMART Planned Burning How-To Video Series to revisit the key stages of a planned burn and what you must do in order to Burn SMART.
- Register your burn by calling the DFES Communications Centre on 08 9395 9209.
- Burning under the wrong conditions can put lives and homes at risk. Property owners are responsible for recognising and managing all risks associated with their burn.
- Rules and restrictions can vary from day to day. Always check with your local government for burning restrictions and requirements prior to burning.

Backyard Buddies Biosecurity Blitz

Wherever you live and whatever the size of your backyard, you can help protect WA's agriculture, forests, and natural ecosystems into the future.

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD's) Biosecurity Blitz is back in 2023, with a special focus on reporting backyard pests and diseases.

The Biosecurity Blitz aims to protect Western Australia's backyards and agricultural industries from an increasing number of exotic threats, such as the recent incursions of polyphagous shot-hole borer, myrtle rust and Queensland fruit fly.

By checking your backyard for pests and diseases and reporting what you find, you'll learn about these organisms, help protect your garden, regional biodiversity and the local food and nursery industries in Western Australia.

Every report helps!

Your report helps to increase the likelihood that serious pests and diseases will be detected early, providing the best opportunity to eradicate or contain them.

If your report turns out to be a common pest, that data may be used to support WA's export trade.

Look - snap - report

This year the Biosecurity Blitz runs from 16 October to 16 November – that's 31 days to look for, take a photo, and send in a report of every pest and disease in your backyard.

To participate in the Blitz:

- o download the free MyPestGuide® Reporter app
- o check your backyard for pests and diseases.
- o take photos of any pests or disease signs you find
- o report online using app or at mypestguide.agric.wa.gov.au

Battery Disposal a Burning Issue

They come in all shapes and sizes to power many different devices, yet every battery has the potential to become a menace if they end up in your rubbish or recycling bin.

Some batteries contain toxic chemicals, heavy metals and other pollutants that can contaminate water supplies when they enter landfill, while rechargeable lithium-ion batteries become fire hazards if they are damaged or crushed during the waste collection process.

In recent months, wrongly discarded lithium-ion batteries were suspected to be behind a number of fires in recycling trucks and waste-handling facilities at various locations across WA.

How you discard batteries may depend on what type they are and what condition they are in. There are many battery drop-off points that will take your spent or unwanted batteries, including at the Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre (CRC). So, if you have a drawer with old batteries and devices, drop them off to the CRC at 86 Abel St on weekdays between 9am-4pm.

Damaged lithium-ion batteries and devices can however be dangerous, so they should never be taken to a battery collection point, nor should they be thrown-out, used or left in areas where they are exposed to heat, moisture, direct sunlight or in parked vehicles.


Instead, lithium-ion batteries showing signs of swelling, bulging, leaking, overheating or visible damage should only ever be placed in a clear plastic bag or container and transported to your nearest Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection facility – in the South West, there is one at the Stanley Road Waste Management Facility in Australind.

Don't forget to keep your used battery collection away from children, especially given the dangers that button batteries (even used ones) can pose if they are swallowed. As soon as you have finished using a button battery, put sticky tape around both sides of the battery to make them less attractive to children and avoid the low-risk of them catching fire.

With our upcoming photography competition I wanted to explore books on the camera lens. To be a good photographer is an amazing skill to have and develop. Many find it a rewarding hobby being able to capture moments in time, the beauty of nature in humans, animals and our environment.

A Porth Camera Richard Offen

A Perth Camera Written by: Richard Offen

This book focuses on the life work of Mr Ernie Polis a Lativian immigrant who after arriving in Fremantle with his wife in 1949, soon put his photographic skills to work.

After a short stint on the railways, Mr Polis was employed by the City of Perth as chief draftsman in the planning department and was later appointed the councils official photographer.

Photography was Mr Polis' life and he was mostly self-taught. After winning the 1957 Kodak Trophy for the best amateur photo taken in WA, he continued to hold the title for nine years. Mr Polis was a man who never left home without his camera, "What a good trait to have". When Mr Polis died in 1993 the world of photography lost one of its masters.

The book is a photographic record of Perth as a changing city, it has certainly undergone radical growth and development displayed in this pictorial collection. Mr Polis photographed many buildings under construction or on the eve of demolition. Looking back on them now, the ornate workmanship and style of our early building really were beautiful.

While enjoying the black and white photographs showing architectural achievements, do not miss the style of clothing and transportation. Some of my favourite photographs in the book show the Narrow's Bridge under construction in 1958-59 and a busy Hay Street in 1966.

I hope the amazing display of photographs found in this book, which is located in the reference section of the library, may cause you to reflect on bygone days or inspire you to take a few photos of your own and consider entering them in the Boyup Brook Community Resource Centre's photography competition.





Problems starting or stopping peeing; Slow or weak flow when peeing; Dribbling at the end of peeing; Sudden or urgent need to pee; Waking a lot at night to pee; Needing to pee a lot; Losing weight without trying; Pain when you pee; Problems controlling peeing; Bladder not feeling empty after peeing.







KidSport Vouchers Doubled

The Cook Government is making sport accessible to more Western Australian children, and further relieving cost-of-living pressures on families, by doubling the amount of financial assistance available per child through the popular KidSport voucher program.

Families struggling to cover the cost of registering their children in community sport can now apply for up to \$300 in KidSport vouchers per child, each financial year, over the next two years - double the previous amount.

Other enhancements to the State Government's KidSport program include allowing vouchers to be used towards essential playing equipment and uniforms.

Of this increase, local MP Jane Kelsbie MLA said, "I know how important playing sport was to my kids' not just for their physical and mental wellbeing, but for their social connection to community.
